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   Appointment - Nurse Board 2019-2020 Budget Review
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   [Kimberly S. Adams, Fiscal Chief, Bureau of

   Finance and Operations, Department of State, addressed
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   the Board's financial position. She reviewed the
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   licensee population from a revenue standpoint. She
   noted FY 2019-2020 at 314,704 licensees with a recent
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   increase of 800 to 315,504. She also noted FY 2015-
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   2016 at 302,799 with an increase in FY 2017-2018 to
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   305,292 to the current 315,504 licensee population.
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       Ms. Adams reviewed the biennial total revenue by
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   source. She noted the last fee increase was in 2019.
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   She stated 91.2 percent of the revenue was from
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   renewals and applications.
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       Ms. Adams provided a categorical breakdown of
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   expenses for FY 2017-2018 and FY 2018-2019 with the
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   current budget for FY 2019-2020 and expenses as of
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   January 9, 2020. She noted a recent increase in
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expenses.

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Ms. Adams reviewed revenues and expenses. She stated revenue increased due to the licensee population growth. She mentioned the fee increase will bring the Board back to a positive balance in the next few years.

Ms. Malady questioned why the budget had decreased for legal costs rather than increasing. Ms. Adams explained the decrease is based on current expenses rather than overinflating the budget.

Ms. Kerns questioned whether the list of civil penalties was actually what was collected and whether there was anything that reflected civil penalties issued versus civil penalties collected. Ms. Adams stated it reflected actual revenue.

Ms. Pachter Schulder explained that unpaid civil penalties are sent to the Attorney General's Office for collection. She noted that civil penalties may have been in arrears previously, but the arrears had been resolved.

Ms. Adams reviewed Board member expenses, noting the current budget for FY 2019-2020 as of January 9, 2020, along with the Board member expenses. She mentioned a recent slight increase in the figure. She noted the amount also used for the FY 2020-2021 budget

1 amount. She stated any money not spent will remain in 2 the Board's restricted account.

10 documentation from the Nurse Practitioner Coalition.

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Ms. Pachter Schulder noted the pending regulations for the opioid education and organ and tissue donation, as well as the volunteer license regulation. She mentioned the possibility of combining some of the education regulations into one package, although the easier approach may be to draft

Ms. Pachter Schulder mentioned the Board approved the Child Abuse regulation (16A-5140) annex in March but additional amendments have been made to the child abuse legislation warranting additional revisions. In light of the numerous amendments, consideration is being made to only make references to the various

sections of the Child Abuse Protective Services Act
and expanding only on the initial licensure and
continuing education provisions. Ms. Pachter
Schulder stated the nursing education program
regulations would be discussed at 10:00 a.m.

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Ms. Pachter Schulder noted that the licensure by endorsement under Act 41 Annex would be sent to stakeholders for pre-draft input.]

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Pennsylvania Legislative Update - Legislation

Affecting Nurses/Nursing

[Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel,

noted that there was no legislative movement on Bills

regarding the Compact, CRNAs, CRNPs, or LDNs.

Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to House Bill 1477, noting previous discussion regarding Senate Bill 637 that addresses the Board's preliminary determination on applications for persons with criminal convictions.

She discussed the current expungement law and mentioned that it applies to licensees who did not complete their continuing education and for a lapsed license less than six months. She commented that expungement requests are being handled administratively for the entire Bureau.

Ms. Pachter Schulder explained the two-step

analysis when reviewing a criminal conviction under 1 2 House Bill 1477, noting that it is similar to the 3 analysis currently applied by the Application Committee when it reviews applications and when the 4 5 Board is considering discipline. She explained that first the Board must decide if the conviction directly 6 relates to the profession. She mentioned that the Board would be writing regulations, along with all the Boards, likely based upon a recommendation provided to 10 all Boards. She noted a change from the previous 11 draft in the Senate Bill 637 where the Board 12 determines if there was a substantial risk of harm to 13 the health and safety to the person.

Ms. Pachter Schulder explained that in the Bill if the conviction is not directly related, then an individualized assessment of approximately 11 factors would be performed. She noted other changes from the Senate Bill discussed last month, including that no license would be granted if the criminal conviction was of a sexual offense; enhanced scrutiny would be given to crimes of violence and drug trafficking offenses.

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Acting Commissioner Johnson noted that in this
Bill the rebuttable presumption, changing the scope of
the analysis, is that a candidate would not be

suitable for licensure.

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Marc Farrell, Deputy Policy Director,

Pennsylvania Department of State, stated the

Legislative Office at the Department, as well as the

Office of Legislative Affairs at the Governor's

Office, prefers Senate Bill 637 over House Bill 1477.

Mr. Farrell mentioned being involved in the drafting and negotiation of the terms of the Senate bill, noting trying to adopt the good things the Department prefers in House Bill 1477 and moving them over to Senate Bill 637. He noted the changes to be harsher and trend back toward the good moral character/vagueness standard.

Acting Commissioner Johnson commented that the problem historically has been a nebulous standard concerning the Criminal History Record Information Act regarding what an individual should do rather than may do, which has created all kinds of incongruities in terms of policy. He mentioned the hope that these changes will not detrimentally impact the processes the administration has put in place and has stabilized with a lot of hard work. The Bureau continues to work through the Office of Policy and with the Legislature.

[Ann Michele Coughlin, MBA, MSN, RN, Chair, wished everyone a happy 2020 and good health. She thanked Board members and staff for their dedication. She acknowledged the commitment to serve, keep the Commonwealth safe, and apprise the public of the nursing practice.]

He offered his assistance and the assistance of Stephen Latanishen, Director of Intergovernmental Affairs, with any concerns or questions regarding the Navigator. He also thanked the stakeholders in the audience for their work.]

2 RN/PN Practice, Education, & Regulation/Advanced
3 Practice Committee
4 [Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel,
5 addressed the nursing education program regulation
6 (16A-5141) and presented a revised Annex that included
7 changes to the Annex from the last version along with
8 a conversion sheet comparing current regulations with
9 the proposal.

Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to a letter from Linda Sampson, CRNP, requesting that the Board require at least five years of internal medicine experience before being admitted into a nurse practitioner program. The Board chose not to add this requirement.

Ms. Pachter Schulder directed the Board to the math and science requirement in proposed 21.917(a), following up on a prior presentation from the Department of Labor and Industry regarding remediation resources as well as the Board's prior discussion about medication administration and quality improvement being greatly impacted by insufficient math and science knowledge. The Board reviewed the Draft Recommendations from the High-Quality Mathematics Education for Nursing Task Force and the QSEN Math Education for Nurses Initiative. The Board

determined that it wants to include the requirement
for two courses in math with one being in Algebra and
two courses of physical science with a related lab or
its equivalent prior to the commencement of an RN or
PN program.

- Ms. Pachter Schulder also noted a request from Anew Nursing to add a requirement that students complete a minimum of 48 clinical hours in a certified aide course before being able to enroll in any nursing program. The Board noted that some PN programs give a portion of credit for this coursework, but it declined to include the requested admission requirement.
 - Ms. Pachter Schulder directed the Board to the curriculum and faculty qualifications provisions in \$21.931-21.946.
 - Ms. Pachter Schulder noted the addition of "advanced assessment" in CRNP definitions in §21.251 and the addition of "comprehensive nursing assessment" in RN definitions in §21.1 as a way to distinguish them from "focused assessment" for the LPN in PN definitions in §21.141. Additional references to comprehensive nursing assessment have been added to \$21.942(b)(4), and an additional reference to comprehensive nursing and advanced assessments have been added to \$21.282a(b)(1). She noted that the term

"nursing" was not added to "advanced assessment"

because CRNPs have the ability to diagnose, making the
assessment broader than just a nursing assessment. As
a result, as drafted, \$21.282(a) refers to
comprehensive nursing assessment by virtue of the RN
license, and the advanced assessment as part of the

CRNP certification.

Ms. Pachter Schulder reminded the Board that where provisions cover RN, PN, and CRNP nursing education programs, they have been consolidated into new subchapter I. She noted that if provisions specifically apply only to RNs, PNs, or CRNPs, then the provisions remain within the current regulatory breakdown.

Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to revisions to the definition of "focused nursing assessment" in §21.141, noting that language regarding "leading to a comprehensive nursing assessment by an RN" has been replaced with "recognizing patient characteristics by an LPN that may affect the patient's health status, gathering and recording assessment data, and demonstrating attentiveness by observing and monitoring and reporting signs, symptoms, and changes in patient condition" to reflect current practice.

The Board discussed use of the term "patient" vs.

- "client" in the regulations. Ms. Pachter Schulder
 noted that in many instances CRNPs use the term

 client, and RNs and PNs use patient. She stated the

 National Organization of Nurse Practitioner Faculties

 (NONPF) standards still included the term patient.

 She also noted that the definition for "patient" in

 the regulations includes "clients." The Board decided

 to refer to "patient" consistently throughout.
 - Ms. Pachter Schulder noted that a reference to CRNP coursework in §21.944(b)(2)(iii) has been added to §21.283 regarding authority and qualifications for prescribing, dispensing, and ordering drugs. She noted the Advisors and Ms. Keiser have spent an enormous amount of time reviewing and revising the curriculum requirements for RNs and PNs in § 21.942 and CRNPs in §21.944. Additionally infusion therapy topics were added to §21.943.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted that the advanced pharmacology coursework was clarified in \$21.944(b)(2)(iii) to specify that the advanced pharmacology course must include pharmacotherapeutics, pharmacokinetic, and pharmacodynamics of broad categories of drugs, selection and monitoring of pharmacologic drugs for the management of the patient health problems, patient education, requirements for

1 CRNP prescriptive authority, and legal requirements 2 for prescriptive writing.

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Ms. Pachter Schulder indicated that \$21.944(b)(2)(iii)(V) includes both the Drug Enforcement Administration and Board requirements regarding prescription writing as delineated in \$21.283-21.284(b). She noted that a reference has been added for \$21.944(b)(2)(iii) to \$21.283. New \$21.944(d) clarifies that the advanced pharmacology content can be integrated into the other content areas or could be a separate program, which prompted the discussion concerning the 45-hour advanced pharmacology course work, either stand alone or combined. The Board concurred with the revisions.

Janyce L. Collier, MSN, RN, CNE, Nurse

Administrator/Financial Aid Administrator, Franklin

County Career & Technology Center Practical Nursing

Program, addressed the comments that she had provided

to the Board on behalf of the Pennsylvania Association

of Practical Nurse Administrators (PAPNA) dated

January 23, 2020. Ms. Collier recommended that the

definition of controlling institution for practical

nursing programs in §21.901 be changed from "and" to

"or" so that PN programs need to be either accredited

by a national accrediting agency recognized by the

1 USDoE or authorized by the Pennsylvania Department of 2 Education to award at a minimum a diploma or 3 certificate in practical nursing.

2.4

Ms. Collier stated over 55 percent of PN programs are situated in career-tech centers which are not eligible at the controlling institution for accreditation. She stated the controlling institution would need at least three adult full-time education programs in order to seek accreditation.

Ms. Collier stated people use PDE accreditation and PDE approval interchangeably, but they are different. She explained that PDE approval would be their minimum requirement, and the PDE accreditation or accreditation through another accrediting body would be more difficult for many of the controlling institutions of PN programs to attain.

Ms. Collier stated the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN) actually has definitions for practical nursing programs for controlling institutions accreditation. She mentioned, for controlling institutions that are not eligible for accreditation, there is an allowance for state approval. The Board discussed Ms. Collier's recommendation and decided to remove "nationally accrediting agency recognized by the United Stated

Department of Education" from the definition of controlling institution for PN programs and only require authorization by PDE. The Board retained the dual requirement for RN programs as the programs in the Commonwealth meet both requirements.

Ms. Collier next referred to \$21.916 regarding accreditation, noting that the Board reduced the planned timeframe for programs to obtain accreditation from five to three years. She recommended extending the timeframe for accreditation back to five years so that programs would be able to build their budgets and increase administrative capacity to seek nursing accreditation. She noted that almost 50% of the PN programs have obtained programmatic accreditation since the Board's initial discussion about requiring programmatic accreditation.

Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to §21.915(a)(10) regarding minimum standards. She noted prior discussion concerning monitoring pass rates on a quarterly basis; however, Practice Advisors Ms. Miller and Ms. House reported that CRNP program results are exported less frequently than RN and PN program pass rates. The Board can request aggregate reports with regard to pass rates and CRNP programs. Dr. Petula explained how programs obtain their reports for

quarterly review.

2.3

Based upon the reporting differences, the Board concurred with changing the language in \$21.915(a)(10) from "monitors its pass rates on a quarterly basis" to "monitors its pass rates. RN and PN programs shall conduct their review on a quarterly basis."

Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to §21.917(a)(1) regarding minimum student admission requirements. She suggested changing the language from "minimum student admission requirements" to possibly "commencement requirements." She noted prior discussion to require two courses in mathematics, one in Algebra, and two courses in a physical science or equivalent before commencing a program.

Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to §21.917(a)(2), where only students with a minimum of a baccalaureate degree or its equivalence may be granted admission into the CRNP program. Dr. Petula suggested and the Board concurred with replacing the title "minimum student admission requirements" with "minimum program qualifications." The Board also discussed replacing "units" with "courses."

Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to §21.921(a) regarding establishment, noting that "a program should be developed by an individual who meets the

requirements in §21.933" rather than requiring that it be developed by the administrator because the Board understands that the actual administrator of the program may not be hired at that point. The Board is satisfied that either the administrator or a consultant could put the program together.

Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to §21.921(b)(12) regarding the requirement of having commitments from clinical agencies. She noted in addition to agreeing to entering into a contract with the program permitting its students to obtain clinical experience at the facilities, the provision requires the clinical agencies to identify the number of clinical spaces, census of the agency, and the anticipated teacherstudent ratio.

2.3

Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to §21.921(e) regarding the advertisement and recruitment of students after the Board votes to give approval. The provisions clarify that during the time between the vote and the facility review to assure compliance with the proposal, programs may advertise and recruit for students, but the programs may not admit students.

Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to \$21.961(c)(2) regarding policies and procedures concerning the handbook. She noted the addition of (vi) which sets

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out the steps that must be completed, including any
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   pre-NCLEX® testing that must be completed before a
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   program will transmit a graduate's nursing
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   verification to the Board. She explained that the
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   Board does not get the nursing verification upon
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   graduation but rather when the graduate completes the
   program. Ms. Pachter Schulder noted that a copy of
   the handbook and relevant student policies must be
   provided to the Board for review with a program
   proposal in $21.921(b)(6).
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        Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to $21.933
   regarding administrator qualifications and the Board's
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   prior determination that the administrator must have
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   one degree level above the degree being conferred.
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   She noted for an RN program that confers a
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   baccalaureate degree in § 21.933(a)(1), the
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   administrator would need to hold one graduate degree
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   in nursing and an earned doctoral degree or a plan for
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   completing the course. She noted that when conferring
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   an associate degree or diploma, proposed
   $21.933(a)(1)(b) requires a graduate degree in nursing
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Ms. Pachter Schulder noted that for PN programs in proposed §21.933(b)(1), the administrator must hold

without the need for the additional earned

baccalaureate degree.

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an earned baccalaureate degree, preferably in nursing, with experience in the areas of nursing practice, education, and administration with a plan to obtain a master's degree. She stated for a CRNP in proposed \$21.933(c)(1), the administrator must hold a graduate degree in nursing and a doctoral degree or a plan for obtaining one.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted one amendment since the last discussion — the insertion of a reference in proposed §21.933(a)(1), (b)(1), (c)(1), and (e) to §21.972(a) that the program advise the Board in its Annual Report of the administrator process of completing these degrees. A similar insertion was made for faculty members in proposed §21.934(b)(1).

Ms. Pachter Schulder referred the Board to proposed §21.941 regarding curriculum development requirements. She noted that subsection (a) sets out the 5 components of a curriculum: a mission, student-centered outcomes, a curriculum plan, and course syllabi that meet the requirements set forth in the regulation. She mentioned that under subsection (b), the curriculum should be developed, implemented, and evaluated by the faculty. She noted utilization of a template when programs are submitted to the Board in order to reduce discrepancies and provide clarity to

programs.

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2 In developing the general content areas in proposed §21.942 - §21.944, Dr. Petula noted an 3 extensive literature review with evidence-based 4 5 support for the curriculum topic revisions. She noted 6 that the goal was not to be so specific but include the most critical elements. Included within the literature review was the NCLEX® Test Plans, The Essentials of Baccalaureate Education for Professional 10 Nursing, The Essentials for the Master's Education in 11 Nursing, The Essentials of Doctoral Education for 12 Advanced Nursing Practice, and the NONPF Nurse 13 Practitioner Core Competencies Content.

Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to \$21.943 and noted that the term "IV therapy" was being changed to "infusion therapy" throughout the regulations to conform to current nomenclature. In addition to new \$21.943, changes were made to \$21.141, \$21.145(f) and (g), \$21.147, and proposed \$21.942.

Ms. Pachter Schulder explained that in proposed \$21.943(a), to conform with current practice, the IV infusion education could be integrated as part of a professional or practical nursing education program curriculum or as a stand-alone course. Additional requirements for stand-alone education is contained in

\$21.943(c). Like with simulation standards, proposed \$21.943(d) requires that the infusion therapy courses comply with the standards for infusion therapy from Board-recognized professional association.

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Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to §21.944 regarding general content requirements for CRNP nursing education programs. She noted the addition of subsection(b)(5)addressing pain management and the identification of the practices of prescribing or dispensing opioids.

Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to \$21.945 regarding clinical experience requirements. She noted the addition in subsection (a) that the clinical experience be preceded by or concurrent with the didactic instruction. She and Dr. Petula mentioned prior discussions with programs concerning the sequencing of their proposal being out of order when the didactic education would occur after the clinical experience. In addition, subsection (b) clarifies that the clinical experience must be appropriate for the applicable scope of practice.

Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to §21.945(e) regarding simulation and pointed out the requirement that the simulation standards must meet those of a Board-recognized professional association. A list of

associations would be posted on the Board's website.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted clarifications in \$21.30(a), \$21.118(b), \$21.917(a)(2), \$21.933(a)(2), \$21.933(b)(2), \$21.934(a)(1)(ii), \$21.934(a)(2)(ii),

 $5 \mid \$21.9234(a)(3)(ii)$, and \$21.934(f) concerning

6 temporary practice permits. Rather than referring to

temporary practice permits generally, the proposal

makes clear that the temporary permit must be issued

9 pursuant to \$21.7(b) related to licensure by

10 endorsement.

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Dr. Kmetz referred to \$21.18(c) regarding standards for administrators, faculty members, and clinical supervisors/preceptors/mentors respecting and considering students' right to freedom from psychological and physical abuse. She questioned whether licensees, pre-licensure, and/or CRNP students, and new graduates were being considered. To address that concern, the Board decided to modify the named positions with "as part of a nursing education program" to clarify that this provision applies to conduct within a nursing education program.

Dr. Kmetz referred to changes in approval status \$21.911(b)(3) and questioned whether there was a need to define the authorizing body. The Board discussed that the authorizing body would likely be PDE and the

nursing accreditor. A definition for authorized body would be added to \$21.901.

2.2

Dr. Kmetz referred to §21.915(a)(9) and questioned whether the reference to ensuring a variety of clinical experiences in the care of "women, men and children" should be replaced with "all genders across the lifespan" in order to be more inclusive. Because of the concern that "across the lifespan" would apply to RNs and PNs but not CRNPs, the revision would be to "all gender and age groups."

Dr. Kmetz referred to \$21.921(c) requiring nursing education programs to employ an administrator at least six months prior to commencement of the program. She recommended increasing the timeframe to one year because she believes that six months is too short of a timeframe between hiring an administrator and the admission of students. The Board concurred with the suggestion.

Dr. Kmetz referred to \$21.925(a)(8) regarding faculty turnover of more than 25 percent in an academic year. She questioned why that was necessary. The Board discussed that under this provision, the administrator must notify the Board within 90 days of those changes. The Board desired its inclusion based upon its appointments with programs on provisional

- 1 status and evidence provided by NCSBN because it found 2 that if there is constant turnover with the
- 3 administrator within a year, the program is less
 4 likely to succeed.
- Dr. Kmetz referred to \$21.932 regarding the minimum administrator, faculty, and staff requirements. She expressed her concern that
- 8 information technology (IT) or technological support

is not identified strongly enough in subsection (e).

- 10 She noted technological support mentioned in
- 11 \\$21.952(3); however, she thinks programs need to
- 12 demonstrate a sufficient IT support for students. To
- 13 address her concern, §21.932(e) will be amended to add
- 14 "technological" before "dedicated clerical support."
- Dr. Kmetz referred to §21.933(b)(1) regarding the
- 16 qualifications for an administrator of a PN program.
- 17 She noted the language "earned a baccalaureate degree,
- 18 preferably in nursing" does not require a graduate
- 19 degree nor does it include language requiring the
- 20 administrator to have a specific plan for completing
- 21 work toward a graduate degree in nursing. Ms. Pachter
- 22 Schulder will change the language from "baccalaureate"
- 23 degree to "graduate" degree and require an update on
- 24 progress towards completion of the degree.
- 25 Dr. Kmetz questioned whether there should be any

restrictions on individuals supervising students who might be on criminal probation or subject to discipline. The Board discussed the impact of precluding licensees who have a temporary practice permit or a current license and decided not to change

the provision as drafted.

Dr. Kmetz referred to \$21.971(c)(2) and (3) and questioned the rationale for the 10-year record maintenance and retention requirement for organizational minutes and annual reports when the current policy notes a 7-year retention. The Board decided to reduce the 10 years to 8 years.

Jennifer Holzer, DNP, MSN, RN, Director of
Nursing, Prism Career Institute, and PAPNA President,
questioned the Board further regarding proposed
\$21.916 relating to accreditation. She noted that
programs on provisional status are not eligible to
apply for accreditation until they are off provisional
status for one calendar year. Dr. Holzer requested
the Board extend the timeframe to obtain programmatic
accreditation because it takes at least two years to
come off provisional status and then another year
thereafter to apply for accreditation. She stated
programs could possibly close due to not meeting the
requirements for the State Board of Nursing and then

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being accredited by a nursing body, which would be
ACEN right now.
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3 In light of Dr. Holzer's comments, the Board 4 considered whether to keep the timeframe at five 5 years, increase the number of years, or make some kind 6 of statement that a program on provisional status has, whether it is three years from removal or three years from the end of provisional status, to obtain the accreditation. The Board decided because it increased 10 the timeframe from three to five years earlier in the 11 discussion, five years should be sufficient under Dr. 12 Holzer's construct.]

patients hospitalized in an inpatient setting based
upon the nature of their medical conditions and
severity of illnesses/injuries. The medical/surgical
clinical experience requires the treatment of more
complex illnesses or surgical conditions not treated

The Board questioned Mr. Keller and Ms. Johnson about whether the experiences at Golden Living Center/Lansdale, Elm Terrace Gardens, Briarleaf Nursing & Convalescent Center, Freedom Village/Brandywine or Peter Becker Community, listed in Template C, could qualify for medical/surgical experience. The Board noted that Tower Health and Inglis House were listed as clinical experiences corresponding to Pharmacology, IV Therapy, Adult

Nursing I and II and Clinical Applications I and II.

19 Inglis House was also listed for Geriatrics.]
