3 [Ariel O'Malley, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted items

4 for discussion that included the public health dental

5 | hygiene practitioner (PHDHP) proposed regulation, two

6 proposed adjudications and orders, the May 2019

Legislative Report, and correspondence.

Ms. O'Malley addressed public health dental hygiene practitioners, mentioning additional comments to be placed on the July agenda. She stated the Board cannot move forward with the regulation until comments are received from the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC). She requested the Board review the comments received thus far and provide commentaries to for the next phase.

Ms. O'Malley noted support of the regulation to address the needs of underserved patients. She noted a concern regarding the scope of practice from those not supporting the regulation and those who do not think it should be expanded into physicians' offices.

Ms. O'Malley stated the Pennsylvania Academy of General Dentistry suggested creating a uniform referral form. She also noted concerns regarding liability, suggestions to restrict physician sites to the areas of shortages, and suggestions to create

1 collaborative agreements filed with the Board related 2 to oversight of the individual.

Ms. O'Malley emphasized that the regulation would allow for practice in any physicians' office and would include all practice groups.

Dr. Casey suggested a more detailed definition as to where the need is necessary.

Dr. Seid mentioned certificate-of-need programs in other states, where procedures and matters in the context of shortages are considered. She noted Pennsylvania has identified dental shortage areas and needs to utilize that in the regulation.

Ms. O'Malley noted complaints where the design designates areas of shortages and many complain that that there is not really a shortage in those areas.

Dr. Seid discussed dental shortages in areas where no health/dental providers exist within a reasonable distance and insurance access issues. She also mentioned the Health Care Facilities Act and Workforce Report.

Dr. Lugo discussed areas where it would be difficult to recruit people to serve in the public sector and in certain geographic areas, which should be the focus through either a certificate-of-needs program or collaborative agreements that would define

the practice of someone who is not a dentist.

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Dr. Jaspan commented that a certificate-of-needs program cannot be based totally on mileage, and since there is a classification of public health dental hygienists with those duties outlined, this is just an extension of that, allowing them to practice in a different setting.

Ms. Murray agreed with addressing shortage areas but is also concern with care overall, noting that the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) and Head Start encourage a dental visit at age 1. She feels that dental hygienists could be the dental navigator hired by a practice to provide the oral health assessment, screening, and have a conversation with that family. She noted about 900 public health hygienists who pay malpractice and license fees but are not practicing as a public health provider.

Dr. Seid did not think physicians would be excited about this from a physician's point of view and agreed with the Pennsylvania Medical Society with the need to delineate this issue more.

Dr. Funari agreed that it needs to be targeted to areas that need to be identified and reevaluated on a yearly basis based on what is being done and new demands.

Dr. Funari addressed his involvement in charitable work with Give Kids a Smile and MOM-n-PA. He discussed conversations with friends in family practice, PAs, and nurse practitioners regarding dental professional coming to their medical offices.

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Dr. Funari commented that physicians would have to sublet space for this to work properly, because physicians would not want to be responsible for acquiring and maintaining equipment or liability issues and would not want to take somebody into their office who is not an independent practitioner.

Dr. Sullivan mentioned the importance of referring these patients to the proper dentists who accept low-income individuals and making it attractive to dentists to want to accept reimbursement.

Dr. Lugo noted his work as the City of
Philadelphia Department of Public Health Director for
10 years and the inability to find a dental hygienist
to work in the city clinics. He noted the focus to be
in areas that are not reimbursable and the people who
go to MOM-n-PA, which is a reason to be very clear to
allow these sites access to care for the public health
dental hygienists to provide that service to meet a
need in Pennsylvania.

Ms. Murray referred to a 2018 mandate allowing

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dental hygienists in the state to undergo the
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   credentialing process, giving hygienists the ability
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   to bill for services. She stated dental hygienists
   would be able to address individual needs.

  - Chairperson Erhard noted discussions with corporations several years ago assuring the Board that the practicing dentist would not be overly influenced and would never be asked to do anything that they did not think was appropriate. He also noted strenuous financial pressures on recent graduates to acquiesce to some of those things.
  - Dr. Jaspan addressed upselling and enabling financing resulting in higher bills for patients, where the dentist has to abide by that corporate philosophy of business.

Ms. Hughes noted this to be criminal fraud that is being perpetrated on the health care consumer.

These matters should referred to the Office of the Attorney General.

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Dr. Seid noted similar issues with urgent care, where you have an entity that is not controlled by the physicians who are providing care and the corporate entity is putting pressure on the individual practitioner.

Dr. Seid stated it is an entity that really has no place in regulation because there is no place to regulate what a corporation does, only the individual dentist. She feels that something needs to be done with the entity that drives care and owns and hires dentists.

Chairperson Erhard stated the Pennsylvania Dental Association (PDA), the Pennsylvania Academy of General Dentistry, and Pennsylvania Academy of Pediatric Dentistry have the responsibility to inform their members what they are taking on when they sign these contracts.

Ms. Burns addressed correspondence from Dr. James
L. Robbins, D.M.D., of the Pennsylvania Society of
Oral & Maxillofacial Surgeons (PSOMS), referencing
current regulations requiring completion of two years

- in a postgraduate program for advanced training in
