Wallin, Teacher, Professional Member, Chair, called the meeting to order at 9:06 a.m. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited. Roll call 10 was taken. 11 Kathryn Waters, Deputy Commissioner of Professional and Occupational Affairs, was not present 12 13 at the commencement of the meeting. 14 15 Report of Prosecutorial Division [Timothy Smith, Esquire, Board Prosecution Liaison, 16 17 reported on a Consent Agreement for File No. 16-45-02331.] 18 * * * 19 20 [Caroline Bailey, Esquire, Board Prosecution, reported 21 on a Consent Agreement for File No. 22 15-45-11276.] 2.3 24 Appointment 25 [Gerard McAvey, Director of Marketing and Training,

Milady, addressed the Board with regard to hybrid and blended learning for the cosmetology curriculum in the State of Pennsylvania. He noted Milady as the number one curriculum provider of beauty and wellness education in the United States. Mr. McAvey provided a history of his professional background.

- 18 Ms. O'Malley also clarified that there was a
- 19 notation in his appeal that there was an error in the
- 20 provisional denial in that the square footage being
- 21 noted as a deficiency was a clerical error, and that
- 22 there is no square footage deficiency. Ms. O'Malley
- 23 noted the only issue today was the request for a
- 24 | lavatory variance.
- 25 Mr. Muhammed discussed the lavatory variance as

follows:

2 [REQUESTED VERBATIM]

MR. MUHAMMED:

Miracle Eyebrows has already one store located in the Robinson Mall, and that's a land store. In order to keep up the store, the mall requested us to open up a second location, and they provided a kiosk, to open up a kiosk in the upper level next to Sears.

Actually, the store is opposite
the Food Court, and the lavatory
actually is located in the Food Court
area. So even me operating the store,
the people can easily walk into the
lavatory, and it is not even less than
50 square feet --- I mean, 50 square
foot distance.

Unfortunately, there is no required distance provided in any of the laws as to how much is going to be distance if I'm applying for a lavatory variance. So we are here to find out what should be the required distance between the store and the lavatory.

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10 MS. O'MALLEY: 1 2 Do you guys have any questions? 3 MR. MUHAMMED: In the denial, it is stated that this is 4 5 public area but anybody can see the 6 lavatory by standing in front of the 7 kiosk. MS. O'MALLEY: 9 So the one question that I have for 10 you, while the Board members look over 11 your application, is that in your 12 original application, it says that the total distance between the salon and 13 14 the lavatory in feet and inches is 180 15 feet. MR. MUHAMMED: 16 17 That is an error, actually, because we are located in front of the Food Court. 18 19 MS. O'MALEY: 20 Okay. 21 MR. MUHAMMED: 22 Between the food court and us, there is 2.3 a gap in between. There is a hallway 2.4 area and a corridor and open area so 25 people can see the downstairs. That is

why he mentioned that right, left, 1 2 right, left, pretty much like that. 3 But if you simply --- I mean, I have 4 the picture also with me. I went 5 yesterday also physically to see all 6 that for distance. In fact, we can see the lavatory by standing in front of the store 9 inside. It's not even more than 50 10 feet. 11 MS. O'MALLEY: 12 So are you saying that the visual 13 distance from your facility to the bathroom is 50 feet ---14 15 MR. MUHAMMED: Yes, less than 50 feet. 16 17 MS. O'MALLEY: 18 --- or are you saying that you 19 physically walked that distance? 20 MR. MUHAMMED: 21 Actually, people can still walk 22 straight, but the problem is in between 2.3 the store, there's an open space, which 2.4 is ---. So if you walk straight, then 25 you have to make the left because of the Food Court. If you don't want use of
the Food Court area, then you have to go
left and right. That's what it is.

MS. O'MALLEY:

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Does anyone else have any questions?

MR. MUHAMMED:

The problem is if you don't get the --
I mean, we are willing to relocating.

The space is the problem. The lavatory is the problem. We agreed to relocate the store also. Unfortunately, there is no rule stating how much should be the distance between the lavatory and the store. It's our plan for variance request.

request.

So we were unable to figure it out, what should be the exact distance between the lavatory and the store. If we are unable to open this location, then we'll be losing the --- our main location which is located in the same mall. Because now the malls are requiring to open up a second location unless --- I mean, it's a business --- it's a part of business, and we have

been experiencing same issues at multiple locations. Unless we open the second location, we are facing to lose our first location.

We have around 50 locations across the country so far, and Pennsylvania, we have four locations. It would be really great if you can approve our application. And we agree to follow the --- any guidelines according to the Board.

12 MS. O'MALLEY:

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So the only diagram that I see that was submitted with your amended appeal is this one. I don't know if you could see it from this far away, but this document doesn't actually have any distance measurements on it.

19 MR. MUHAMMED:

No, no. I just brought the pictures to show exactly how it actually looks like. If you can see that --- if you look at this two --- the square box?

24 MS. O'MALLEY:

Uh-huh, (yes).

14 1 MR. MUHAMMED: 2 That's what --- you make a left, make a 3 right, and make a left. If you go straight, you can straight walk into the 4 5 bathroom, the toilet. 6 MS. O'MALLEY: And if you go straight, you're saying 8 that that's ---? 9 MR. MUHAMMED: 10 It's actually in between the China Max 11 and Auntie Anne's. You can see there 12 is a space in between. MS. O'MALLEY: 13 14 Right. 15 MR. MUHAMMED: 16 Because that is a bathroom right there. 17 If you walk straight --- if you can 18 look at the picture which I provided, 19 you can see if you keep walking 20 straight, it can be there. That's not 21 even less than 50 square feet. 22 MS. O'MALLEY: 2.3 Do any of the Board members have any 24 questions? 25 MR. MUHAMMED:

One more thing I would like to add, actually, we are not providing any other service other than the eyebrow threading. I see now the State of Pennsylvania has a very strict rule with respect to eyebrow threadings just to get a license. Most of the states in the United States doesn't require license for eyebrow threading and doesn't require any particular rule, which is applicable to aesthetics also.

Recently, Ohio changed the rule, and Ohio doesn't require anymore aesthetic license. Ohio introduced a new permit for eyebrow threading. Kentucky introduced the same thing, and Texas more recently ruled out the license for the eyebrow threading.

New York also introduced a new license for eyebrow threading. Florida also has the same rule and Connecticut doesn't require.

Do you guys have any questions or comments? Okay, seeing none, then the

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Board will deliberate this matter when 1 2 they go into Executive Session, and 3 they will vote on it when they come 4 out. You are welcome to stay, or you 5 are welcome to give me a call later 6 this afternoon between --- probably near 4:00, because I think this is going to take a little while today. - 25 MR. BOYD:

Good morning everyone. My name is Erin Boyd, and I'm here before you today concerning my amended application for licensure for Whirligig Salon Application No. 3532500.

First of all, let me thank you for considering my application and for the chance to appear before you today. I was previously here on May 1st when you initially considered my application for a space variance, and I appreciate the opportunity to speak to you today and to address the concerns that were raised with my original application.

As you will recall, the Board declined to approve my initial application for a space variance as the proposed salon measured 150 square feet, which was 30 square feet less than the 180 square feet required for a one-licensee salon.

As the counsel to the Board, Ms.

O'Malley stated in her letter of May that
it was the Board's assessment that the
proposed facility does not have

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sufficient floor space to properly install the equipment with regard to the health and safety of patrons of the salon.

To remedy this shortcoming of my initial plan, I have added to my lease an additional supply closet measuring 39 square feet located in the basement of the building. This brings the total area to 189 square feet. I am providing you with an architectural print thoroughly detailing the floor plan.

The additional space of the supply closet will allow me to better organize the sink closet of the salon as well as to free up space in the main room of the salon. Although the supply closet is not contiguous with the main space of the salon, I have direct access to it, and it is for my exclusive use.

Included in the documents provided to you today is a copy of the addendum to my lease reflecting the addition of the supply closet. With this additional space, I have carefully reviewed the

overall layout of the salon in light of the Pa. Code Section 7.71, which lists the required equipment and supplies for a salon.

I have accounted for each of the requirements on the architectural plan, where you will find notes specifying the placement of each item. The drawing allows --- I'm sorry, the drawing also gives detailed measurements of the equipment and its positioning and space.

As it happens, I'd ordered chairs and a shampoo sink for the salon prior to the last Board meeting, and they've arrived since then. This has allowed me to lock them up in the main room, as you can see in the photos I am providing with you --- for you.

To further ensure that this is a workable plan with sufficient space, I have also consulted with an architect. He visited the space with the equipment in place and also reviewed the drawings that have been issued today. The plan met with his approval, and in his words,

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he is confident that the salon, while intimate, will be functionally sound for the proposed use and occupancy. I have provided you with a copy of this letter.

It is my sincere opinion that you have good reason to approve this application, and that is because I believe that this process of application and review has led me to --- has led to a thoroughly satisfactory plan, one that is well-organized and safe.

The careful consideration of the specific equipment requirements and the layout of the salon assured me that this salon will function very well for both client and stylist, and it's essential to me that my clients be comfortable and safe. I'm absolutely certain with this plan I will be able to provide my clients with the attention and care that initially led me to want to open my own salon. I hope that you will arrive at the same opinion.

If anyone has any questions, please allow me the opportunity to
