3 * * * 1 2 State Board of Podiatry 3 June 20, 2018 * * * 4 5 The regularly scheduled meeting of the State 6 Board of Podiatry was held on Wednesday, June 20, 7 2018. Robert B. Weber, D.P.M., Chairman, called the 8 meeting to order at 9:34 a.m. * * * 9 10 Approval of Minutes of the April 18, 2018 meeting 11 CHAIRMAN WEBER: 12 Could I have a motion to approve the 13 minutes if everybody has reviewed them 14 and are comfortable with them? 15 DR. GREENBERG: Motion for that. 16 17 DR. PARIS: Second. 18 19 CHAIRMAN WEBER: 20 All in favor? 21 [The motion carried unanimously.] * * * 22 23 Report of Prosecutorial Division 24 [Paul J. Jarabeck, Esquire, Board Prosecution Liaison, introduced Tara J. Smith, who will be replacing Katie 25

1 Delp, as a Board Prosecutor.

2	Chairman Weber wished Ms. Smith success and			
3	offered a partnership in working with the Board.]

5	Report of Board Counsel			
6	[Kenneth J. Suter, Esquire, Board Counsel, updated the			
7	Board on the current status of opioid education and			
8	the current requirements to comply with opioid			
9	education verification. He noted possible changes in			
10	the future.			
11	Chairman Weber stated a licensed individual would			
12	be required to complete two hours of continuing			
13	medical education (CME) for the biennial renewal of			
14	licensure. Four hours of CME would be required for an			
15	initial license He referred to the students at the			
16	Pennsylvania College of Podiatric Medicine (PCPM) as			
17	having a very good educational background in opioids.			
18	Dr. Paris questioned gray areas regarding			
19	courses.			
20	Mr. Hollinger explained the requirement for a			
21	course description should a licensee request approval			
22	of a course not containing opioid in its title. He			
23	stated one or two hours in pain management or a			
24	similar category would be accepted for the Certificate			
25	of Completion required for renewal.			

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Chairman Weber noted the burden on the state and 1 2 mentioned an incentive, through the Governor's Office, 3 for pharmaceutical companies to develop a barrier, 4 instead of using opioids for pain. He noted the 5 combination of Motrin (ibuprofen) and Tylenol (acetaminophen) that offers relief comparable to 6 7 codeine for many patients. Chairman Weber referred to a nurse on a combination of Motrin and Extra Strength 8 Tylenol on a routine basis and Lyrica twice a day, who 9 10 did not need any opioids for pain.] * * * 11 12 Report of Regulatory Counsel 13 [Kenneth J. Suter, Esquire, Regulatory Counsel, 14 discussed pending regulations and stated the volunteer 15 license needs updated with the current law. 16 Mr. Suter noted new regulatory counsel devoted to 17 regulations. He explained the foundation has been 18 laid to move forward with a number of the regulations, 19 and progress is being made to be more comprehensive. 20 Commissioner Harlow referred to Executive Order 21 Advisory Committee data. He requested the Board 2.2 determine where there are barriers or restrictions to 23 be removed from the Board's regulations.] * * * 24 25 Report of the Board Chair

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1 [Chairman Weber introduced guest Sabrina Minhas, 2 D.P.M., Vice President, Pennsylvania Podiatric Medical 3 Association, Director at Solis Roxborough Hospital, 4 which has one of largest Podiatry programs in our 5 state.

6 Chairman Weber suggested a proclamation to thank 7 Dr. Gerland for his 19 years of involvement and all of 8 his efforts. He also noted Board photos to be taken 9 at the next meeting.

10 Chairman Weber stated that whoever the Governor 11 chooses for Dr. Gerland's position could review 12 continuing education in advance, make a list before 13 the meeting, and find the problems of not meeting CME 14 qualifications before the meeting. He also mentioned 15 that the Commissioner could send an email so the Board 16 could proceed sooner and be decisive.

17 Dr. Greenberg questioned whether the Board was 18 permitted to discuss matters on the agenda before the 19 meeting. Mr. Suter stated the Board cannot have 20 meetings or conference calls outside of the Board meetings. He stated the Board could form a 21 subcommittee of the group to review the CEs and report 22 23 back to the Board within the context of the Board 24 meeting.

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Chairman Weber showed his appreciation regarding

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1 the voting at the last meeting. He also expressed his 2 appreciation to Melissa for serving on the Probable 3 Cause Committee with a letter thanking her 4 wholeheartedly for her work.

5 Chairman Weber discussed podiatrists in the state 6 that have served in the military and his desire for 7 them to serve in the Reserve or National Guard as 8 podiatrists. There was never the opportunity for 9 podiatrists, similar to that for dentists, MDs, or 10 DOs. He suggested a position should be formed for 11 podiatrists to serve the Commonwealth.

Commissioner Harlow agreed to consult with the Department of Military and Veterans Affairs (DMVA) and engage the Governor Wolf's Policy Office on the matter.]

17 Report of Commissioner 18 [Ian J. Harlow, Commissioner of Professional and

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19 Occupational Affairs, updated the Board on the 20 Executive Order Advisory Committee's report to 21 Governor Wolf issued on June 11, 2018. He discussed 22 podiatry in comparison to other states in the region. 23 Pennsylvania was at or below average in terms of its 24 fees, CE requirements, and training requirements. 25 Commissioner Harlow explained the next step would

be to work with the Boards and stakeholders to review the licensing operations for barriers that exist and need changed. He stated the Board can then make recommendations to his office and the Policy Office to draft crucial legislative or regulatory changes.

6 Chairman Weber noted concerns with opening the 7 Podiatry Act and whether there was a mechanism in the 8 Commonwealth that would treat the act like a will.

9 Mr. Suter explained changes to regulations can be 10 made as long as the Board has the authority within its 11 Act.

Commissioner Harlow informed the Board that the Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS) was in its stabilization period with additional resources to provide support until the end of July. He noted a brand-new help desk for PALS with the addition of eight contract employees to answer PALS-related guestions.

19 Commissioner Harlow acknowledged the hard work of 20 Mr. Hollinger and his colleagues who processed nearly 21 10,000 graduate medical training licenses for 22 residents of hospitals.] 23 *** 24 Report of Board Administrator - Application 25 [Aaron Hollinger, Board Administrator, noted the

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Reactivation Application and three CE Program Approval 1 2 Applications for discussion in Executive Session.] 3 * * * 4 For the Board's Information/Discussion - Board Meeting 5 Dates 6 [Chairman Weber noted the 2018 and 2019 Board meeting 7 dates.1 8 CHAIRMAN WEBER: 9 We know what the upcoming Board meeting 10 dates are for 2018 and 2019.
