23 Dr. Dalton provided a slide presentation to identify

2.4 Board members and offered information relating to the

25 Federation's background and educational services.

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Dr. Dalton stated the Federation was founded in 1912 and has offices in Euless, Texas. She mentioned that the Washington, D.C. office will be moving to a new location. She noted that Dr. Humayun (Hank) Chaudhry is the Secretary of International Association for Medical Regulatory Authorities (IAMRA). Doctors of Osteopathic Medicine are leading the group internationally and nationally.
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She outlined the committees and workgroups, including Board Education Service and Training, Medical Education for Medical Regulation and Physician Wellness and Burnout, which has become an international group. She noted the workgroup to Study Regenerative and Stem Cell Therapy, that was formed this year, and a Prescription Drug Monitoring Program (PDMP) Committee.

Dr. Dalton discussed the Board and the Nominating Committee. She is the Chair of the Ethics and Professionalism Committee.

She commented that the United States Medical Licensing Examination (USMLE) was not immediately pertinent to osteopaths, but when allopathic and osteopathic medicine come together through a single accreditation process, the USMLE will become attractive to osteopathic graduates.

Dr. Dalton noted the Federation is run by the House, and each Board sends a representative to the House as a voting member. Currently, there are 16 members, 13 elected and 2 appointed.

Dr. Dalton provided additional material for review at the Board's convenience.

Mike Dugan, Chief Information Officer and Senior Vice President for Operations, stated the work of the Federation of State Medical Boards is to serve the member Boards. The organization is currently 105 years old and was founded in information sharing via printed materials distributed periodically.

Mr. Dugan referred to the Federation as a data aggregator. He noted data is collected from USMLE, NPI, Death Master File, NCCPA, ABMS and AOA.

Mr. Dugan discussed a Federation Credentials

Verification Service (FCVS) program, which includes

source-verified credentials, medical education,

graduate medical education and licensure.

Mr. Dugan referred to a public tool in which information can be accessed concerning a physician's credentials and a census that is updated every two years. The Uniform Application is a tool for a physician to complete their information and apply to multiple states, which contributes to license

portability.

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Mr. Dugan stated that FSMB is a supplier of the USMLE transcripts. 81,000 were provided last year, nearly 42,000 with FCVS. He noted a good working relationship with the National Board of Osteopathic Medical Examiners (NBOME).

Mr. Dugan informed the Board that all member
Boards have access to the Physician Data Center (PDC)
at no cost, which includes board specialty
certification information from the American
Osteopathic Association (AOA), as well as American
Board of Medical Specialties (ABMS), and complete
licensure and discipline history. Nearly 15,000
disciplinary alerts were sent to member Boards in
2016.

Mr. Dugan discussed a Special Purpose Exam (SPEX) that is used in special instances. FCVS source verification is a lifetime repository by the Federation of State Medical Boards that is used in about 50 percent of licensing decisions and has data for more than 250,000 physicians.

Mr. Dugan referred to the Physician Data Center and Medical Regulatory Trends and Actions for further discussion.

With regard to educational offerings, Mr. Dugan

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noted the 2018 Federation of State Medical Boards

Annual Meeting which will be held in Charlotte, North

Carolina, the Board Attorneys Workshop in San Diego

and New Executive Orientation.
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The Federation of State Medical Boards is accredited by the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education (ACCME) with regard to certification of activities provided by the Board which is free of charge.

Mr. Dugan referred Board members to a list of publications, including the <u>Journal of American</u>

<u>Medical Association</u> (JAMA) which is published annually, as well as eNews. He stated that Dr. Humayun (Hank) Chaudhry is active on twitter, and referred to a new social media expert in Washington, D.C.

Dr. Dalton referred Board members to information regarding the advocacy and policy services group, actions by the 2017 House of Delegates mandatory use of prescription drug monitoring, advocacy for professional licensure of EMS providers and guidelines for granting licensure by endorsement and assessment of the standards of ACGME International. She mentioned that as Chair of the Ethics and Professionalism Committee, the group has been studying

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compounding issues, overlapping surgeries, peer review issues and duty to report.

Mr. Dugan addressed statistics regarding the Interstate Medical Licensure Compact Commission. He referred to the "heat" map for further discussion of Pennsylvania's 6,430 actively licensed osteopathic physicians with licenses in other states.

Questions and comments were addressed from Board members with regard to competition between USMLE and AOA, the Interstate Medical Licensure Compact, and medical specialty data which is made available at no cost.]

The reason for this, apparently perfusionists were leaving the state rather than risk not passing all three parts of their examination and immediately losing their temporary license and their jobs, and hospitals were not wanting to risk.

So this proposed regulation simply just conformed our regulation to the status of the current statute. And I would recommend a motion approving the regulatory package.

This proposed regulation is based upon the Committee's direction. It defines approved internship and approved residency that anticipates the merger of the AOA and the ACGME.

Basically, the significant change for an unrestricted license would require the successful completion of an approved internship or successfully completing an approved residency.

So an approved internship is

defined under Section 25.244, which

must span a minimum of 12 months and

provide the following experiences:

There is general practice for one

month, general internal medicine for

two months, a one-month general surgery

rotation, one month of obstetrics and

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gynecology, one month of pediatrics.

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So this still retains the possibility of an individual becoming licensed after one year if they complete the approved internship or their licensure would be delayed until they complete their residency program.

The other significant change deals with the licensure by endorsement. The Board recognizes the difficulty of people who may have been out of osteopathic school for quite some time and offers, as an additional alternative to the COMLEX Level 2 practical examination or the Pennsylvania Osteopathic Manipulative Treatment Examination, the completion of at least three hours of AOA Category 1-A, continuing osteopathic medical education and osteopathic manipulative

The sixth requirement would be additional work in a core category or emergency medicine for three months and three months of electives chosen by the intern or the resident.
