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Wesley J. Rish, Esquire, Rish Law Office, LLC, 1 2 Counsel for Respondent, discussed item 32.1 3 4 Regulation Update 5 [Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel, 6 referred to Act 41 for the Board's review and discussion at the December meeting. She noted the addition of a Continued Competency piece for registered nurses (RNs), practical nurses (PNs), 10 certified registered nurse practitioners (CRNPs), and 11 clinical nurse specialists (CNSs) who have not 12 practiced for 5 years but want to restore their 1.3 licenses. Ms. Pachter Schulder noted that under current 14 15 regulations, applicants are required to pass either 16 the National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX) 17 again or take a reactivation course and pass its 18

regulations, applicants are required to pass either the National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX) again or take a reactivation course and pass its applicable examination or practice in another jurisdiction during the lapsed period. She mentioned that at the December meeting the Board must decide whether they use the 2-year or 5-year language in this proposal.

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Ms. Pachter Schulder provided a regulatory update, noting the Nursing Education Program regulations were with Regulatory Counsel for review.

- 1 | She mentioned that the statement of policy for CRNPs,
- 2 | the ABC-MAP (Achieving Better Care by Monitoring All
- 3 Prescriptions Program) regulations and Opioid
- 4 | Continuing Education regulations will have the
- 5 Preamble and RAF drafted after the Act 41 regulations
- 6 | are prepared. She stated the Volunteer Health License
- 7 | regulation is going to proceed with other boards and
- 8 | is being done by other counsel. She noted Child Abuse
- 9 regulations were moving along as adopted.]

- 11 | Pennsylvania Legislative Update
- 12 [Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel,
- 13 reminded everyone that this is a sine die year. She
- 14 | referred to House Bill 100 regarding CRNPs, noting the
- 15 proposal to have a pilot program for CRNPs. She
- 16 explained that a CRNP who practiced for 3 years and
- 17 3600 hours in collaboration with a physician would be
- 18 permitted to independently practice in a "health
- 19 professional shortage area" determined by the Federal
- 20 Government and Department of Health.
- 21 Ms. Pachter Schulder provided information
- 22 | concerning additional certification for those
- 23 interested in the pilot program. She stated the pilot
- 24 | program would set up a committee made up of physicians
- 25 and CRNPs, which would be a subcommittee of the Board.

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She stated the Board would be required to write regulations, and the subcommittee would help review the regulations and applications submitted regarding primary care experience.
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Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to Senate Bill 870 regarding physician assistants, which would remove approval of the supervising written agreement. She explained the differences between the CRNP collaborative agreements and prescriptive authority collaborate agreements and physician assistant agreements. Ms. Pachter Schulder noted language changes in Senate Bill 870 regarding supervision, where the words "directing" and "personally" have been removed, and the word "responsibility" added.

Ms. Pachter Schulder pointed out Legislative
Resolutions that recognized Midwife Week from October
4 to October 10 and Pediatric Nurse Week from October
5 through October 11.]

Commissioner Johnson noted working with the
Office of Administration concerning posting the
Nursing Education Advisor position and would keep the
Board and stakeholders posted.

Commissioner Johnson addressed information technology (IT) communication issues and announced the transitioning away from the eAgenda platform to something more modern. He mentioned the importance of folks maintaining their pa.gov email addresses because the new platform would require everyone to access information through pa.gov. He offered assistance from IT to anyone having issues with email.

Commissioner Johnson commented that multi-factor authentication is required for the new platforms so knowing how to use that security measure is beneficial.

Ms. Miller provided tips for licensee renewals,

advising everyone to have their Child Abuse Continuing

15 Education completed with enough time for the provider

16 to send the data to the Board and to register using

17 the name on their license. She informed everyone to

18 contact the provider if it had been over a week since

19 completing the Child Abuse Continuing Education (CE)

20 and it is not showing in their record.

21 Ms. Miller emphasized the importance of reviewing

22 answers before submitting renewal applications, noting

23 that licensees who do not complete requirements by the

24 deadline would be required to submit a reactivation

25 application rather than renewal applications.

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Ms. Miller noted that the Board has received the

       the Act 53 Proposed List of Crimes related to the
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       nursing profession
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   [K. Kalonji Johnson, Commissioner, Bureau of
25
   Professional and Occupational Affairs, addressed Act
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53, which was signed by Governor Wolf in June 2020 1 2 with an effective date of 180 days. He noted that 3 under the Act, as Commissioner, he is required to publish a schedule of offenses directly related to the 4 5 practices of each profession under the auspices of the 6 Department of State after soliciting public comment. He commented that the offenses listed are not an automatic bar to licensure but rather creates a rebuttable presumption. Additionally, the list will 10 eventually be part of a regulation package that must 11 undergo regulatory review.

Cynthia K. Montgomery, Esquire, Deputy Chief
Counsel, Department of State, referred to the list of
criminal offenses draft, which is a schedule of
criminal convictions that may constitute grounds to
refuse to issue, suspend, or revoke a license,
certificate, registration, or permit for each
profession.

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Ms. Montgomery stated the list was developed by Board Counsel and Prosecution based on prior cases and case law and by reviewing Act 53, and the Board's enabling Acts - the Professional Nursing Law and the Practical Nurse Law. She noted receiving one written comment on October 21 from the Pennsylvania Coalition of Nurse Practitioners expressing some concerns and

1 asking for additional time to review the remainder of 2 the list.

2.4

Ms. Montgomery referred to § 3117 of Act 53, where the application of the schedule would be used for preparing preliminary determination, where individuals considering entering the nursing or dietetic-nutrition profession could apply for a preliminary determination to determine whether their criminal history record information would be an impediment to licensure, used in determining discipline of a licensee, and used in determining whether to refuse to issue a license to an applicant.

Ms. Montgomery referred to § 3113(d) regarding sexual offenses, which applies to all health care practitioners. She also referred to § 3113(e) regarding acts of violence, where an individual could receive a license if it had been at least 3 years from incarceration or 3 years from imposition of the sentence, the individual has remained conviction-free, and demonstrates significant rehabilitation.

Ms. Montgomery noted the Board must be convinced that the individual does not pose a substantial risk to the health and safety of patients, clients, or the public or a substantial risk of further conviction.

She provided a definition of "directly related," when

evaluating items on the list.

Ms. Montgomery stated crimes on the list of offenses directly related to the profession have a rebuttable presumption, where the Board believed licensure of the individual would pose a significant risk to the safety of their clients or the public or a significant risk of further criminal convictions. She noted the individuals would have to prove they do not pose such a risk.

Ms. Montgomery addressed criminal convictions not determined to be directly related, where the Prosecution Division would have to prove that the individual poses a substantial risk.

Ms. Montgomery stated the Commissioner would be consulting with the Board to determine if the list is acceptable to the Board.

Ms. Malady thanked everyone who worked so hard on the list, noting the Board strives to be fair and looks at rehabilitation in adjudicating matters.

Commissioner Johnson stated the process is more transparent for individuals who have questions concerning criminal history and is also a tool for the public to better understand how to acclimate through the process.

25 Commissioner Johnson addressed preliminary

determination, where somebody thinking about entering the profession would be able to get a clear understanding of whether or not their criminal history may impact their ability to pursue the profession. He pointed out that the process does not fundamentally change the Board's role or responsibility.

Dr. Kmetz commented that as a program director, having a student be able to receive a preliminary determination before even applying to nursing school would be so helpful.

Ms. Montgomery stated the list would become part of a best practices guide, explaining the process and how boards were going to evaluate criminal history record information to allow individuals to learn upfront what they need to receive a license. She referred to the list of criteria in § 3113(c) that the Board would need to consider. She questioned whether any groups or members of the business community with knowledge of the profession at the meeting would like to address the list.

Jonathan Humma, Legislative Director, Senate of Pennsylvania, addressed Act 53 of 2020, noting that Senator John DiSanto was the primary sponsor. He stated Act 53 would extend second chances to rehabilitated citizens and eliminate criminal record

lifelong barriers to obtaining an occupational license in Pennsylvania. He noted Act 53 seeks to prohibit the consideration of non-job related and irrelevant criminal records and create greater transparency in licensing determinations.

Mr. Humma stated licensing boards were to complete individualized assessments of an applicant's conviction and rehabilitative factors and simply listing an offense as directly related to the profession must not automatically preclude an applicant from licensure unless specified in Act 53.

Mr. Humma noted that the State Board of Nursing must strike a critical balance of affording applicants a real opportunity to demonstrate their worthiness of licensure while simultaneously protecting the health and safety of patients.

Mr. Humma thanked the Board for their thoughtful consideration as they work to implement Act 53 in a way that maintains professional licensing safeguards while lifting unnecessary or unclear restrictions.

Maria C. Battista, JD, EdD, Director of Policy and Government Affairs, Pennsylvania Coalition of Nurse Practitioners (PCNP), referred to PCNP's comment letter and requested additional time to review and comment on the remaining crimes. She noted the key

1 concerns PCNP has relates to the issue of whether any
2 of these crimes truly relate to the practice of the
3 profession.

Dr. Battista commented that the purpose of Act 53 was to give people second chances and the opportunity to have a profession and is perplexed at the number of offenses that were directly related. She believed the list was heavily weighted with rebuttable presumptions and was not equitable.

Dr. Battista compared the State Board of Medicine and State Board of Osteopathic Medicine, where a physician assistant being supervised by a physician under the Medical Board has only 57 crimes that create a rebuttable presumption. She also mentioned a physician assistant, who is equivalent to a nurse practitioner, has only 62 crimes that create a rebuttable presumption under the Osteopathic Board, as opposed to the State Board of Nursing's list that has 141 crimes.

Dr. Battista questioned the equitableness of the variations between the three Boards. She requested the Board justify 141 crimes, many of which were unrelated to the practice of the profession.

Dr. Battista questioned how there could be such disparity between the evaluation process and the

rebuttable presumption between the Boards when the safety issue is the same.

Dr. Battista requested that PCNP receive an extension of 30 days to give a final review of all the crimes. She also requested the Board of Nursing reconcile the difference of the list of 141 crimes to the list of the Board of Medicine and Board of Osteopathic Medicine and how that applies.

Dr. Battista expressed a concern with more individuals becoming physician assistants instead of nurse practitioners because the individuals would have a better chance of becoming licensed in the application process. She believed the list under the Board of Nursing should be much shorter and should be similar to the Board of Osteopathic Medicine and Board of Medicine; otherwise, there is no reason for an individual to become a nurse practitioner.

Ms. Pachter Schulder explained that the list provided in December would be a more broken-down version, and the Board would look at all of the comments.

Dr. Battista commented that PCNP wants to see balance and equitability and did not see that in the list as provided. She believed many of the crimes would be challenged at the Commonwealth Court if the

- 1 Board decided to keep the list at 141. She would like
- 2 to see the list reviewed again in light of the
- 3 equivalency of a nurse practitioner to a physician
- 4 assistant and the disparity between the two.
- 5 Ms. Malady requested information regarding David
- 6 Andrew King v. the Bureau of Professional and
- 7 | Occupational Affairs, cited in PCNP's comment letter,
- 8 and how it relates to the list of offenses.
- 9 Ms. Pachter Schulder explained that King is a
- 10 | Board of Barber Examiners disciplinary case involving
- 11 a 2007 conviction for the felony of involuntary
- 12 deviate sexual intercourse that occurred nine years
- 13 prior to issuance of the Order to Show Cause. During
- 14 | the intervening years, Mr. King obtained a barber
- 15 license. The Barber Board took the position that
- 16 despite the passage of time and any rehabilitation, a
- 17 person who commits this offense is permanently unable
- 18 to obtain a license.
- 19 Ms. Montgomery further explained that under Act
- 20 | 53, the felony offense of involuntary deviate sexual
- 21 intercourse is a statutory bar to licensure for which
- 22 | the Board has no discretion.
- In response to PCNP's request to provide
- 24 additional comment, Ms. Pachter Schulder recommended
- 25 PCNP provide any further comment by November 23rd for

discussion at the December 3rd Board meeting, which would still give the Commissioner an opportunity to publish the list before the end of the year.

Commissioner Johnson stated that one of the intents of Act 53 was to move away from the amorphous discussion of moral character and focus on directly relating to an individual's ability to practice based on the Act, looking beyond character and looking at whether the offense constitutes an imminent safety implication to the public and to other members of the profession. He welcomed feedback from all of the stakeholders.

Dr. Battista suggested the Board ask the question of whether the crime directly relates, and if it does not, then it should not be on the list for the rebuttable presumption when evaluating the crimes between now and December.

Dr. Battista thanked the Board for allowing PCNP the opportunity to submit comments and to provide additional comments before November 23rd.

Deborah Little, EdD, RN, CNE, Corporate Assistant Dean of Nursing, Lincoln Technical Institute, noted working with students from very diverse backgrounds and seeing students from the beginning to when they graduate and exemplify professionalism. She believed

it to be fair for students to know upfront before
going through all of the time and expense and then
finding out they cannot be licensed. She noted the
list was overly exhaustive and did not believe all of
those things should preclude someone from being a
nurse.

Commissioner Johnson emphasized that the offenses were not preclusions to practice or bars to licensure but offenses that implicate the question of suitability to practice.

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Ms. Pachter Schulder further explained that besides the sexual offenses that the statute specifically says are bars to licensure, if an offense is listed, there is a rebuttable presumption; however, the Board must still look at the remaining mitigation elements in Act 53 meaning that an applicant can still proceed with an application if they have a crime on the list aside from the ones barred from the statute.

Chair Coughlin noted the Board and stakeholders would continue working on categorizing, communication, and dialogue.

Ms. Montgomery noted the list would be compared with the Medical and Osteopathic Medical Boards lists noting both Boards received comments and were working on revising their lists. She invited stakeholders to
