- 9 noted Lincoln's pass rate of 70 percent, which had
- 10 increased from the '18-'19 pass rate of 54.17 percent
- 11 and the '17-'18 pass rate of 66.67 percent.
- 12 Dr. Mattis stated Lincoln's Department of Nursing
- 13 over the summer developed a curriculum committee and a
- 14 | faculty development committee as well as a plan that
- 15 reviewed admissions criteria, curriculum, and student
- 16 needs. He noted the program was fully integrated with
- 17 ATI and Kaplan going forward. A full-time coordinator
- 18 | will address any deficiencies and provide tutoring and
- 19 support.
- 20 Dr. Mattis stated the faculty development
- 21 committee was now operational, and the full-time
- 22 | coordinator was nonexistent until this fall. He
- 23 indicated that all the courses in the fall have a
- 24 | check to help identify students who need additional
- 25 assistance. Dr. Mattis discussed implementation of

- the requirement that graduates must register with
 Pearson Vue to take the NCLEX® and apply for licensure
 with the State Board of Nursing exams beginning in the
 spring of 2021.
 - Ms. Pachter Schulder stated the Living and
 Learning Community was something established
 previously and inquired if it was a requirement that
 all students stay. Dr. Mattis responded that all
 students are permitted to stay and are required to
 participate.

- Dr. Mattis discussed the faculty development and noted that a person was hired, who has taught the fundamental courses such as physiology and pharmacology for 12 years, to help in terms of development, content, and setting up assignments to ensure the students are actually "getting it," which was not previously available to students. A full-time doctoral prepared faculty with experience in tutoring and remediation was hired as part of the program.
- Dr. Allen credited the leadership that Dr. Mattis brought to the program. She commented on the difference between having a plan and implementing a plan and the difference between providing resources and actually utilizing those resources. She further commented on a really big difference, which was Dr.

1 Mattis's style of including faculty and students 2 moving forward.

Dr. Joseph echoed the sentiments offered by
President Allen, commented on the turnaround realized
under the leadership of Dr. Mattis, and that going
through the accreditation process was also very
helpful in improving the program. Board members had
questions.

Dr. Mattis noted the cohort size this year for seniors was 15 and 18 for juniors. The incoming group for the fall 2021 maximum would be 30.]

24 Ms. Pachter Schulder noted that Prism's pass rate

25 | in '19-'20 was 73.15 percent and in '18-'19 it was

75.44 percent, an improvement over '17-'18's pass rate of 59.92 percent. The Board noted that this is the 7th year that Prism would be on provisional status.

Ms. Pachter Schulder asked representatives to elaborate on the change of program director, the letter to students and potential applicants, which raised a concern regarding the accurate representation of the approval status of the program, and the letter to the Board regarding the program's pass rates, which was not on the program's letterhead.

Mr. Mann indicated that Prism's previous

Director, Dr. Jennifer Holzer, decided to pursue other professional pursuits. Prior to her leaving, she was able to train the Assistant Director of Nursing and put into place many successful processes that Prism continues to take forward.

He explained that Prism has both a day and very successful evening program. Ms. Williams was asked and agreed to take over the role as Director of Nursing when Ms. Holzer departed, and Ms. Gordon and Ms. Bloomfield serve as Assistant Directors of Nursing.

Mr. Mann discussed the cohort size, which he noted was between 38 and 40 students for evening and between 30 and 40 students for day. Determining which

students have the ability to be successful after the
first term cuts the cohort down in size. Mr. Mann
noted that beginning in January of 2022, the program
would reduce its cohort size. Board members discussed
their concerns regarding the continued below minimum
requirement pass rate and the large size of the
cohorts despite those pass rates.

Mr. Mann was asked to discuss how Prism measures success and what additional stresses Prism was working through to get back to a pre-pandemic state. He indicated that Mountain Measurement reports, pass rates, and student feedbacks are reviewed.

2.4

The Board noted that with the program's short length and admission cycles, the pass rates should have been turned around by now. Mr. Mann noted ATI is utilized as the standardized test throughout the program.

Ms. Williams explained students needing assistance are provided with a virtual ATI coach and one-on-one tutoring is also available. An 8-10 students to one clinical instructor ratio was noted.

Mr. Mann explained TEAS scores were reviewed

"with a fine-tooth comb," and it was still difficult

to find a "sweet score." He noted additional criteria

reviewed during the first semester included attendance

1 and academic progress. Board members had additional 2 questions and comments.

Ms. Williams stated a student who graduates with all "A"s and fails the NCLEX would be reviewed further to assess the reason for the failure.

Ms. Bloomfield added that she had been with Prism in different positions for seven years and this is the best administrative team she had seen at the facility. She indicated that more evidence-based education and knowledge was being utilized. She was currently studying for certification in healthcare and simulation operations.

Mr. Mann was asked to clarify why the cohort size would not be cut until 2022. He noted the class size had been cut, and there were 44 full-time and adjunct instructors. He advised that the student-to-instructor ratio is 35-40 students with one instructor and one TA in place for two years. In that the pass rate has not improved, the Board recommended that each aspect of the program needed to be reviewed.

The Board discussed amendments needed to the letter being sent to current and prospective students which inaccurately advises that "Prism Career Institute remains fully approved."]

 percent, in '18-'19, 62.5, and '17-'18, 66.67, which

 was an improvement over '17-'18 and '18-'19. Ms.

 Shafer was asked to explain planned areas for

 improvements and provide justification for a continued
 extension.
 - Ms. Shafer noted when she took over for Dr. Don Johnson in September of '19, a few changes were made but would not be totally realized just yet. She discussed the Wonderlic Test being administered previously and noted the admissions assessments and exit exams were added since she had taken over.
 - She also noted changes to the compensation packages for faculty. Faculty were getting paid more based on the amount of experience and education they possessed. Additionally, faculty were being encouraged to obtain a higher degree of education. She stated there were some testing delays due to COVID.

Ms. Shafer remarked that reports from Mountain Measurement were reviewed with faculty with regard to weaker areas and what could be done to make the curriculum stronger. She reviewed faculty training for online programs.

As for the changes to the curriculum, the Board noted that delegation is not within the scope of practice for practical nurses and that if the Board approved the curriculum change, it would be subject to the removal of the delegation information.

Ms. Vincent questioned why the evening cohort was being eliminated. Ms. Shafer commented that only three students attend the evening course, and it was just not worth keeping.]

Chair Coughlin pointed out that practically Act 53 does not change the way the Board reviews applications because it currently reviews the offenses committed, applicants' mitigation and rehabilitation, and the length of time between the commission of the crime and the application for licensure. She noted that none of the crimes would be an absolute disqualification for licensure. She commented that in many past cases, the Board has been amenable to either granting licensure or offering the ability to obtain a probationary license rather than provisionally denying an application. Vice Chair Malady commented that within the last five years, the Board has suspended, revoked or accepted the voluntary surrender of a license only 657 times. There have been very few provisional denials.

Commissioner Johnson questioned whether the Board was prepared to make articulable guidelines for members of the public and prospective advocates. He noted the purpose of the list and the process for prospective applicants had to be clearly articulated, and Act 53 is designed to afford applicants equitable

footing in the process.

Ms. Pachter Schulder advised the Board that the list on the agenda, that was also emailed to stakeholders, is broken down differently from the previous month as there is a category for enumerated sexual offenses that are statutory bars to licensure, enumerated drug trafficking offenses, and an expanded list of crimes based upon ancillary statutes including the Medical Marijuana Act, applicable to CRNPs, the Public Welfare Code, and the Vehicle Code.

Commissioner Johnson explained the issue was not whether the Board considered a crime but rather whether the burden shifted from the applicant to the Board or Commonwealth in terms of rebutting a presumption.

Cynthia Montgomery, Esquire, Deputy Chief Counsel, read Section 3113 of the Act that provides that there shall be a rebuttable presumption that licensure of an individual with a criminal conviction that directly relates to a profession would pose a substantial risk to health and safety of the individual's patients, clients or the public or a substantial risk of further criminal convictions. She explained that if a crime was on the list and an individual who performed that crime would apply for a preliminary determination or

Ms. Pachter Schulder suggested that in addition to

the Texas justification and the Delaware regulations, the existing Standards of Conduct in 21.18 and 21.148 are also instructive in terms of misappropriation and accurate reporting.

William Newport, Esquire, added that Prosecution reviewed the list multiple times and had numerous discussions within their office regarding the matter. He commented that Prosecution was totally in support of the list and recommended that the Board adopt the list as sent to stakeholders. Ms. Kieselhorst asked that the Act 53 list of crimes also apply to the practice of dietitian-nutritionists.

Tarik S. Khan, MSN, RN, FNP-BC, President,

Pennsylvania State Nurses Association (PSNA),

commented that PSNA was opposed to the most recent

list of crimes, that it was not equitable nor were any

of the crimes directly related to the profession and

misinterpreted Act 53. Mr. Khan stated Senator John

DiSanto, the prime sponsor of the legislation, wrote,

"The purpose of this bill is to require that Boards

only withhold a license for convictions which are

directly related to the practice or the occupation."

He stated that crimes such as writing bad checks or

retail thefts are neither directly related to the

profession nor remotely related to nursing. Mr. Khan

commented that this list of crimes would clearly
disproportionately affect nurses of color in the
Commonwealth, particularly the African American
registered nurses, because black Americans are five
times more likely to be arrested and charged with

crimes than whites due to racism.

- He concluded that PSNA, PA-ACNM, and PCNP prepared a proposed list of crimes similar to the list proposed by the Medical and Osteopathic Boards and encouraged the Nurse Board to create a subcommittee to collaborate with the Commonwealth nursing organization on a list of crimes that directly relate to the profession of nursing and serving patients.
 - Maria C. Battista, JD, EdD, Director of Policy and Government Affairs, PCNP, referred the Board to the list sent on November 20, 2020, attached to the agenda.
- Mr. Khan stated the submitted list was reflective of what nurses should be measured against when applying. Commissioner Johnson explained that the Board had to make sure to create protocol that clearly defines the process and the current language had to be included to maintain equitable outcomes.
- Ms. Battista requested seven days from the meeting to meet with the other associations for

One RN program and six (6) PN programs 10 continued on provisional approval.
