Ms. Walter updated the Board on the status of the regulations of the Board to promulgate pursuant to Act 41, noting parameters of the Board will be written

into the regulation. She also noted working on the fee regulation as voted on by the Board at the last meeting.]

Appointment - Regulatory Process Presentation
[Cynthia K. Montgomery, Esquire, Deputy Chief Counsel,
Department of State, addressed the regulatory process.

Ms. Montgomery stated Pennsylvania has a very robust regulatory review process designed to gather considerable input from the regulated community, interested parties, and stakeholders to ensure sensible regulations that can be enforced.

Ms. Montgomery provided an overview of the eight basic steps to the regulatory process. She explained commencing with the drafting of the regulations, pre-publication review, proposed regulation published for public comment, Legislative Committee and the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) review, revisions to the final rulemaking, postpublication review, Legislative Committee and IRRC review part 2, and then the final regulation publication.

Ms. Montgomery stated the initiative to draft a regulation can come from legislature, the courts, the public, the bureau, the prosecution division, and the

Board.

Ms. Montgomery explained that Board counsel will generally draft the annex, which is the text of the regulation or the amendment to the existing regulation. She commented that an exposure draft is then distributed, noting Executive Order 1996-1 from Governor Ridge's administration, that requires all regulations be drafted and promulgated with early and meaningful input from the public to stakeholders and interested parties who have an interest in the Board's regulatory agenda in order to provide notice of the Board's proposed regulation.

Ms. Montgomery stated the Board reviews all comments. Once the Board is satisfied with the text of the regulations, staff will draft a preamble. She described the preamble as an explanatory document of the Board's proposed regulation. She explained that the Office of General Counsel (OGC) determines the pertinent information for the preamble and includes an effective date, the background for the regulation, a description of the requirements and reasoning for the regulation, an analysis of fiscal impact, paperwork requirements, and then boilerplate details of the regulatory review process, and how interested parties can submit formal comments during the review process.

Ms. Montgomery stated counsel also has to complete a document called the Regulatory Analysis Form required by the Independent Regulatory Review Commission under the Regulatory Review Act, which contains what the Independent Regulatory Review Commission considers to be pertinent information for consideration in determining whether the regulation is in the public's interest.

Ms. Montgomery addressed pre-publication review, where the regulation is reviewed by regulatory counsel and the Policy Office to assure appropriate statutory authority, whether the regulation is consistent with the legislative intent and conforms to the Legislative Reference Bureau of Style Manual.

Ms. Montgomery stated after the draft is finished with internal review, the regulation goes to the Office of General Counsel and Governor Wolf's Office of the Budget and Office of Policy and Planning. She explained that the Office of the Budget does a fiscal note for all regulatory actions of the administrative agencies and then the Office of Policy and Planning reviews the same to make sure the regulation is in the public's interest and the cost reasonably relates to the benefits.

Ms. Montgomery noted Executive Order 1996-1

again, where it states no agency shall proceed with a proposed final or final-omitted regulation until General Counsel, Secretary of Budget, and the Policy Director have informed the agency that the regulation is consistent with the regulatory principles and overall policies of the administration. She mentioned that the regulation then goes under the Commonwealth Attorneys Act to the Office of Attorney General, where there is a 30-day time limit.

Ms. Montgomery explained a process called tolling, where OAG can stop the 30-day review period if there are any questions or objections. The regulation would then be sent back to the agency for a resolution.

Ms. Montgomery stated, once the Office of
Attorney General has approved the regulation, it goes
back to the agency for a process called delivery,
which is under the Regulatory Review Act and the
regulations of the Independent Regulatory Review
Commission. She stated the regulation is then
delivered personally by staff to the Legislative
Committees: House Professional Licensure Committee,
the Senate Consumer Protection & Professional
Licensure Committee, Independent Regulatory Review
Commission, and the Legislative Reference Bureau on

the same day.

Ms. Montgomery addressed a new electronic delivery process that will be moved out to other agencies if successful.

Ms. Montgomery explained, once the regulation goes through those entities, it is published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin for a 30-day public comment period. She mentioned the Commonwealth Documents Law that requires all agencies to publish and note its intention to promulgate regulations in the Pennsylvania Bulletin.

Ms. Montgomery addressed the review by IRRC under the Regulatory Review Act, which was enacted in 1982 to address a concern by the legislature that executive agencies were promulgating a law out of regulations and to confirm an effective review. It created the Independent Regulatory Review Commission.

Ms. Montgomery noted that the House and Senate Committees have an opportunity to review and convey their comments up until delivery of the final-form rulemaking.

Ms. Montgomery noted that the regulation would then be reviewed by the Independent Regulatory Review Commission, where it is published about 10 days later with a 30-day public comment period and 30 days until

IRRC's comments, which is a 70-day process once it is delivered. She stated the regulation will be deemed approved by IRRC if they do not comment.

Ms. Montgomery noted the Board is required by law to review all of the comments. She mentioned the Board is required to do either a separate comment response document or incorporate the summary of the comments and the Board's response in the preamble when preparing the final-form rulemaking. She noted the importance of the Board to not enlarge the purpose when making modifications to the final-form rulemaking of the original rulemaking or the Board will have to publish the regulation as proposed again.

Ms. Montgomery noted that once the Board has made all of its changes, counsel has updated the preamble with the comments and response, and updated the Regulatory Analysis Form with current data, the regulation again goes through agency review through the Office of Chief Counsel, Office of General Counsel, Office of the Budget, and Office of Policy and Planning the second time. She mentioned that all Boards must deliver the regulations within two years of the close of public comment period.

Ms. Montgomery stated, after the final-form regulation is delivered, IRRC may not take action for

at least 20 days to allow the committees to review the regulations. If the committees take no action up to 24 hours before IRRC meets, then the regulation is deemed to be approved.

Ms. Montgomery stated IRRC has until its next scheduled public meeting, which is no less than 30 days from the day of its delivery to take action. She mentioned it is deemed the commission approved the regulation if they do not act. She noted it is walked to the Office of Attorney General, where the Attorney General has 30 days to complete a review under the Commonwealth Attorneys Act if the commission approves it.

Ms. Montgomery noted the Board can either withdraw the regulation, submit the regulation with revisions that respond to IRRC's disapproval order, or resubmit unchanged if IRRC disapproves.

Ms. Montgomery stated, after the regulation is approved, it goes to the Attorney General for approval, the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in the Pennsylvania Bulletin, and is effective upon publication.

Ms. Montgomery mentioned that the Commonwealth Documents Law does have a provision stating the proposed rulemaking phase can be eliminated but only

in very limited circumstances.

Ms. Montgomery discussed sine die, which is the final adjournment of a two-year legislative session. She explained that once the legislature adjourns at the end of a session, there are no committees. She stated proposed regulations may be delivered to the Legislative Reference Bureau and the Independent Regulatory Review Commission with time-sensitive regulations, which takes public comment and IRRC's comments out of the way but would still have to wait until legislature reconvenes.

Ms. Montgomery stated the committees are designated, and that designation is published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin before it can be delivered to the committees for review, where it is reviewed for at least 20 days. She noted final regulations may not be delivered during sine die adjournment at all.

Ms. Montgomery provided an overview of the process when legislation adjourns early.]
