  Effect of the Pandemic and the Ability of Funeral
17
18 Directors to Access CEUs.
  [Kenneth Dupree, Professional Member, noted that this
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20
  was an issue that would be seen a year from now when
  it would be time for renewals, and the in-person
21
22 meetings that the Board was accustomed to were
  cancelled. Mr. Dupree further noted that the virtual
23
  platform was not uniformly effective for all
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25
  licensees. Mr. Dupree discussed others ghost-sitting
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1 for funeral directors at virtual meetings, which
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- 2 undermined the principle of the CEU. A funeral
- 3 director's computer assistant could simply do the CEUs
- 4 for that director. Ms. Black noted that CE provider
- 5 used certain mechanisms or checkpoints built into a
- 6 course to combat those concerns.
- There was an inquiry as to whether or not there were CEUs that should be performed in person.
- 9 Mr. Dupree commented that, when he recently logged
- 10 onto a virtual platform, there was no indication which
- 11 CEUs were approved in Pennsylvania and which ones were
- 12 not. Mr. Dupree commented that he did not know what
- 13 others had experienced during this pandemic, but
- 14 stated, with regard to his involvement, it had been
- 15 "absolutely horrific." He was concerned about his
- 16 colleagues that were not computer literate.
- 17 Ms. Black explained the Board's responsibility to
- 18 ensure that licensees adhere to licensure
- 19 requirements, including the CEU requirements. She
- 20 noted that the pandemic prevent in-person learning
- 21 but that on-line and virtual learning was permitted
- 22 even prior to the pandemic. The pandemic and
- 23 prohibition on gatherings expanded how many CEs could
- 24 be attained virutally.
- 25 Ms. Montgomery explained a provision in the

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Funeral Law at Section 479.10 that permits the Board
  to waive all or a portion of Continuing Education for
  any licensee who demonstrates to the satisfaction of
  the Board that he or she was unable to complete the
   requirements due to serious illness, military service,
  or other demonstrated hardship.
       Ms. Rodriquez discussed a correspondence course
  where materials are sent for review, the individual
  answers the questions and then sends them back.

  which, a certificate is issued that the individual
  complied with that continuing education. Counsel

  commented the Continuing Education Committee would

21 [K. Kalonji Johnson, Commissioner, Bureau of

22 Professional and Occupational Affairs, thanked the

23 Board for the opportunity to present the list of

24 criminal offenses for consideration. He noted that

25 Act 53 was signed into law in June of 2020, a

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comprehensive criminal reform measure that amended
  what is known as the Criminal History Record
  Information Act or CHRIA, the statutory provision that
  provides for the Department of State and the Board to
   limit the use of criminal history in making licensure
  determinations, whether for discipline or whether to
  grant or deny licensure.
       Commissioner Johnson noted that one of the
  directives of the Act was for him as Commissioner to
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  publish a schedule of the criminal offenses and the
  other was to provide for public discussion with
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  members of the business community with regard to the
  various occupations and professions under the auspices
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14
  of the Department and the Bureau.
15
       He stated public forums were required so that the
  Board and the public and stakeholders could provide
  feedback, ask questions, and discuss the tentative
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  list. He thanked Counsel and the Chief Deputy Counsel
  for their hard work regarding the matter.

       Commissioner Johnson asked that the Board be
21
  prepared to approve this list as a starting point as
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  it moves through the regulatory process.]
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   [Cynthia Montgomery, Esquire, Deputy Chief Counsel,
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  presented the list of crimes as noted in the agenda.
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Offenses directly related to the funeral director
  profession, and a list of violent crimes were referred
  to for further discussion. She noted that Section
  3113 of Act 53 lists a series of criteria that the
  Board would be looking at to determine whether
  licensure of the individual would pose a substantial
  risk. She noted that offenses against public order
  and decency, abuse of a corpse is actually Section
  5510, which would need to be corrected.

       Ms. Montgomery stated violent crimes are on the
  list as they may constitute grounds for licensure
11
  refusal by any of the Boards under this section.

  Section 3113 (e) provides that an individual is

  convicted of one of these crimes may be granted a
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  license and listed those requirements.

  noted the criteria listed under 3113 (c) of the Act.

       Counsel noted this criminal information would be
  put out to the public, published, placed on the

  Board's website, and made a part of the application
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  process and the types of criteria that the Board would
21
  be considering.

  furnishing free insurance as an inducement for
  purchases. Mr. Fritsch explained that some funeral
  directors were also licensed insurance agents, who can
  offer both funeral services as well as sell a life

  insurance policy to a customer in order to finance
  future bills. There was further discussion regarding
