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3 * * * 1 2 State Board of Osteopathic Medicine 3 October 24, 2018 * * * 4 5 The regularly scheduled meeting of the State Board of 6 Osteopathic Medicine was held on Wednesday, October 7 24, 2018. Randy G. Litman, D.O., Chairman, called the 8 meeting to order at 9:30 a.m. * * * 9 10 Approval of Minutes of the August 22, 2018 meeting 11 CHAIRMAN LITMAN: 12 Has everybody reviewed the minutes from 13 the August 22 meeting, and do I have a 14 motion for approval? 15 DR. POGGI: 16 So moved. DR. BULGER: 17 18 Second. 19 CHAIRMAN LITMAN: 20 All in favor? 21 [The motion carried unanimously.] * * * 22 23 [John B. Bulger, D.O. and Burton T. Mark, D.O., 24 Secretary, exited the meeting at 9:31 a.m. for recusal 25 purposes.]

4 * * * 1 2 Report of Prosecutorial Division 3 [Keith E. Bashore, Esquire, Board Prosecutor, presented the Consent Agreement for File No. 18-53-4 5 04113.1 * * * 6 7 [John B. Bulger, D.O. and Burton T. Mark, D.O., 8 Secretary, reentered the meeting at 9:32 a.m.] * * * 9 10 [Aaron Hollinger, Board Administrator, exited the 11 meeting at 9:32 a.m. and reentered the meeting at 9:32 12 a.m.] * * * 13 14 [Keith E. Bashore, Esquire, Board Prosecutor, 15 presented the Consent Agreement for File No. 17-53-16 010294.1 * * * 17 18 [Adam Williams, Esquire, Board Prosecutor, presented 19 the Consent Agreement for File No. 18-53-03201. He 20 also presented the Consent Agreement for File No. 14-53-01240 on behalf of Ray Michalowski, Board 21 22 Prosecutor.] 23 * * * 24 [Wesley J. Rish, Esquire, Board Counsel, reminded 25 Board members and associates that Act 6 of 2018

requires every licensee to report disciplinary actions 1 2 and criminal convictions against their license to the 3 Board within 30 days.] * * * 4 5 [Tara J. Smith, Esquire, Board Prosecutor, presented 6 the Consent Agreement for File No. 18-53-005559.] * * * 7 8 [Jason T. Anderson, Esquire, Board Prosecutor, 9 presented the Consent Agreement for File No. 18-53-10 006886.1 * * * 11 Report of Regulatory Counsel 12 13 [Kenneth J. Suter, Esquire, Regulatory Counsel, noted 14 the need for approval of the proposed Preamble 15 16A-5334 regarding application and renewal fees. MR. SUTER: 16 17 I need a motion to approve the preamble 18 language. 19 DR. TURSI: 20 So moved. 21 DR. POGGI: 22 Second. 23 CHAIRMAN LITMAN: 24 All in favor? 25 [The motion carried unanimously.]

* * * 1 [Kenneth J. Suter, Esquire, Regulatory Counsel, 2 3 addressed the ongoing medical education regulation. 4 Mr. Suter noted a comment from the Indiana Regional 5 Medical Center (IRMC) Orthopedics Physician Group who 6 do not have any problems with the regulation. He also 7 noted comments from the American Osteopathic 8 Association who provided detailed information as to 9 how they would amend the regulation. 10 Mr. Rish noted the need for discussion regarding 11 comments by the American Osteopathic Association (AOA) 12 and the Pennsylvania Osteopathic Medical Association 13 (POMA). He stated that the Board defined and approved 14 internship as an osteopathic rotating internship 15 completed before June 30, 2020, approved by AOA or an osteopathic-recognized training program accredited by 16 the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical 17 Education (ACGME) that includes at least 24 weeks of 18 19 rotation in certain categories. 20 Mr. Rish noted that their suggestion is to define the approved internship as a postgraduate year (PGY) 21 22 of one year approved by AOA.

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Dr. Bulger stated that the first piece is editorial, noting a postgraduate (PG) one year approved by the AOA or designated osteopathic focused

or ACGME training that includes the 24 weeks. 1 2 Dr. Tursi noted that a problem would be an 3 internship approved by the AOA, where they still do 4 not seem to get the fact that the Board does not 5 recognize Resolution 42, and that is not going away. 6 Dr. Bulger commented that he is fine with the PGY 7 one year and a designated osteopathic position, which 8 they editorially corrected. He suggested taking the 9 editorial language for the middle one and leaving the 10 rest of it. He noted concern regarding their comment 11 that the proposed changes reflect the fact that state 12 survey agencies (SAs) will not change the need or the 13 availability of Resolution 42. 14 Mr. Rish explained that their proposed amendment 15 would provide for acknowledgement of Resolution 42. 16 Mr. Suter stated that it is easier to deal with 17 their comments now even if the Board does not change 18 it because they will have the opportunity to 19 officially comment, and the Board will have to show 20 IRRC that the they have responded to comments.] 21 * * * 22 Report of Board Chair - No Report 23 * * * 2.4 Report of Vice Chair - No Report 25 * * *

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1 Report of Department of Health

2	[Arlene G. Seid, M.D., M.P.H., Department of Health,
3	present on behalf of Rachel Levine, M.D., Physician
4	General, addressed the Pennsylvania Medical Marijuana
5	Program.

6 Dr. Seid discussed noted key aspects, including 7 patient safety and administration of the law signed by Governor Wolf on April 17, 2016, which authorized the 8 9 Pennsylvania Department of Health to create the Office 10 of Medical Marijuana. She stated that the 11 Pennsylvania's Department of Health will administer 12 the program; issue the medical marijuana card; and 13 issue permits to grow, process, and distribute.

Dr. Seid explained that patients need to be a resident of the Commonwealth, have a serious medical condition as designed by the law, and have a condition certified by a physician.

Dr. Seid stated that medical marijuana acts as an antiemetic in cancer, reduces chronic pain, provides palliative and/or therapeutic treatment, and decreases spasticity related to MS. She noted that the American Academy of Neurology has created guidelines and provided support for the use of medical marijuana to treat MS symptoms.

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Dr. Seid commented that medically supervised

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marijuana's use is associated with decreases in opioid 1 2 prescribing and self-reports of opioid misuse. She 3 stated that Act 16 allows vaporization or 4 nebulization, pill or capsule, topical tincture or 5 oil, liquid suspension, and the addition of dry leaf in August. She noted eight facilities that are 6 7 allowed to research medical marijuana under Act 43 of 8 2018.

9 Dr. Seid discussed marijuana supply from seed to 10 use and the process to meet pharmacological standards, 11 noting a set concentration in each bottle that is 12 grown to have a specific concentration of 13 tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) vs. cannabinoid 14 concentration. She commented that there is an issue 15 with dosage.

Dr. Seid commented that the key participants of the distribution line are the grower/processor, laboratory, practitioner dispensary, and then the patient and the caregiver. She noted regulations, inspections, labeling, laboratory testing, and physician training.

Dr. Bulger commented that the physician is not writing a prescription and just certifying they have a disease.

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Dr. Seid clarified that physicians can write it

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like a regular prescription or delegate that 1 2 responsibility to the dispensary. 3 Dr. Swallow questioned how a physician can write 4 for dosage when it is a Schedule I. 5 Dr. Seid explained that a physician can write it but cannot dispense it. 6 7 Dr. Poggi suggested physicians supplying 8 certification for conditions but dispensaries giving 9 the dosage, stating that physicians cannot write 10 prescriptions for something that there is no evidence 11 on, and if the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) 12 states that physicians cannot do that, then it becomes a whole other issue for the Board. 13 Chairman Litman noted concerns with online 14 15 registered physicians in the Commonwealth who 16 satisfied the requirements for medical marijuana 17 leading to unregulated use of this medication. 18 Dr. Swallow noted that Pennsylvania's licensed 19 physicians who work for federal institutions or 20 facilities are prohibited from participating in any of 21 this. 2.2 Dr. Tursi noted concerns with conditions on the 23 list being too broad and being rubber stamped. Нe 2.4 stated that there is no regulation and the correct 25 dose or correct form is not known.

Dr. Seid commented that issues regarding 1 2 qualified standards would be the Department of State. 3 Ms. Shekletski stated that there have been 4 complaints of this nature, noting attorneys from the 5 Department of Health and attorneys from the Department 6 of State are meeting tomorrow to discuss the program 7 and enforcement. She also noted that a licensed 8 medical consultant will be attending the meeting. 9 Dr. Swallow noted concerns regarding liability 10 issues with no established dosages for the THC that is 11 being dispensed. 12 Dr. Seid noted a Medical Marijuana Advisory Board 13 made up of mostly physicians and other practitioners 14 for advice on policies and principles. She commented 15 that medical marijuana is dispensed to registered 16 patients and caregivers and that every dispensary must employ a medical professional who is registered and 17 18 has completed at least the 4-hour course. 19 Chairman Litman questioned whether there is a 20 mechanism similar to the Prescription Drug Monitoring 21 Program (PDMP). 2.2 Dr. Seid explained that there is access to a 23 system for marijuana similar to the PDMP once an 24 individual has completed the education and is

25 registered.

Mr. Rish commented that the primary care physician who is not prescribing would not be aware that their patient has been prescribed medical marijuana.

5 Dr. Seid explained that physicians know when 6 patients tell them or the physician took the course 7 and is registered.

Dr. Swallow stated that the practitioner or 8 9 physician may not issue a patient's certification at 10 the dispensary, the physician at the dispensary cannot 11 certify that the patient has a disease, the physician 12 at the dispensary makes sure what is being dispensed 13 is appropriate for whatever disease, and the same 14 person cannot be the one titrating the dose and 15 dispensing.

16 Chairman Litman commented that if a physician is 17 registered, the physician is privy to what is 18 happening with their patient but may also receive 19 referrals from others beyond their own caseload.

20 Dr. Seid discussed steps to become eligible for 21 an ID card, minors and homebound patients, and 22 caregivers.

Dr. Seid discussed Phase 1 and Phase 2 permits for growers/processors and dispensaries. She noted Chapter 20, where they have their research partners

and need to choose their dispensary partners. 1 2 Dr. Tursi questioned who is responsible for 3 regulating the cases that are being rubber stamped. 4 Mr. Rish noted that the Department of State has 5 not pursued any medical marijuana regulations and that 6 it would be the responsibility of the State Board of 7 Osteopathic Medicine and State Board of Medicine who 8 still have the authority to regulate practitioners who 9 violate the Practice Act. He commented that 10 Ms. Shekletski and her prosecutors would be bringing 11 those type of cases to the Board based on complaints.] * * * 12 13 Report of Regulatory Counsel 14 [Kenneth J. Suter, Esquire, Regulatory Counsel, noted 15 Act 90 of 2018, which was recently passed and signed 16 by Governor Wolf. Mr. Suter stated that the bill 17 establishes a comprehensive framework for public 18 education about organ and tissue donation and 19 clarifies the methods for making anatomical donations 20 and updates the law to reflect the best clinical 21 practices to support anatomical donations for 22 transplants. Act 90 will require the Board to 23 promulgate additional regulations.] * * * 24 25 [John B. Bulger, D.O. exited the meeting at 10:29 a.m.

and reentered the meeting at 10:35 a.m.] 1 * * * 2 3 Report of Deputy Commissioner 4 [Katelin Lambert, Deputy Commissioner, present on 5 behalf of Ian J.
