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3 \* \* \* 1 State Board of Funeral Directors 2 3 March 31, 2021 \* \* \* 4 5 [Pursuant to Section 708(a)(5) of the Sunshine Act, at 9:00 a.m. the Board entered into Executive Session 6 7 with Jaime D. Black, Esquire, Board Counsel, to have attorney-client consultation and for the purpose of 8 9 conducting quasi-judicial deliberations on the items on the agenda that are currently pending before the 10 Board and to receive advice of counsel. The Board 11 entered into public session at 10:30 a.m.] 12 \* \* \* 13 14 The regularly scheduled meeting of the State 15 Board of Funeral Directors was held on Wednesday, 16 March 31, 2021. William G. Harris, Chairman, 17 Professional Member, called the meeting to order at 18 10:30 a.m. \* \* \* 19 20 [Pledge of Allegiance] 21 [Chairman Harris requested the Pledge of Allegiance be 22 recited.] 23 \* \* \* 24 Roll Call 25 [Chairman Harris requested a roll call of Board

4 members.] 1 \* \* \* 2 3 [Jaime D. Black, Esquire, Board Counsel, announced 4 that the Board met in Executive Session prior to 5 public session. She also noted the meeting is being 6 recorded, and those who remain in the meeting are 7 consenting to being recorded.] \* \* \* 8 9 Approval of minutes of the February 18, 2021 10 CHAIRMAN HARRIS: 11 We need to approve the minutes of the 12 last meeting on February 18, 2021. 13 If you have had a chance to look at 14 it, I need to ask if there are any 15 changes or updates in those minutes. 16 If not, I would make a motion to 17 approve those minutes. Do we have a second? 18 19 MS. RODRIGUEZ: 20 I second. 21 CHAIRMAN HARRIS: 2.2 We have a motion and a second. All in 23 favor, signify by saying aye. We have 24 no opposition so that carries. 25 [The motion carried unanimously.]

5 \* \* \* 1 2 Report of Prosecutorial Division 3 [Timothy A. Fritsch, Esquire, Board Prosecution 4 Liaison, noted prosecution had nothing new to present 5 today but offered to answer questions from the Board.] \* \* \* 6 7 Report of Board Counsel 8 [Jaime D. Black, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted the 9 Board discussed items 7 and 8 in Executive Session.] \* \* \* 10 11 Miscellaneous MS. BLACK: 12 13 With regard to item 7, correspondence from Mr. James Eley, I believe the Board 14 15 would entertain a motion to deny Mr. Eley's request for an exemption from 16 17 licensure. MR. DUPREE: 18 19 I move to deny the request. 20 CHAIRMAN HARRIS: 21 Kenneth DuPree made a motion to deny 22 that. Is there a second on that motion? 23 MS. IMBURGIA: 24 I'll second. 25 CHAIRMAN HARRIS:

6 We have a motion and a second. All in 1 2 favor, signify by saying aye. Anybody 3 opposed? 4 [The motion carried unanimously.] \* \* \* 5 6 MS. BLACK: 7 Regarding item 8, the Board is directing the Board Administrator to send a letter 8 9 to request more information, so the 10 Board is tabling item 8 at this time. 11 CHAIRMAN HARRIS: 12 Do I hear a motion to table that until 13 we get further information? MS. RODRIGUEZ: 14 15 So moved. CHAIRMAN HARRIS: 16 17 Do we have a second? MS. KIRK: 18 I'll second. 19 20 CHAIRMAN HARRIS: 21 We have a motion and a second. All in 22 favor, signify by saying aye. Anybody 23 opposed? 24 [The motion carried. Kenneth DuPree recused himself 25 from deliberations and voting on the motion.]

\* \* \* 1 2 Report of Board Counsel (Continued) 3 [Jaime D. Black, Esquire, Board Counsel, updated the Board on the proposed rulemaking to amend § 13.11, 4 5 § 13.231, § 13.301-13.307, and § 13.401, and add § 13.308 and § 13.309 relating to child abuse 6 7 recognition and reporting concerning mandatory 8 training requirements, child abuse recognition, and 9 the reporting course approval process. 10 Ms. Black noted the regulation was published in 11 the PA Bulletin on March 13, 2021, and comments 12 received will be brought to the Board at the May meeting for discussion. 13 Ms. Black addressed Act 116 of 2020 that would 14 15 permit carryover of continuing education credits from 16 one biennial period to the next for only one renewal She noted the need for Board discussion of 17 period. 18 whether to amend its regulations to implement the 19 carryover provision or reject it. She mentioned one 20 Board that currently has the provision in its 21 regulations and decided to amend its regulations to 22 get rid of the carryover provision due to challenges 23 in its implementation and auditing the continuing 24 education (CE). She suggested the Board consider the 25 effect of stockpiling CEs when the goal is to be

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1 current with up-to-date information.

Mr. DuPree questioned whether there is a limit on the number of continuing education units (CEUs) carried over. Ms. Black explained that Act 116 does not put a limit on the number of CEs that could be stockpiled but could only be carried over for one renewal period.

8 Ms. Black noted that child abuse credits would 9 not be part of the carryover. She stated the Board 10 needs to consider whether or not this would help the 11 profession or make an impact at all, as well as to 12 take into consideration the Board administration's 13 ability to effectively implement this and process the 14 audit.

15 Chairman Harris requested input from Board members. He mentioned being against the carryover, 16 noting it to be burdensome on Board administration. 17 18 Ms. Hemler provided information regarding the application and audit process and time-consuming staff 19 20 responsibilities to manually download the CE to validate whether individuals comply, noting there was 21 22 no general system and the confirmation was performed 23 manually by the Board staff.

Ms. Kirk requested information regarding theconsequences of not providing accurate information.

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Ms. Black noted that the licensee could obtain credit for CEs that are not eligible for carryover. Ms. Black addressed the self-reporting violation, stating there were no accurate numbers because most of the professional boards do not have the provision. She stated it would be difficult to give a number if it were implemented.

8 Ms. Imburgia commented that there was an abundant 9 amount of new information for people to learn, 10 especially with COVID, and a wide variety of education 11 regarding how funerals were changing.

12 Mr. Michalowski mentioned that he is responsible for eight different boards, seven of which have 13 14 continuing education requirements, including one that 15 has the ability to carryover. He stated one of the differences between the Board's system and the system 16 17 that the disciplinary board uses for attorneys is 18 attorneys renew annually, not biennially, where the 19 Board could carry credits over for 4 years.

20 Mr. Michalowski commented that the Board's number 21 of credits is fairly low and makes it easier to comply 22 compared to other boards.

23 Mr. Michalowski stated the disciplinary board for 24 the attorneys do not conduct an audit every year and 25 was 100% in compliance. Issues are reported

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electronically by the providers, not with licensee 1 2 renewals. He noted that the provider is required to 3 provide documentation electronically with records 4 going back years and flags a shortage immediately. Mr. Michalowski mentioned that the only other way 5 6 to do the carryover other than Board staff would be 7 every time a licensee is short is to send their information to prosecution to investigate whether the 8 9 licensee actually did those hours or used them. He 10 stated that carryover makes sense for some boards, but 11 there were not many enforcement cases on continuing 12 education for the funeral profession. The population 13 is very compliant.] MS. BLACK: 14 15 We should do a vote on whether or not to 16 implement it or to reject it. Do you 17 want to do a roll call to see if there 18 is a majority? 19 CHATRMAN HARRTS: Let's do a roll call. 20 MS. BLACK: 21 2.2 Bill Harris, reject; Milian Rodriguez, 23 reject; Carmella Imburgia, reject; Ted 24 Stauffer, abstain; Scott Custead, 25 reject; Kenneth DuPree, implement;

11 Jennifer Kirk, reject; Francis McCusker, 1 2 reject. 3 [The motion carried. Theodore Stauffer abstained from 4 voting on the motion. The Board voted to reject.] \* \* \* 5 6 [Jaime D. Black, Esquire, Board Counsel, addressed 7 regulatory packets drafted in 2016 and previously approved by the Board. She referred to 16A-4828 8 9 regarding regulations concerning a supervisor, noting 10 the promulgated regulations previously approved by the 11 Board concerning the supervisor were somewhat 12 outdated. 13 Ms. Black stated the regulatory packet as proposed would amend this regulation to address 14 15 professional responsibility of a supervisor in the process of registering a supervisor, as well as to 16 17 better organize the relative regulations concerning a 18 supervisor, noting the annex had been provided for the 19 Board's review. 20 Mr. DuPree informed the Board that he had not 21 been able to see the packet because of technical 2.2 difficulties. 23 Chairman Harris explained that the Board already 24 approved updating the language to be more 25 understandable and current with the intent to approve

1 the language for other regulations and move it 2 forward.

Ms. Black stated the annex had gone through the process with the Board regarding drafting and revisions but questioned whether there was the need for any revisions or if the Board wanted to move forward.

8 Chairman Harris suggested tabling the regulation 9 until the next meeting for Mr. DuPree's review and to 10 make sure all Board members approved the new language. 11 He commented that it had not changed anything legally 12 and just provided a clarification of the supervisor's 13 responsibilities.

Ms. Black informed the Board that 16A-4828 and 15 16A-4830 would be combined since they are smaller 16 packets so that they could go through the regulatory 17 approval process at the same time.

18 Ms. Black addressed 16A-4830 regarding 19 establishment renewal and reactivation. She referred 20 to Section 8 of the Act, which generally permits 21 entities of various types, subject to appropriate 22 qualifications, to be licensed to operate a funeral 23 establishment. She noted section 10(a) of the Act 2.4 provides that all funeral directors' licenses expire 25 on February 1 of each even year, and the Board may

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1 later renew or reactivate a license that was not 2 timely renewed.

3 Ms. Black explained that the Board's regulations at § 13.231 direct the renewal and reactivation of an 4 5 individual funeral director license, but the Board's regulations do not specifically address renewal or 6 7 reactivation of an establishment license. She stated 16A-4823 proposes to amend regulations to address the 8 9 renewal and reactivation of a funeral establishment 10 license and is why the packet was being combined with 11 the other packet.

12 Ms. Black mentioned that it would be appropriate 13 for the Board to table it to review the annexes again 14 and address it at the next Board meeting.] 15 MS. BLACK: 16 Would the Board entertain a motion to 17 table regulatory items at item 4 to 18 discuss at a later meeting? 19 CHATRMAN HARRTS: 20 Do I hear a motion? 21 MS. KIRK: 2.2 So moved.

23 CHAIRMAN HARRIS:

24 Jennifer so moved. We need a second? 25 MR. DUPREE:

14 Second. 1 2 CHAIRMAN HARRIS: 3 We have a motion and a second. All in 4 favor, signify by saying aye. Does 5 anybody oppose? 6 [The motion carried unanimously.] \* \* \* 7 8 MS. BLACK: 9 I want to go back to item 3. We did the 10 roll call vote, but I think we need to do a formal vote with a motion and a 11 12 second. I believe the Board would entertain 13 14 a motion to reject the implementation of 15 Act 116 of 2020. 16 CHAIRMAN HARRIS: 17 I'll make that motion. Is there a second? 18 19 MS. RODRIGUEZ: 20 I second. 21 CHAIRMAN HARRIS: 22 We have a motion and a second. All in 23 favor, signify by saying aye. Opposed? 24 [The motion carried. Kenneth DuPree opposed the 25 motion.]

3	[Jaime D. Black, Esquire, Board Counsel, addressed
4	correspondence from the Pennsylvania Funeral Directors
5	Association (PFDA) requesting the Board discuss
6	amending Board regulation § 13.201 regarding
7	professional responsibilities to allow an individual
8	to sign their own authorization for cremation.
9	Ms. Black referred to § $13.201(7)$ , where the
10	responsibilities and duties of a licensed funeral
11	director in connection with a funeral includes
12	obtaining and maintaining written authorization from
13	the family of a deceased who is to be cremated.
14	Ms. Black stated the PFDA believes that amending
15	of this language to allow individuals to authorize
16	their own cremation would streamline the process at
17	the time of death and eliminate the need for a funeral
18	director to locate family members.
19	Mr. DuPree questioned whether allowing an
20	individual to authorize their own cremation would
21	require a witness who could attest to their
22	competency.
23	Ms. Black stated the Board would have the
24	discretion to amend the regulations with the addition
25	of that requirement.

Mr. DuPree questioned whether that would restrict 1 2 the surviving family from having a service prior to cremation. He also questioned whether a funeral 3 4 director could simply remove the person, do the 5 necessary paperwork, and just take them to the 6 crematory without the consent of the family if a 7 person signed their own cremation authorization. 8 Ms. Black offered to research the matter further. 9 Ms. Kirk commented that it was typical of a 10 Living Will to give authorization to declare the 11 individual's wishes when they can no longer make that 12 decision. It would make sense for an individual to be 13 able to make the decision of what happens to their 14 body. 15 Ms. Black commented that if the Board was 16 interested in amending the regulations to allow for 17 this that she would work on drafting the amendments 18 and proceed with the next step in the regulatory 19 process. 20 Mr. DuPree expressed a concern for legal

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21 ramifications, where somebody signs their 22 authorization to be cremated and the family says the 23 person had beginning stages of Alzheimer's when 24 signed, so now you have a cremated body and a family 25 with an attorney.

Ms. Black questioned whether the Board wanted to 1 conduct some research and not make a decision to amend 2 but to see review options. She also questioned 3 whether the Board would want to create an 4 5 authorization form that adds to the process.] 6 MS. BLACK: 7 I believe the Board would entertain a motion to conduct research regarding a 8 9 possible amendment to the Board 10 regulation § 13.201 and have further 11 discussions at a future meeting. 12 MS. RODRIGUEZ: I make the motion. 13 14 MS. KIRK: 15 I second. 16 CHAIRMAN HARRIS: We have a motion and a second. All in 17 18 favor, signify by saying aye. Is there 19 anybody opposed? 20 [The motion carried unanimously.] 21 \* \* \* 22 Report of Board Chairman 23 MS. BLACK: 24 I believe the Board would entertain a 25 motion to ratify the approval of the

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Temporary Supervisor Extension requested 1 2 by Donald Jones. 3 CHAIRMAN HARRIS: 4 Let's vote to ratify. Do I have a 5 motion? 6 MS. KIRK: 7 So moved. 8 CHAIRMAN HARRIS: 9 Do I have a second? MS. RODRIGUEZ: 10 11 I second. 12 CHAIRMAN HARRIS: We have a motion and a second. All in 13 14 favor to ratify, signify by saying aye. 15 Anybody opposed? 16 [The motion carried unanimously.] \* \* \* 17 18 Report of Commissioner - No Report 19 [Theodore Stauffer, Executive Secretary, Bureau of 20 Professional and Occupational Affairs, on behalf of K. 21 Kalonji Johnson, Commissioner, did not have an 22 official report but offered to take any questions or 23 concerns to the Commissioner.] \* \* \* 24 25 [William G. Harris, Chairman, Professional Member,

19 thanked everyone for their cooperation and commended 1 2 Ms. Black and Ms. Hemler.] \* \* \* 3 4 Report of Acting Board Administrator 5 [Kristel Hennessy Hemler, Acting Board Administrator, 6 informed the Board of an issue with the Pennsylvania 7 Licensing System (PALS) regarding the funeral director 8 licensure fee. 9 Ms. Hemler stated the funeral director by 10 examination and funeral director by out-of-state 11 application fee was changed from \$20 to \$25 in 2002, but the change was not applied to PALS. She noted 12 PALS was updated on March 8, 2021, to reflect the 13 14 correct fee amount of \$25 as set forth in the 15 regulation.] \* \* \* 16 17 Public Comment 18 [James Eirkson, Pennsylvania Funeral Directors 19 Association, mentioned receiving several inquiries 20 regarding fictitious names and requested an overview 21 of the requirements and the process. 2.2 Ms. Black commented that licensees should be 23 reaching out to the Bureau of Corporations to ensure 24 the documentation was filed correctly, which could 25 then be provided to the Board for notice of the "doing

business as" (DBA) name. She would provide her email 1 2 address to Mr. Erikson for additional questions. 3 Ernie Heffner, President, Heffner Funeral Chapel & Crematory, Inc., suggested the Board look at trust 4 5 and fiduciary statutes for allegation of contrary intent with regard to giving authority to authorize 6 7 one's own cremation. He noted the document authorizes either cremation or burial and eliminates the chain of 8 9 command and next of kin and allows an individual to 10 assign anybody they want to serve as their legal next 11 of kin. 12 Mr. Heffner offered to email the document to the 13 Board. He has been providing the document to people 14 for years and pretty much insists on any 15 prearrangement for cremations that one of those 16 documents be executed.] \* \* \* 17 18 [William G. Harris, Chairman, Professional Member, 19 noted the next Board meeting date is May 12, 2021.] 20 \* \* \* 21 Adjournment 2.2 CHAIRMAN HARRIS: 23 I make a motion to adjourn. Is there a 24 second? 25 MS. RODRIGUEZ:
