- Commissioner Johnson recommended that all make
 sure providers are transmitting the child abuse
 continuing education (CE) information.
 - Commissioner Johnson noted this was Chairman Loiselle's last meeting and thanked him for all of the work performed as the Board chairman and as a public member.
 - Commissioner Johnson read the proclamation for Chairman Loiselle from the Department of State Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs for his contributions to the Pennsylvania State Board of Medicine and the citizens of the Commonwealth.
 - Chairman Loiselle thanked everyone.
- 25 Dr. Woodland questioned whether there was

information regarding the Board of Osteopathic Medicine remitting a fee.

Commissioner Johnson explained that the financial requirements upon each board are set in statute but are independent of each other. He stated the Board of Medicine had the opportunity to engage a fee waiver, but the Board of Osteopathic Medicine did not and is why there is the distinction in the performance of the fee this year.]

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11 Report of Department of Health

[Mary Pat Howard, M.S., RN-BC, Executive Assistant of Quality Assurance, on behalf of Rachel Levine, M.D.,

Physician General/Secretary of Health, provided an update on COVID-19 cases. She recommended everyone

16 use the Department of Health (DOH) daily dashboard.

Ms. Howard reported 1,407 new cases yesterday with 1,138 people hospitalized and 108 people on ventilators. She noted 187,176 confirmed cases for Pennsylvania and 8,673 deaths. She continued to recommend wearing masks and social distancing.

Chairman Loiselle questioned whether there was any way of knowing how many people in the state of Pennsylvania were walking around with an active infection.

Ms. Howard noted DOH was looking at the risk assessment of people who no longer test positive and recommended everyone use the dashboard and all of the information on the DOH website page.

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Dr. Woodland provided information from the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine, where Bill Gates, Dr. Sanjay Gupta, and Dr. Anthony Fauci noted a huge percentage of the population had not been exposed yet. He noted 85-95% exposure is needed for herd immunity and emphasized the importance of masking, washing hands, and appropriate distancing.

Ms. Howard reported considering 80% to have recovered, meaning it had been more than 30 days past the positive test or onset of symptoms.

Chairman Loiselle noted the importance of taking the appropriate precautions, particularly in the population highly susceptible to a terrible outcome. He also noted the importance of not making fear the only motivation for protection and would like to see some declaration from the Department of Health on long-term consequences or succumbing to the disease were pretty minimal.]

He mentioned continued evaluation of the ramifications on pregnancy with preterm birth, abruption, and other issues. He stated moms seem to be very strong and survive. He noted a very good Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) advice connection for pregnant moms.

Dr. Woodland recognized maternal care providers as first responders and wanted to give a shout-out to all health care providers in the state. He believed it to be important as leaders to help boost morale and keep everyone vigilant and diligent while carrying the fight forward with the COVID crisis.

Dr. Woodland recommended Chairman Loiselle for the John H. Clark, MD Leadership Award through the Federation of State Medical Boards. The award is presented to individuals in recognition of outstanding and exemplary leadership, commitment, and contribution in advancing the public good at the state medical board level. He stated this to be an excellent opportunity to honor an individual of their own State Board of Medicine who put forth all of these characteristics during his extraordinary term and leadership on this Board.]

Ms. Wucinski explained that the proposed regulation would prohibit pelvic, rectal, and prostate examinations without the explicit consent of patients with the goal of protecting patient rights by ensuring medical schools, teaching hospitals, and medical institutions receive patient consent for all procedures and exams performed while under anesthesia.

Dr. Woodland commented that the bill opened this up for all providers in all situations and is more universal. He stated it also delineated between exams that were part of the scope of care, especially for an OB/GYN.

Dr. Yealy reported being in full support of the bill, noting it to be a well-crafted response that allows the public to still have trust and did not encroach upon the therapeutic needs of examination.

Chairman Loiselle noted being unaware and shocked that a procedure was being performed while another procedure was being performing without a patient's consent. He understands it may be in a training capacity that it occurs but believed it to be egregious that it happens under any set of circumstances. He mentioned being for the bill in

Kalonji Johnson, Commissioner, Bureau of 17 Professional and Occupational Affairs, addressed Act 18 53, which was signed by Governor Wolf in June 2020. 19 He noted it to be one of the most comprehensive 20 reforms of the Criminal History Records Information 21 Act (CHRIA), which was the statutory provision that 22 governed how criminal history is used in determining 23 eligibility for licensure. 2.4 Commissioner Johnson noted his directives to 25 publish a schedule of offenses relative to Act 53 for

each of the 29 boards and commissions under the
auspices of the Department of State and to create a
public forum for stakeholders to provide feedback and
comments. He stated the list of the offenses is not a
terminal list and will have to go through the
regulatory review process.

Ms. Wucinski referred to the list of crimes under Act 53. She noted the violent crimes section includes criminal attempt, criminal conspiracy, and criminal solicitation. She also referred to sexual offenses under § 3113(d), a conviction of which would result in a permanent bar to licensure for any health care practitioner.

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Ms. Wucinski explained that the burden is on the applicant or respondent to prove their crime should not be considered if the offense they are convicted of is an offense that is on the list of crimes related to the profession. If the offense is not on the list, the burden would be on the commonwealth to prove the conviction is related to the profession.

Commissioner Johnson addressed preliminary determination, where perspective licensees who may have questions about prior criminal history can petition the Board for a preliminary determination.

He explained that Board counsel will then be tasked

with examining and analyzing the information and then presenting it to the perspective licensee.

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Commissioner Johnson stated the lists will be subject to change but only through the formal regulatory process. He mentioned that one of the reforms within Act 53 was eliminating good moral character as a sole determinate of discipline.

Dr. Woodland referred to § 2710 regarding ethnic intimidation and questioned whether there is any other information concerning racial or gender intimidation as well.

Chairman Loiselle questioned whether the Board will still have the moral turpitude backstop to rely on if the crime was not related to the practice of medicine, but the person should not be trusted to make the right decisions.

Commissioner Johnson explained that moral turpitude as a sole determinate of suitability for licensure would be gone because the intent behind Act 53 was to tie the analysis to the risk associated with the conviction itself. He stated whether the conviction created a risk of harm was really the analysis. The onus on the Board would be to show that risk of harm to the public when the offense clearly was not enumerated as one that directly relates.

Commissioner Johnson noted the list determines where the presumption lies, but the analysis is still tied directly into the risk of harm and where moral turpitude was utilized in the past is now an element contained within the offense. He stated it would not change the way the Board operated, and the Board would still be required to look at each individual applicant and licensee on an independent basis.

Chairman Loiselle announced Ms. Walter will be getting married December 6, 2020, and wished her the best from the Board and everyone associated with it.]

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17 | [K. Kalonji Johnson, Commissioner, Bureau of

18 Professional and Occupational Affairs, informed the

19 Board that Ms. Montgomery, Ms. Walter, and Ms.

20 Wucinski worked tirelessly to help curate the list,

21 not only from statutory construction but also looking

22 at past disciplinary precedent.

23 Cynthia K. Montgomery, Esquire, Deputy Chief

24 Counsel, Department of State, referred to the list of

25 criminal offenses draft, which is a schedule of

criminal convictions that may constitute grounds to refuse to issue; suspend; or revoke a license, certificate, registration, or permit for each profession.

- Ms. Montgomery stated the list was sent out to the Board of Medicine's interested parties and stakeholders. She noted receiving one comment from the Pennsylvania Medical Society regarding variances between the offenses listed on this Board's list and the State Board of Osteopathic Medicine's list. She noted counsel for both Boards compared the list and resolved the differences.
- Dr. Woodland referred to ethnic intimidation and expressed concern of whether it included racial or gender intimidation.
- Ms. Montgomery addressed violent crimes, stating the significance of a crime of violence is set forth in § 3113(e), where an individual could receive a license if it has been at least 3 years from incarceration or 3 years from imposition of the sentence, the individual has remained conviction-free, and demonstrates significant rehabilitation. She added that the Board must be convinced the individual does not pose a substantial risk to the health and safety of patients, clients, or the public or a

substantial risk of further conviction.

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Ms. Montgomery stated the crimes on the list of offenses, directly related to the profession, have a rebuttable presumption, where the individual would pose a significant risk to the safety of their clients or the public or a significant risk of further criminal convictions. She noted the individual would have to prove they do not pose such a risk.

Ms. Montgomery reviewed crimes under § 3113(e) with the prosecution division to determine which crimes are directly related to the profession. She provided a definition of "directly relates."

Ms. Montgomery addressed § 3113(d) regarding sexual offenses and applies to all health care practitioners.

Ms. Montgomery suggested the Board refer to Board counsel regarding any other crimes on the list related to the profession or why a particular crime is on the list. She stated the meeting is for the Board to discuss whether crimes should remain on the list or crimes should be added to the list.

Ms. Montgomery explained the two-stage evaluation provided in Act 53. She stated, after the list is created, the Board would determine if the crime is on the list by looking at sexual offenses under § 3113(d)

and crimes of violence at § 3113(e) for guidance. She noted crimes that are directly related have a rebuttable presumption, where the individual poses a significant risk.

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Ms. Montgomery stated the crimes not on the list of directly related to the profession would need an individualized assessment using criteria set forth in § 3113(c) to determine whether the individual does pose such a risk or should be granted a license notwithstanding the criminal conviction. She explained that just because a crime is not on the list did not mean it cannot be considered.

Ms. Montgomery commented that Act 53 would provide more transparency to the process and offer a best practices guide for individuals, who have a criminal conviction to be able to learn how to obtain a professional or occupational license, and the lists will be part of that guide and required to be included on every application once this law goes into effect.

Ms. Montgomery noted individuals would have the criteria to prove they do not pose a significant risk based on the criteria in § 3113 with the exception of sexual offenses and to a degree the crimes of violence. She commented that this would not change a lot the Board does and cases would still come before

the Board.

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Ms. Montgomery noted § 5902(b) and § 5902(b.1) are specifically set forth in § 3113(i) and is the definition section.

Chairman Loiselle questioned whether Act 53 had the potential for creating a situation that every member of the Board votes to deny a license and Act 53 forces the Board to approve a license. He questioned whether there is a situation with Act 53 absolutely going counter to the unanimous or majority of the Board to either approve or disapprove an application.

Ms. Montgomery noted it would only apply to sexual offenses set forth in Act 53, because the provision for sexual offenses is that the Board may not issue a license to somebody, who has been convicted of those offenses.

Chairman Loiselle stated the Board was formed to have an opinion subjectively provided by all of the various members of Pennsylvania society to have input on a particular license or case and would resist anything that takes it away.

Ms. Montgomery stated sexual crimes and violent crimes were areas set forth specifically in the statute, and crimes directly related to the profession were up to the Board. She noted a crime being on the

- list gives notice to the public or perspective and current licensees that the Board sees these crimes as directly related to the profession. She also noted a conviction may cause issues obtaining or being disciplined for current licensee.
- Ms. Montgomery stated the purpose of the list is to provide transparency to applicants as to how the Board looks at criminal convictions and crimes that are directly related.
- Ms. Montgomery addressed preliminary
 determination, where the Board would look at the crime
 for an individual and decide whether it is an
 impediment.

- Randy Stevens, Pennsylvania Orthotic and

 Prosthetic Society, commented that he never received

 the list of crimes. He questioned how much discretion
 the Board wants, because if it is already in there

 statutorily, it is not appealable. He requested a

 list of issues.
- Ms. Walter explained that the applicant does have the opportunity to rebut the presumption and the crime that is on the list as directly related. She noted the burden is on the applicant to show that even though they committed the crime identified as directly related to the profession that they have rehabilitated

1 themselves.

Chairman Loiselle stated it is best to trust in those who spent time and used their expertise to compile the list, because it is not comprehensive and things can be added or subtracted.

Ms. Walter requested Board members and members of the public identify crimes not directly related to the profession, so it could move forward.

Dr. Woodland referred to § 2604(c) and § 2606 regarding the unborn child, where it sounds like some kind of aggravated assault to a pregnant woman with the intention of doing something bad against the pregnancy. He expressed concerned about having his entire group of constituents, who are abortion providers, be in a position that is challenged by this.

Ms. Wucinski stated violent offenses are statutory, and those are all included in the act and are criminal offenses.

Ms. Walter noted planning to add abortion on an unborn child of 24 or more weeks' gestational age, infanticide, and fetal experimentation.

Ms. Wucinski explained that those are crimes they plan to add to the list of crimes related, not the violent offenses.

Commissioner Johnson touched on the question Dr. Woodland had, which was the crime listed under the violent offenses that relates transferred intent, where harm is done to a person who is pregnant and the harm results in severe injury or death to a fetus. He noted the intent, even if it was not originally intended to harm the fetus, is transferred to that fetus by virtue of attacking the mother.

Dr. Woodland commented that he did not want to create a situation where every OB/GYN in the state becomes subject to the issue of licensure based upon any termination of pregnancy. He referred to § 2604 and § 2606, noting that he did not know what those laws say but was assuming, as Commissioner Johnson defined them, it is when aggravated assault is transferred to the fetus from a pregnant woman.

Commissioner Johnson emphasized that all decisions are still appealable, and there is no implication to an applicant or licensee's right to appeal a Board decision under any circumstance. He noted the inclusion of an offense on this list did not mean waiving of any rights.

Mr. Anderson clarified Dr. Woodland's question concerning licensure and termination of pregnancy. He stated abortion past 24 weeks, infanticide, and fetal

experimentation are all listed in the Abortion Control
Act and come into play because they are prelisted as
criminal offenses.

Mr. Anderson stated separate acts that relate to a profession, including medical marijuana and abortion itemize specific action chargeable as criminal offenses, which is why counsel has already added them.

Ms. Montgomery noted a requirement in the statute is that Commissioner Johnson consult with the boards before he publishes this and is asking boards to authorize him to move forward with publication of the lists.]
