3 * * * 1 State Registration Board for Professional 2 3 Engineers, Land Surveyors, and Geologists 4 July 10, 2019 * * * 5 6 The regularly scheduled meeting of the State 7 Registration Board for Professional Engineers, Land Surveyors, and Geologists was held on Wednesday, July 8 10, 2019. Francis J. Stanton Jr., PE, President, 9 10 called the meeting to order at 9:30 a.m. K. Kalonji 11 Johnson, Acting Commissioner, Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs, was not present at the 12 commencement of the meeting. 13 14 * * * Introduction of Board Members 15 16 [President Stanton requested the introduction of Board 17 members.] * * * 18 19 Approval of minutes of the March 13, 2019 meeting 20 PRESIDENT STANTON: 21 I'd like to review the minutes from 22 March 13, 2019. Are there any comments 23 on the minutes? If none, do we have a 24 motion for approval? 25 MR. SZALANKIEWICZ:

4 I make a motion for approval. 1 2 MR. KUDLAWIEC: 3 Second. 4 PRESIDENT STANTON: 5 Any discussion? All in favor, say aye. 6 Against? Any abstentions? 7 [The motion carried unanimously.] * * * 8 9 Introduction of Audience 10 [President Stanton asked members of the public to 11 identify themselves.] * * * 12 13 Appointment - Prosecution Division Presentation 14 [Carolyn A. DeLaurentis, Esquire, Deputy Chief 15 Counsel, Prosecution Division, introduced herself and provided a brief summary of her professional 16 17 background. She also introduced Ray Michalowski, 18 Esquire, Senior Prosecutor. 19 Ms. DeLaurentis provided information for the 20 Pennsylvania State Registration Board for Professional Engineers, Land Surveyors, and Geologists for FY 21 22 2018-2019, noting that 90 cases had been opened with 23 83 open cases as of July 1, 2019. She also provided 2.4 information regarding enforcement statistics. 25 Ms. DeLaurentis noted 69 immediate temporary

1 suspensions, in general, for the prosecution division 2 in FY 2018-2019 with 11,359 open cases as of July 1, 3 2019. She mentioned the last fiscal period, noting 4 that 14,030 cases were opened, which was up from 5 12,604 the year before. She noted that 13,270 cases 6 were closed last year.

7 Ms. DeLaurentis reviewed the Office of General
8 Counsel's Mediation Program, which is free of charge.
9 She stated consent agreements will reflect whether the
10 case was resolved through mediation.

11 Ms. DeLaurentis addressed the Pennsylvania Justice Network (JNET), where the prosecution division 12 13 receives an alert upon the charge of a crime to any licensee from all of the Boards and Commissions. 14 She 15 noted that two administrative assistants process those 16 to identify arrests that are relevant to each Board.] * * * 17 18 [K. Kalonji Johnson, Acting Commissioner, Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs, entered the 19 20 meeting at 9:41 a.m.] 21 * * * 22 [Ray Michalowski, Esquire, Senior Prosecutor, 23 addressed the JNET system, stating that the Board is 24 not generating much volume with only three or four

25 hits that led to serious charges being filed. He

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noted that most of the complaints were with land
 surveying.

Mr. Michalowski updated the Board regarding the complaint process starting with the administrative process of opening a complaint in the Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS). He stated the prosecution team reviews and prioritizes the cases and can close some cases or direct them to the Bureau of Enforcement and Investigation.

Mr. Michalowski also noted a fair number of document cases that can be criminal cases or reciprocal cases where only documentation is gathered, which has streamlined the process.

Ms. DeLaurentis commented that there are six administrative assistants who review all of those and two who just do JNET to prioritize them to Mr. Michalowski's team.

18 Mr. Michalowski noted that the Board gets a number of unlicensed practice cases, application 19 20 cases, and disciplinary cases with the vast majority 21 of consumer complaints concerning land surveyors. 22 Mr. Michalowski addressed continuing education 23 violations, noting that the Board does not have many 24 because their continuing education is licensee-25 friendly, and violations are often just a lack of

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1 credits or someone ready to retire.

2 Mr. Michalowski applauded the Board because the 3 Board gives people the ability to take the courses in 4 a manner that fits their lifestyle and their work 5 habits.

President Stanton questioned how far back JNET 6 7 can go and how many continuing education audits are performed. Mr. Michalowski explained that JNET will 8 put out a notification the day after a filing but 9 10 cannot go back years. He stated Ms. Bronshtein and her staff perform the audits and move them to the 11 Professional Compliance Office when they believe 12 13 somebody is noncompliant. He stated the original percentage would be determined by the Board and Board 14 15 administrator.

16 Mr. Tesler requested documentation of cases in 17 the future.

18 Ms. DeLaurentis mentioned that she can provide 19 annual reports but to contact counsel or the 20 prosecution liaison for anything else.

21 Mr. Michalowski commented that new reports are 22 still being developed in PALS to monitor case status, 23 and the Board will be seeing those within the next 24 year.]

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[K. Kalonji Johnson, Acting Commissioner, Bureau of 1 2 Professional and Occupational Affairs, exited the 3 meeting at 10:01 a.m.] * * * 4 5 Acknowledge Public 6 [Michael F. Brinkash, PLS, noted the written report 7 from John G. Fuehrer II, PE, PLS, regarding the PA state-specific exam.] 8 * * * 9 10 Report of Board President - No Report * * * 11 Report of Board Members 12 13 [Theodore Tesler, PG, addressed his attendance at the 14 National Association of State Boards of Geology 15 (ASBOG) Council of Examiners Meeting in Nashua, New Hampshire last April. He informed the Board that 16 17 there were 352 Practice of Geology (PG) Examination 18 applicants with an average score of 62%. He also 19 noted 841 test takers for the Fundamentals of Geology 20 Examination. Mr. Brinkash, noted his attendance at the 21 22 National Council of Examiners for Engineering and 23 Surveying (NCEES) Meeting. He noted questioning at 24 the meeting what services the Board is receiving from 25 the Colonial States Boards of Surveyor Registration.

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He was told it is to keep the update of the science and mapping exam in place because NCEES does not have that exam. He mentioned talk of NCEES developing that exam and interaction between NCEES and the Colonial States Boards of Surveyor Registration to do that.

Mr. Brinkash stated the Colonial States Boards of 6 7 Surveyor Registration did administer and create numerous state exam questions for the colonial states, 8 noting that the original 13 colonies had their own 9 10 exam and reciprocity was by application only, as 11 opposed to now where every state-specific exam must be taken. He noted discussion about breaking the 12 13 barriers down for the surveyors to get licensing in 14 other states by reciprocity.

15 Mr. Brinkash noted the Annual National Council of 16 Examiners for Engineering and Surveying Meeting in 17 Washington, D.C., August 14-17. He noted a number of 18 proposals put forth to play out at the national meeting. He stated the proposals do not greatly 19 20 affect the Board primarily due to the voting status of members, retired members, emeritus members, and 21 22 committees they are allowed to serve.

23 Chair Stanton mentioned that past president David 24 Widmer will be getting an award. Mr. Brinkash stated 25 David Widmer will be receiving the Dedicated Service

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Award, which is a highly prestigious national award 1 2 presented by NCEES for dedication to the organization 3 and contributions by individuals.] * * * 4 5 Report of Acting Commissioner - No Report * * * 6 Report of Board Administrator 7 [Jeannie Bronshtein, Board Administrator, addressed 8 the difficulty getting the new licensing system to 9 10 function with the audits, which will have to be performed manually. Ms. Bronshtein noted that audits 11 usually consist of around 2.5% of randomly selected 12 13 licensees but will be less this year because it is 14 going to run into renewals. 15 Ms. Bronshtein announced that the system should 16 be opened for license renewals by the end of the 17 month. Ms. Bronshtein noted communication with Pearson 18 VUE to update the state-specific exam. She commented 19 20 that Pearson VUE is present today to meet with the new commissioner and would like to speak with them in 21 22 hopes of moving the process along. 23 Mr. Szalankiewicz questioned the user-friendly 24 status regarding the renewal process. 25 Ms. Bronshtein commented that the process should

work better because of it being the second renewal in 1 2 PALS and changes in development to make sure 3 everything is working properly.] * * * 4 5 Report of Board Prosecution Division 6 [Robert B. Armour, Esquire, Board Prosecution Liaison, 7 introduced Glenn Masser as a new prosecuting attorney for the Board. 8 Mr. Masser provided a brief summary of his 9 10 professional background. 11 Mr. Armour presented the presented the Consent Agreements for File No. 18-47-03023 and Case Nos. 15-12 13 47-02216 & 17-47-03030. Mr. Armour addressed the Office of General 14 15 Counsel Mediation Program, noting that OGC has increased their recommendation for its use. He stated 16 17 mediators that the Commonwealth uses have been trained 18 and gone through a program at the Dickinson School of Law or equivalent type of program. He explained that 19 20 there is no cost to either party because the 21 Commonwealth picks that up. He noted that it has been 22 a successful program and is completely voluntary. Не 23 mentioned that time, cost, and avoiding appeals are 24 benefits of the program. 25 Mr. Armour mentioned that the Board will always

have the opportunity to approve or reject consent 1 2 agreements, and each consent agreement will have a 3 statement noting the mediated process and provide the date of the mediation.] 4 * * * 5 6 Report of Board Counsel 7 [C. William Fritz II, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted an Adjudication and Order and a few other items for 8 discussion during executive session.] 9 * * * 10 Report of Regulatory Counsel 11 [C. William Fritz II, Esquire, Board Counsel, 12 addressed Act 41 of 2019 signed by Governor Wolf on 13 14 July 1, 2019, directing all Boards to make licensure 15 by endorsement available. Mr. Fritz stated the only difference is this would allow applicants to be 16 17 provided with a provisional license for a set period 18 of time to make up whatever the applicant is lacking 19 in qualifications. 20 Mr. Fritz noted the need to work on regulations for Act 41 of 2019. He stated once the regulation is 21 22 drafted, it will come to the Board for approval of the 23 language and they would be able to practice and be 24 given all of the capabilities of a licensed 25 professional engineer, land surveyor, or geologist.

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He stated those who do not meet the requirements after the set period would lose their license and could potentially be prosecuted depending on what they were doing after that period expired.

5 Mr. Fritz stated the language of the regulations 6 will come to the Board for review and should not take 7 the standard two-year period to get approved because 8 of being directed to get them done within a certain 9 period of time. He mentioned that language can be 10 found in House Bill 1172 for Act 41 of 2019.

Mr. Fritz stated the digital seal regulation was still with regulatory counsel and has been identified as one of the more important regulations that the administration wants done.

Mr. Fritz noted no further information on the home inspector legislative analysis submitted to OGC in April.

18 Mr. Fritz offered to provide a case list on the19 agenda every month.

20 Chair Stanton requested Mr. Tesler update the 21 Board regarding the home inspection bill and anything 22 on the legislative action on the engineer's act. 23 Mr. Tesler noted no information on home 24 inspectors. He mentioned ongoing negotiations with 25 interested parties regarding House Bill 1106, hoping

to get it introduced when the legislature returns in 1 2 the fall.] * * * 3 4 [Pursuant to Section 708(a)(5) of the Sunshine Act, at 10:46 a.m. the Board entered into Executive Session 5 6 with C. William Fritz II, Esquire, Board Counsel, for 7 the purpose of conducting quasi-judicial deliberations on matters that are currently pending before the Board 8 as well as receiving advice of Counsel. 9 The Board 10 returned to open session at 11:47 a.m.] * * * 11 12 MOTIONS 13 MR. FRITZ: 14 The Board just met in executive session 15 and conducted quasi-judicial 16 deliberations on the following matters: The Board would entertain a motion 17 18 to approve the Consent Agreement at File 19 No. 18-47-03023. 20 MR. TESLER: 21 So moved. 22 MR. SZALANKIEWICZ: 23 Second. 24 PRESIDENT STANTON: 25 All in favor?

15 [The motion carried unanimously. That name is John P. 1 2 Stoppi Jr., PE.] 3 * * * 4 MR. FRITZ: 5 The Board would entertain a motion to 6 approve the Consent Agreement at Case 7 Nos. 15-47-02216 & 17-47-03030. 8 MR. TESLER: 9 So moved. 10 MR. SZALANKIEWICZ: 11 Second. PRESIDENT STANTON: 12 13 All in favor? Any opposed? [The motion carried unanimously. That name is Mark J. 14 15 Irani.] * * * 16 17 MR. FRITZ: The Board would entertain a motion to 18 19 approve the Adjudication and Order at 20 Case No. 18-47-005888. 21 MR. SZALANKIEWICZ: 22 I make the motion. 23 MR. BRINKASH: 24 Second. 25 PRESIDENT STANTON:

1 All in favor? Any opposed? Hearing 2 none. The motion passes. 3 [The motion carried unanimously. That name is James 4 A. Zientek.] * * * 5 Adjournment 6 7 PRESIDENT STANTON: 8 Motion to adjourn. 9 MR. KUDLAWIEC: 10 So moved. 11 MR.
