21 addressed the importance of balancing the needs of

22 | public and patient safety when determining applicants'

23 suitability to be nurses. Mr. Lynch expressed a

24 | concern regarding the initial list published in

25 December, noting that it is longer than necessary and

counterproductive.

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Mr. Lynch commented that the Legislature instructed all boards, including the Board of Nursing, to list crimes that have a direct bearing on the fitness or ability to perform one or more of the duties or responsibilities necessarily related to the profession, noting items that may be related under some circumstances do not meet that definition.

Mr. Lynch stated having an overinclusive list will impose a significant burden on potential licensees' ability to practice as a nurse and will function as a high barrier preventing potential applicants from entering the profession.

Mr. Lynch stated people will review the list, get discouraged, and choose to not pursue the process. He mentioned it was critical that the list be strictly limited to those crimes truly directly related to the essential functions of nursing. He noted the Board of Medicine has a radically shorter list and would be entirely appropriate in keeping with the law of Pennsylvania to limit the list simply as the Board of Medicine had done.

Ms. Svoboda-Kindle discussed the importance of balancing the protection of patients and allowing qualified people who have criminal records to apply

and become nurses. She stated Community Legal Services was working on producing reports from experts to guide the process to be offered to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and all of the boards. Specifically, Ms. Svoboda-Kindle referred to a report by Kiminori Nakamura, an expert based on empirical research, which has found that people reach a redemption period four to seven years after the offense and are not likely to reoffend more than anyone else.

Additionally, Ms. Svoboda-Kindle suggested the list of offenses directly related to nursing should include time periods of four years for drug offenses, three to four years for property offenses, and four to seven years for violent offenses and noted that Community Legal Services is working with an industrial-organizational (I-O) psychologist regarding crimes related to different professions. She noted that I-O psychologists assist big companies in designing policies based on empirical research with regard to evaluating a criminal record without being overly exclusionary.

Ms. Kerns questioned whether Mr. Lynch took into account that nurses are sometimes the only people in contact with patients for months or years when

differentiating between the Board of Medicine and Board of Nursing.

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Mr. Lynch commented that there were numerous other employment settings for nurses where that was not the case, and employment screening by employers could determine whether a nurse could work without that being a direct concern.

Mr. Lynch stated the definition in the law does not direct the boards to list each crime that might possibly be a concern of the job. He noted that offenses not necessarily related to the profession do not meet the legal definition of what is directly related and should not be on the list. He mentioned that the Board would still have the opportunity to go to stage 2 and review the particular facts and circumstances. He stated it was unfair to automatically apply the presumption that someone is a risk to their patient.

Vice Chair Kmetz noted that the proposal would be taken into consideration during proposed rulemaking.]

7 Generic Bachelor of Science Degree in Nursing (BSN)

[James MacLaren, PhD, President, Lebanon Valley College, addressed their strategic direction for the college in health care-related fields, noting physical therapy and speech-language programs. He mentioned Penn State Health and WellSpan Health have an interest in a nursing program at Lebanon Valley College (LVC) because students are drawn regionally and tend to remain regionally after graduation. He noted nursing would be a natural fit and would meet the needs of the community in Central Pennsylvania.

Dr. MacLaren stated the distinctive feature of the program is building on the historic strengths of liberal arts education and foundation of all of the allied health programs that are integrated into the curriculum and the commitment of the college to build a facility to provide state-of-the-art facilities for the nursing program and to extend some of the academic

1 | collaborations with entities like Penn State Health.

Monica Cowart, PhD, Provost and Vice President of Academic Affairs, Lebanon Valley College, noted the program would bring forward a BSN program to give back to the region and continue LVC's tradition of excellence in teaching and learning.

Linda Caputi, MSN, EdD, RN, CNE, ANEF, Nursing
Program Consultant, Lebanon Valley College, addressed
her role of developing a current contemporary
curriculum, policies, student handbook, and faculty
handbook regarding nursing that examines the present
as well as the future.

Shawn Curtin, Vice President of Finance and Administration, Lebanon Valley College, addressed his role in developing the financial model for the program, as well as planning and overseeing the construction of the new facility.

Laura Eldred, PhD, Assistant Dean and Director of Constellation, Lebanon Valley College, commented that the program draws on the strength of the liberal arts foundation and health care fields.

Ms. Pachter Schulder requested additional information regarding incorporating simulation into the programs, clinical sites, and specific involvement for students.

Dr. Caputi stated LVC hired Dr. Donna Badowski, who developed a whole simulation package, actually planning specific case scenarios and studies that will be incorporated into each course where simulation would be a good fit. She noted working closely with the chief information officer and director of simulation at Penn State Health to entertain a partnership with in-sync simulation between the two facilities.

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Dr. MacLaren addressed further development of the proposal to build a facility in the area of the campus near other health sciences to allow for the expansion of up to six individual simulation spaces with the focus of building a robust program.

Dr. Cowart noted there would be a dedicated simulation specialist with a background in simulation and provided a summary of a simulation specialist job description. She mentioned Dr. Caputi would be mentoring the chair and also noted a number of leaders within the health care system as part of the research committee in addition to faculty members to ensure a smooth transition.

Ms. Pachter Schulder questioned what LVC anticipated enrollment and costs to be for the first and succeeding years. Mr. Curtin addressed working

with Hanover Research and provided an outline of the demand and a pro forma, including costs outside of the nursing program and debt service for the new building.

Dr. MacLaren stated the advancement team was active in fundraising for the building and confident the debt service loaded into the pro forma would be less as they move forward. He noted that pro forma provides flexibility so there would be enough money to adjust and meet the needs of the program.]

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Ms. Pachter Schulder noted the department has reviewed the Sunrise Evaluation and taken a position in support of legislation for CRNAs. She mentioned the Board has Senate Bill 416 and House Bill 931 on

its agenda under the legislative report.

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Jessica Poole, DNAP, MHS, CRNA, Director of Government Relations, Pennsylvania Association of Nurse Anesthetists (PANA), noted receiving an email regarding support through the Sunrise Application and thanked the Board on behalf of the 3,700 CRNAs in Pennsylvania.

Dr. Poole addressed Senate Bill 416 and House
Bill 931 introduced by Senator Gordner and
Representative Toohil that would formally recognize
CRNAs in Pennsylvania and give a clear delineation
under the Nurse Practice Act.

Dr. Poole noted the bill has been clearly opposed by their physician counterparts and the bill has been attached to a physician supervision bill, House Bill 912, introduced by Representative Mentzer. She stated the bill would mandate CRNAs to be supervised by physicians in all anesthetizing locations. The bill would give the State Board of Medicine full authority over CRNAs' practice.

Dr. Poole mentioned opposing the bill because it was more restrictive than the current regulations and statutes, and there was no other state where nurse anesthetists were governed under the State Board of Medicine.

Dr. Poole stated the term supervision had been linked to the perceived liability concept even though there is no legal doctrine or case law that has shown that a physician could be held liable for the actions of a nurse anesthetist. She noted the word does not really reflect what is happening in operating rooms with CRNAs and the physicians, and it undermines the collaborative team approach.

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Dr. Poole addressed Pennsylvania's anesthesiologist assistant (AA) legislation. She commented that AAs are only permitted to practice in 13 states and Washington, D.C. and not required to have any medical or nursing background prior to their training but graduate as dependent anesthesia providers. She noted CRNAs are permitted under state regulation and statute to work independent of a physician anesthesiologist in all 50 states.

Dr. Poole addressed implications for the Commonwealth where provider redundancy is required for an AA and a physician anesthesiologist model, which actually causes health care costs to significantly increase. She stated AAs are also incapable of expanding or improving healthcare accessibility because of the requirement for them to work under a physician anesthesiologist.

Dr. Poole stated this puts the student registered nurse anesthetist (SRNA) academic standing in jeopardy because AAs and SRNAs are not able to train in the same facility aside one another and would push clinical opportunities for SRNAs out of the state, which would result in the closing of some SRNA programs. She mentioned a cosponsor memorandum being circulated by Senator Scavello in the Senate.

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Janyce L. Collier, MSN, RN, CNE, Nurse

Administrator/Financial Aid Administrator, Franklin

County Career & Technology Center Practical Nursing

Program, representing the Pennsylvania Association of

Practical Nursing Administrators (PAPNA), updated the

Board on practical nursing education. She addressed

challenges, including many new nurse administrators

running practical nursing programs, where the network

of the educators through PAPNA is very essential to

bring new partners onboard and to run quality

practical nursing programs throughout the state.

Ms. Collier announced Frances Bietsch, York
County School of Technology, is the new PAPNA
President. She noted looking forward to the
progression of the Nursing Education regulations
proposed and waiting for the update.

Ms. Collier noted future challenges include the

Next Generation NCLEX® changes in the licensure
examination and the primary accreditor for PN
deducation, the Accreditation Commission for Education
in Nursing (ACEN), updating their standards and
criteria in 2023.

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- Meg Rowe, MS, RD, LDN, FADA, FAND, Licensure Task Force Chair, Pennsylvania Academy of Nutrition & Dietetics, noted being optimistic regarding House Bill 1020 presently in the Professional Licensure Committee (PLC). She stated the big objective within the bill are patient protection issues, particularly from a patient perspective, and identifying experts in the science of nutrition.
  - Ms. Rowe stated medical nutrition therapy as currently defined is problematic because persons, regardless of education, experience, or competency are able to call themselves nutritionists and other titles are misleading the public. She noted House Bill 1020 will require individuals to be licensed as dietitiannutritionists.
- Ms. Rowe commented that even though there are now laws in Pennsylvania related to telehealth, she anticipated there would be legislation enacted in this legislative session. She noted that without changes to the statute outlined in House Bill 1020, dietitians

- will not be able to practice telehealth because
  diagnose" and "treat" are not in their scope of
  practice.
- Mr. Rowe noted adding definitions so they would be statutorily enacted or covered, including "nutrition diagnosis" and "treating" with the assumption there will be a bill passed regarding telehealth enabling the practice of telehealth in Pennsylvania as well as around the country.

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- Ms. Rowe stated the "Diplomat of the American Clinical Board of Nutrition" was added to the bill. She mentioned the requirement for a master's level individual to be the representative on the Board of Nursing. She stated medical nutrition therapy will be identified as a specific and exclusive scope of practice of the LDNs as well as the licensed nutritionists (LNs). She addressed terms that would be protected and should not be used in the abstinence of having a license to practice.
- Ms. Rowe referred to Section 3.2 and 3.3 scope of practice exclusions that will be added in order to identify the scope of practice. She noted LDN and LN was added to mirror nursing language in Section 4 and 4.1. She announced LDNs in 2024 will be required to have a master's degree in order to sit for the

- 18 background evaluation by staff for education courses
- 19 and examination completion.
- 20 Ms. Rowe noted a clinical nurse specialist (CNS)
- 21 is using the acronym CNS, and a certified nutrition
- 22 specialist is also using the same acronym. She
- 23 mentioned receiving an email from a certified
- 24 | nutrition specialist indicating that language had been
- 25 agreed upon between the Board of Nursing and the

clinical nurse specialists.

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Ms. Pachter Schulder clarified that there was a discussion regarding the language, but there was no agreement as this is a matter for the Legislature.

Ms. Rowe amended her comments to indicate that it was now her understanding that there was an ongoing discussion.

Ms. Rowe noted continuing the military member or spouse inclusions as well as violations of the bill to be subject to fines and penalties.

Noah Logan, Governmental Affairs Specialist,
Pennsylvania State Nurses Association, noted Senate
Bill 115 regarding the Nurse Licensure Compact was in
the Senate Appropriations Committee.

Mr. Logan addressed House Bill 106/Senate Bill 240 regarding the Patient Safety Act and staffing, noting a combined committee and union effort now on one single bill.

Mr. Logan referred to House Bill 953 that would create the new position of Chief Nursing Officer of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania for the Department of Health sponsored by House Majority Whip Donna Oberlander.

Mr. Logan noted Senate Bill 425 regarding informed consent agreements is being monitored.

Maria C. Battista, JD, EdD, Director of Policy and Government Affairs, Pennsylvania Coalition of Nurse Practitioners (PCNP), noted awaiting Senate Bill 25, which would provide full practice authority for nurse practitioners, to leave the committee to be considered by the full Senate. She mentioned tracking other bills dealing with informed consent, including Senate Bill 425. She noted also monitoring House Bill 1022, where a physician may delegate to an approved practitioner, including a nurse practitioner.

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Dr. Battista noted PCNP being in support of House Bill 681 dealing with a ban on non-compete agreements or clauses in health care practitioner agreements.

Dr. Battista provided a list of key bills and requested input from the Board of Nursing regarding their position related to House Bill 325, concerning advisory opinions from licensing boards and whether the Board has a position on Senate Bill 25 concerning full practice authority.

Marc Farrell, Deputy Policy Director, Department of State, explained that the Department would be asked to conduct a bill analysis where they would request input of the Board through Board Counsel. He stated the Department did not support the advisory opinions bill as it would create the need for additional

attorneys to review requests and increase the costs and fees to licensees. Mr. Farrell was not sure where the Department stood on House Bill 25.

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Dr. Battista commented that informed consent does not affect nurses directly but does affect nurse practitioners and questioned whether the Board had a position on the two informed consent bills. Mr. Farrell indicated that he was not aware of any position that had been formed at the Department level.

Dr. Battista questioned whether the Board had a position on the telemedicine bill because Governor Wolf wanted the Boards to determine which waivers or changes made to licensing during the COVID-19 pandemic could become permanent in the future.

Dr. Battista mentioned submitting a letter on that bill noting certain language should be changed that would also include "lifetime practices" because of situations where a physician or a physician assistant or nurse practitioner may not be directly associated with a hospital or facility. She stated the bill would have a negative impact on a sole practitioner because the practitioner could not have an affiliate if a substitute was required.

Mr. Farrell stated the Department was in favor of the concept of telemedicine, working through waivers

from the pandemic, and would be providing a report with recommendations to Governor Wolf's Office by May 4, 2021.

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Mary Marshall, Director, Workforce & Professional Services, The Hospital and Healthsystem Association of Pennsylvania, noted their support for Senate Bill 25 concerning the nurse practitioner legislation and House Bill 931 and Senate Bill 416 concerning the nurse anesthetist legislation. She also mentioned support for House Bill 1011 regarding regulatory flexibilities and waivers currently in place and House Bill 387, House Bill 388, and House Bill 389 regarding legislation to transition military veterans with health care training.

Jennifer Horn, Manager, Pennsylvania Action
Coalition, discussed working with the Pennsylvania
Coalition of Nurse Practitioners (PCNP) to push Senate
Bill 25 with stakeholder meetings, advisory board, and
many other organizations. Ms. Horn looked forward to
the release of the next Future of Nursing Report and
will be working with stakeholders this summer to
convene in groups to digest the report and looked
forward to advancing the report based on needs of
various groups.]

- 22 discipline which is also confidential.
- 23 Vice Chair Kmetz commented that the implications
- 24 of joining the Compact were widespread in
- 25 Pennsylvania, especially with discipline disclosure

and fees, after discussing the Compact with
representatives from Compact licensure states at the
National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN)
meetings. She mentioned that not all large states had
chosen to become Compact states.

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- Mr. Logan mentioned the importance of the wishes of Pennsylvania nurses, noting 90% of nurses nationally support being in the compact. He stated PSNA surveyed other American Nurses Association (ANA) member constituent states where the states already in the Compact love it, but their board structure is different and more collaborative with state organizations. He noted nurses in Pennsylvania believed it was the job of the State Board of Nursing to become a Compact state.
- Mr. Logan recommended the Board allow Jim Puente to provide an informational session presentation regarding the Compact.
- Commissioner Johnson commented that the economic impact numbers were still being reviewed.
- J.J. Livingston, Democratic Executive Director,
  Senate Consumer Protection & Professional Licensure
  Committee, noted Senator Boscola is the prime sponsor
  of Senate Bill 115 to put Pennsylvania into the Nurse
  Licensure Compact. He noted a growing number of

states have joined the Compact, stating Pennsylvania did not want to be in a situation to be left out as more states join.

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Mr. Livingston mentioned being thankful and grateful for provisions and emergency waivers in Pennsylvania and looked forward to working with the Commissioner and his staff as well as the House and Senate.

Dr. Battista requested clarification concerning disfranchisement to those who enter the VRP and would no longer have that ability should Pennsylvania join the Nurse Licensure Compact. Ms. Pachter Schulder clarified that all licensees could participate in both VRP and Practice, Education, Remediation, and Collaboration (PERC); however, VRP and PERC are considered private discipline. Ms. Pachter Schulder stated individuals with a single state license in Pennsylvania would be able to avail themselves of the confidentiality of PERC and VRPs, and those with multistate licenses would still be able to avail themselves of the programs, but they would not be confidential and would have the same impact as being in the Disciplinary Monitoring Unit (DMU).

Dr. Chandler mentioned improved exit scores in students with utilization of the HESI programs. She noted students also enroll and participate in a HESI Live Review, and faculty members participate in Mountain Measurement training. She noted writing

about the NCSBN test plan and mapping the curriculum 1 2 to the test plan. She discussed the test plan with 3 students. She reported on updating their care plan to the care plan recommended for use by KeithRN. 4

Ms. Pachter Schulder requested information regarding Q1 and Q2 pass rate results. Dr. Mattis noted the pass rate decreased due to one student in the second quarter who took the exam and failed. He reported 20 of the 21 graduates in 2020 took the NCLEX, and 19 passed, including first-time and repeat test-takers. He noted the last quarter of 2020 pass rate was 80%.

Dr. Mattis stated Lincoln University was addressing both academic and socioeconomics issues by paying for the exam and encouraging students to take the exam as soon as possible to increase their chances of passing. He noted bringing in someone from pharmacology and pathophysiology at least three different semesters to develop content because of what was found in Mountain Measures.

Dr. Mattis noted Lincoln University will look at the curriculum this summer to make changes and additions to start in the fall, and faculty will look at Mountain Measures to guide them along with data analytics.
