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Ms. DeLaurentis discussed the Office of General Counsel's Mediation Program, which is free of charge. She stated the consent agreements will reflect whether the case was resolved through mediation.

Ms. DeLaurentis addressed the Pennsylvania

Justice Network (JNET), where the prosecution division receives an alert when licensees from all of the Boards and Commissions are charged with a crime.

Dr. Lugo commented that, being in the leadership role and following the events of the morning, the communication between the law and ethics curriculum is a matter for the institutions. It is a powerful impactful touchpoint where individuals at an early point can understand the repercussions of not following ethics and laws. He commended both the professor and Paul Jarabeck for their service to the profession and the people of Pennsylvania.

10 Regulatory Committee's meeting on July 18, 2018. All

11 committee members were present, including Board

12 members and the Chair. The committee focused on the

13 proposal rulemaking comments and questions regarding

14 the public health dental hygiene practice sites.

15 There was a representation of the dental profession,

16 including written comments by professional

17 associations such as the Pennsylvania Dental

18 Association, the Pennsylvania Dental Hygienists'

19 Association, the Pennsylvania Society of Oral &

20 Maxillofacial Surgeons, as well as comments from the

public. Comments were also received from the

22 | Independent Regulatory Review Commission, including

23 comments submitted by the House Professional Licensure

24 | Committee. The committee was urged to consider mental

25 | health establishments, birth centers, and satellite

- 1 locations under the Medical Board regulations and
- 2 provided guidance to counsel for the final language.
- 3 In addition, the supervisory work rules and the
- 4 standards to be established in collaboration with the
- 5 profession that would alleviate many of the Boards and
- 6 public comments were discussed.
- 7 The committee requests that certain provisions be
- 8 removed for further clarification and exploration to
- 9 ensure that the oral health and general wellness of
- 10 | all Pennsylvanians are protected without creating a
- 11 two-tier system of comprehensive care and
- 12 accountability. The Chair thanked every member for
- 13 their participation in this critical matter and
- 14 requested two additional meetings for further
- 15 clarification of the language.
- 16 Counsel will explore the definitions of
- 17 residence. The Board will need to consider revising
- 18 the physician's office language in order to define the
- 19 relationship between PHDH practitioners and the
- 20 physicians when services are provided in a physician's
- 21 office. Ms. Wucinski reiterated the Committee's
- 22 discussion regarding the physician's office and home
- 23 care residence language. Dr. Seid referred to the
- 24 | Health Care Facilities Act.
- 25 Ms. Wucinski will continue drafting the final

rulemaking. After a decision by the Board regarding the residence, the final rulemaking would be put on the agenda for a vote.

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Dr. Sullivan noted discussion regarding the requirements of a public health dental hygienist, that is 3600 hours of time, which may need to be supplemented with additional education. Ms. Wucinski explained the scope of practice for dental hygienists practicing in a residence could be changed in a separate regulation. Chairperson Erhard discussed changes based on training, qualifications, and equipment that the Board may deem essential for the normal scope of practice in these residences.

Dr. Lugo discussed clarifying the supervisory role of a dentist in a situation where a patient is mildly or more than mildly systemically compromised. Dr. Seid agreed with drafting a separate regulation.

Ms. Wucinski will be addressing in the final rulemaking all the comments received and any changes as recommended by the Committee. Ms. Fowler noted the Board's agreement to delete the home health residence section. Ms. Wucinski referred to the section to be deleted as (3)(iii) that states, for purposes of this section, services provided by a health care facility to patients in their places of residence or other

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independent living environment are included as

LUGO: 5 That is a very good assumption. 6 why this bill needs a little work in defining that because in the regulations for the general dental hygienist that we 9 regularly supervise, that is stipulated 10 there from mildly systemic and the

requirements that exists for supervision for that. This language does not

include that. It would lead me to think

that you can treat a patient out there

if you are unsupervised.

That is the language I think is critical to include because even though 10 years ago this was published and Dr. Reitz was Chair of the Board, stipulated this as to the intent of the Board.

Now, that language is not clear and seems to leave it open without supervision.

DR. MATTA:

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There seems to be a conflict with that.

1 DR. LUGO:

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2 That is why, within this, at least we could include or explore language that does tie in the requirement for supervision if you are doing invasive care, treating a mouth of a systemically compromised patient. I think it is critical to avoid creating a two-tier system in the state of Pennsylvania.

10 DR. MATTA:

> For clarification, is that going to be addressed in this regulation or the future?

DR. LUGO: 14

> I do not think this might address it even though some of the standards can be created around some of this. applies to any patient regardless of the facility. It is the full assumption of supervision for invasive care. It needs to be addressed in this final regulation; otherwise, it is unacceptable to have a provider be exempt from treating a systemically compromised patient when the educational

level is not adequate for that level we expect of somebody treating at the top of the license.

DR. JASPAN:

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My understanding is that the present public health hygienists can practice under general supervision in various facilities, nursing homes and alike. Those patients that they are already seeing under the present regulations, because they are in these kind of facilities by definition a huge percentage of them, would not meet the classification we have in private offices of ASA I and ASA II.

By expanding this to several other locations, are we further jeopardizing the public because they are already doing this issues? To my knowledge, we have not had any issues of any public health hygienists having a medical problem even though they have been practicing in those facilities.

DR. SEID:

Are we planning to have a couple more

meetings about this?

DR. LUGO:

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That is where that proposal is from.

It's from the committee. Obviously,

these are the intricacies of language

that need to be included and this is the

time to do it; otherwise, we are going

to be dealing with cases later on in the

future, clarifying even the minimal

language so there is guidance that we

can provide now.

This is the only time we can provide guidance, not afterwards. This will be very clear for the people what the expectations are when you are treating. This is a daily thing. This will involve language based on insight from clinical providers understanding the necessity to protect the public.

We can have at least two more standing committee meetings to address this. We also have very good engagement with the profession and good communications at this point, so let's take advantage of that and prepare some
