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4 * * * 1 State Board of Funeral Directors 2 3 February 6, 2019 * * * 4 [Pursuant to Section 708(a)(5) of the Sunshine Act, at 5 6 9:30 a.m. the Board entered into Executive Session 7 with C. William Fritz II, Esquire, Board Counsel, for the purpose of conducting quasi-judicial deliberations 8 and to receive legal advice. The Board entered into 9 10 public session at 10:30 a.m.] * * * 11 12 The regularly scheduled meeting of the State 13 Board of Funeral Directors was held on Wednesday, 14 February 6, 2019. William G. Harris, Chairman, 15 Professional Member, called the meeting to order at 10:37 a.m. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited. 16 17 Roll call was taken. A quorum was noted to be 18 present. * * * 19 20 [Heidy M. Weirich, Board Administrator, reviewed the 21 emergency evacuation procedures for One Penn Center.] * * * 22 23 Report of Board Counsel 24 [C. William Fritz II, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted 25 that the Board met in executive session prior to open

session and conducted quasi-judicial deliberation on 1 2 matters to be voted on later in the meeting.] 3 * * * 4 Approval of Minutes of the December 19, 2018 meeting 5 CHAIRMAN HARRIS: 6 At this time, we will vote for approval 7 of the December 19 minutes. 8 Are there any corrections or 9 anything on the minutes for that date? 10 [The Board discussed corrections to the minutes.] 11 CHAIRMAN HARRIS: 12 At this time, we are going to ask for a 13 motion to amend and approve the minutes of December 19. 14 15 MR. NEELY: 16 So moved. 17 CHAIRMAN HARRIS: 18 Do we have a second? 19 MS. RODRIGUEZ: 20 Second. 21 CHAIRMAN HARRIS: 22 We have a motion and a second. All in 23 favor, signify by saying aye. Any 24 opposed? 25 [The motion carried unanimously.]

* * * 1 [William G. Harris, Chairman, Professional Member, 2 3 announced and welcomed Mr. Fritz as new Counsel for 4 the state Boards.] * * * 5 6 Appointment - Bureau of Finance and Operations 7 Presentation [Kimberly Adams, Chief of Fiscal Management, Bureau of 8 Finance and Operations, introduced herself; Shannon 9 10 Boop, Fiscal Management Specialist; and Amanda 11 Richards, Fiscal Management Specialist. 12 Ms. Adams addressed the licensee population from a revenue standpoint. She stated the licensee count 13 14 at 6,131 was down 39 from the previous biennial period 15 in FY 2016-17, but was at 6,143 that morning with 12 16 additional members. 17 Ms. Adams stated 96% of revenue was from renewals 18 and applications with the current biennial total at 19 \$2,414,916.52. She noted the different revenue 20 sources and current fee structure, which had been the 21 same since 2014. 2.2 Ms. Adams reviewed the categorical breakdown of 23 administrative and legal expenses for FY 2016-17 and FY 2017-18, budget, and expenses as of January 17, 24 25 2019. She commented that expenses were incurred from

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1 timesheet-based charges, licensee-based charges, and 2 direct cost.

Ms. Adams reviewed revenue and expenses related to the budget for FY 2018-19. She noted growth in this area as long as the population continued to increase.

7 Ms. Adams addressed the breakdown of Board member 8 expenses for FY 2018-19 as of January 16, 2019. She 9 stated the Board was well within the budget and had a 10 balance to carry towards FY 2019-20 as well.

Ms. Adams commented that any excess that was not spent goes back to the Board.

13 Chairman Harris discussed Board costs, where 14 Board members receive \$60 per day for attending 15 meetings and representing the funeral profession, noting that professional members would be losing money 16 17 by not being at home. He stated Board members are 18 reimbursed for expenses. He also noted that the cost 19 of enforcement and investigation had increased over 20 the past few years.

21 Chairman Harris discussed the Board not lowering 22 the cost of licenses a few years back, noting problems 23 in some of the areas of the state, especially with the 24 Board increasing investigators in the Philadelphia 25 area. He commented that the Board had been commended

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for keeping the State Board of Funeral Directors 1 2 expenses under control while still protecting the 3 public in the state of Pennsylvania.] * * * 4 5 Report of Board Counsel 6 [C. William Fritz II, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted 7 the matters discussed during executive session.] * * * 8 9 MOTIONS 10 MR. FRITZ: 11 The Board would entertain a motion to 12 delegate the following matter to the hearing examiner for issuance of the 13 14 proposed adjudication, BPOA vs. Kelly L. 15 Corridoni, F.D., File No. 16-48-05644. 16 CHAIRMAN HARRIS: 17 Do we have a motion on No. 2? in funeral establishments. He noted a policy 1 2 statement regarding the matter was being drafted and a 3 regulation was in the works that will clearly outline 4 the Board's position. 5 Chairman Harris commented that, in place of having a Regulations Committee at the end of the 6 7 meeting, those wanting to address the issue would be given an opportunity to speak.] 8 9 * * * 10 Report of Commissioner - No Report * * * 11 Report of Board Chairman - No Report 12 13 * * * 14 Report of Board Administrator - No Report * * * 15 16 Items for Discussion - Election of Officers 17 MR. FRITZ: 18 Right now, open for nomination is Board 19 Chair. 20 MR. NEELY: 21 I nominate Bill Harris. 22 MR. KUKUCHKA: 23 I second that. 2.4 CHAIRMAN HARRIS: 25 All those in favor, say aye.

15 [The motion carried. Chairman Harris abstained from 1 2 voting on the motion.] * * * 3 MR. FRITZ: 4 5 Any nominations for Vice Chair? CHAIRMAN HARRIS: 6 7 I make a nomination that we keep Milian 8 Rodriguez if she is willing to serve as 9 the Vice Chair this year. 10 MR. KUKUCHKA: 11 Second. 12 CHAIRMAN HARRIS: We have a motion and a second. All in 13 14 favor to approve Milian Rodriguez for 15 Vice Chair will now take a vote on that. 16 Everybody agree to that? Anybody oppose 17 that? 18 [The motion carried unanimously.] * * * 19 20 CHAIRMAN HARRIS: 21 We also need a Secretary. Do we hear 22 any nominations for that? 23 MR. KUKUCHKA: 24 Mr. Neely. 25 CHAIRMAN HARRIS:

16 We have a nomination to have Mr. Neely 1 2 as our Secretary. 3 Is there a second? MS. RODRIGUEZ: 4 5 I'll second. CHAIRMAN HARRIS: 6 7 All in favor, signify by saying aye. 8 Opposed? 9 [The motion carried unanimously.] * * * 10 11 [William G. Harris, Chairman, Professional Member, 12 thanked the Board for their confidence in him, stating 13 that he would serve the public and funeral directors 14 on the state Board to the best of his ability.] * * * 15 16 MR. FRITZ: 17 The Board would entertain a motion to 18 approve the Request for Intern Extension 19 of Joshua A. Keith. 20 MR. NEELY: 21 So moved. 22 CHAIRMAN HARRIS: 23 We have a motion. Do we have a second? 24 MS. HOFFMAN: 25 Second.

1 CHAIRMAN HARRIS: 2 We have a motion and a second. All in 3 favor, signify by saying aye. Anybody 4 oppose? 5 [The motion carried unanimously.] * * * 6 7 Continuing Education Report Applications for Review 8 CHAIRMAN HARRIS: 9 The professional members here generally 10 look at the Applications for Continuing 11 Education to review and approve those. 12 At this time, we have looked at all of 13 these. We shared them between 14 professional members. We will approve 15 those applications submitted to date. 16 Matthews International, Pennsylvania 17 Funeral Directors Association, Cremation 18 Association of North America, 19 FrontRunner Professional, and MKJ 20 Marketing are approved. 21 I will make a motion to approve 2.2 them. Do we have a second? 23 MS. RODRIGUEZ: 2.4 Second. 25 CHAIRMAN HARRIS:

We have a motion and a second. 1 All in 2 favor, signify by saying aye. 3 [The motion carried unanimously.] * * * 4 5 Public Comments 6 [Ernie Heffner, President, Heffner Funeral Chapel & 7 Crematory, Inc., questioned the basis for an intern 8 extension when 12 months of uninterrupted internship 9 was required. 10 Chairman Harris clarified that the intern works in a very small-volume place that did not have 11 12 adequate bodies to qualify for an internship and was 13 given a year to meet his requirements. 14 Patrick T. Lanigan, F.D., Patrick T. Lanigan 15 Funeral Home & Crematory, Inc., addressed the issue of 16 food in funeral homes. Mr. Lanigan discussed the Board's decision in the Slater food case, noting an 17 18 unleveled playing field for funeral homes. He noted 19 ambiguity and uncertainty in the interpretation of the 20 no food in the funeral home argument. 21 Mr. Lanigan opposed the argument and supported 22 food in the funeral home. He noted the definition of 23 funeral home in § 13.94 regarding requirements for 2.4 funeral establishments. He stated a separate room to 25 act as a dining room or food room was not part of the

1 funeral establishment, which easily could determine 2 that the state Board has no jurisdiction over the use 3 of that room.

Mr. Lanigan referred to § 13.183 regarding food 4 5 and beverages, where it stated food may not be served 6 to the public in any part of a food establishment. Не 7 discussed ambiguities with this section and the keyword being "served." He commented that there was 8 9 no specific prohibition of a family bringing in food 10 and was clear that the prohibition is in the serving 11 of the food.

12 Mr. Lanigan reviewed unfair interpretation of 13 sections of the law and practical reasons for this 14 stance. He commented that there was no public health 15 reason for not allowing food in the funeral home, especially when there was nobody present due to 16 cremation or family preference. He stated certain 17 18 ethnic groups and religious practices use food in 19 their funerary traditions, questioning whether those 20 folks would be banned from funeral homes.

21 Mr. Lanigan commented that Pennsylvania was the 22 only state in the nation that interpreted that a food 23 ban exits. He mentioned that family, neighbors, and 24 coworkers bring food to the funeral home as a memorial 25 gift. He commented that the word "home" should not be

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1 used in its title if food were not allowed in funeral 2 homes, arguing that food was permitted in just about 3 every public place.

Mr. Lanigan stated that it was unconscionable to 4 5 allow staff to eat in a funeral home but not the folks 6 who financially support all of our employment. Нe 7 proposed and suggested that the state Board clear the ambiguity and misguided interpretation of no food in 8 the funeral home, imploring the state Board to side 9 10 with families and funeral homes who wish to completely 11 serve those who are bereaved.

Mr. Lanigan noted that it was the 21st Century and having food in the funeral home would benefit all without sacrificing the public welfare, which the state Board protects well.

16 Chairman Harris commented that it was the Board's 17 intention to clear up the ambiguity and past 18 misinterpretation of that law.

Jason G. Benion, Esquire, Post & Schell, discussed the issue from a lawyer's perspective, citing background regarding the course of that litigation and the Board's interpretation of the food provision of the statute that would interpret the law to allow food service in a separate segregated area of the funeral home apart from where the body was

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prepared or displayed for a funeral service. 1 2 Mr. Benion suggested drafting a statement of 3 policy in order to address the ambiguity and because 4 the Board had previously used statements of policy to 5 memorialize litigation decisions.] * * * 6 7 Adjournment 8 CHAIRMAN HARRIS: 9 Do I have a motion to close the meeting? 10 MR. NEELY: 11 So moved. 12 MR. KUKUCHKA: 13 Second. 14 CHAIRMAN HARRIS: 15 We have a motion and a second. All in 16 favor? 17 [The motion carried unanimously.] * * * 18 19 [There being no further business, the State Board of 20 Funeral Directors Meeting adjourned at 11:19 a.m.] 21 * * * 22 23 24 25
