Weber, D.P.M., Chairman, called the meeting to order at 9:31 a.m. K. Kalonji Johnson, Acting Commissioner, Bureau 10 of Professional and Occupational Affairs, was not 11 present at the commencement of the meeting. \* \* \* 12 13 Meeting Call to Order 14 CHAIRMAN WEBER: 15 Could I have a motion to call to order, 16 please? 17 DR. committee and independent regulatory review commission
review, revisions, final rulemaking, post publication
review, legislative committee and independent
regulatory review commission again, and publication of

the final regulation.

She reviewed the sources of regulations, including the courts, legislature, the public, BPOA, prosecution division, as well as Board members themselves.

Ms. Montgomery explained that when Counsel drafts an annex, an exposure draft is sent out for informal comments and sent back to the Board for consideration of revisions. Counsel would then draft a preamble, which contains statutory authority for the regulation, a description of the proposed regulation, analysis of fiscal impact and paperwork requirements, sunset data, if any, and information regarding how to submit formal comments, suggestions or objections regarding the proposed regulation.

She noted that a regulatory analysis form is also completed by Counsel, which is a requirement by the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) under the Regulatory Review Act. Review by the Office of Chief Counsel, the Governor's Office of Policy and

Planning, the Governor's Budget Office are the next steps in the process.

Ms. Montgomery explained that after review by all those levels, the proposed rulemaking is published and delivered to the House and Senate Committees for review which for this Board is the House Professional Licensure Committee and the Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee. She indicated that after public comment, IRRC also will comment on the proposed rulemaking, and Ms. Montgomery discussed the criteria that IRRC must consider.

Ms. Montgomery further explained that after review of all of the comments received, the Board prepares a final regulation with any changes, but that substantial changes would result in republication of the proposed regulation and the process would start over again.

She discussed the following three options if IRRC disapproves a final regulation, which would include withdraw of the regulation, submitting the regulation with revisions within 40 days of the disapproval or submitting the regulation unchanged accompanied by a report. Ms. Montgomery noted that after concerns are addressed by IRRC to their satisfaction, the regulation is approved and sent to the Attorney

General for approval, delivered to the Legislative
Reference Bureau for final publication and ultimately
for codification in the Pennsylvania Code.

It was noted that under Section 204 of the Commonwealth Documents Law, an agency may omit doing a notice of proposed rulemaking but only under limited circumstances, and discussed what those circumstances included.

Ms. Montgomery explained that sine die adjournment occurs every two years during which the legislative session ends and results in waiting for a specified time period in the new legislative session to deliver to the standing committee of the House and the Senate.]

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Acting Commissioner Johnson responded that the Board has to be careful not to endorse certain providers, but stated that changing the general language to state that some of the programs may be offered at low to no cost would be appropriate.
