3 * * * 1 2 State Board of Podiatry 3 October 17, 2018 * * * 4 5 The regularly scheduled meeting of the State 6 Board of Podiatry was held on Wednesday, October 17, 2018. Robert B. Weber, D.P.M., Chairman, called the meeting to order at 9:40 a.m. Chairman Weber expressed his thoughts regarding 10 the importance of having value in life on the road to 11 success. * * * 12 13 Approval of Minutes of the June 20, 2018 meeting CHAIRMAN WEBER: 14 15 Could I have approval of the minutes, 16 unless there are any issues about the minutes? 17 DR. GREENBERG: 18 19 I make a motion to approve. 20 CHAIRMAN WEBER: 21 Second? 22 DR. PARIS: 2.3 Second. 2.4 CHAIRMAN WEBER: 25 All in favor?

[The motion carried unanimously.] 1 2 3 Report of Prosecutorial Division 4 [Paul J. Jarabeck, Esquire, Board Prosecution Liaison, 5 introduced Codi Tucker, Esquire, as the new Board 6 Prosecutor. Chairman Weber welcomed Ms. Tucker.] * * * [Codi M. Tucker, Esquire, Board Prosecutor, presented the Consent Agreement for File No. 15-44-09739.] * * * 10 11 Report of Board Counsel 12 [Kenneth J. Suter, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted Item No. 3 for discussion in Executive Session.] 13 14 15 Report of Regulatory Counsel 16 [Kenneth J. Suter, Esquire, Regulatory Counsel, 17 addressed proposed Annex 16A-4417 regarding continuing education. Mr. Suter informed the Board that the 18 19 decision at the last meeting to decrease the number of 20 required continuing education credits became an 21 initiative of the Governor's Office to decrease 2.2 barriers to licensees. The Governor's office wants 23 this regulation to move quickly. 24 Mr. Suter sent an exposure draft to the public 25 and stakeholders on August 14, 2018, for their input

but no responses were received.

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Mr. Suter discussed the regulation change in Section 29.61 to decrease the hours to 45, a change related to the approval of CE credits, and a change of the clock hours. He also noted the incorporation of an assessment as desired by the Board.

Mr. Suter discussed accommodating IRRC with the existing changes. He also mentioned the Board's language that a podiatrist is not required to complete continuing education in a renewal cycle in which they completed their residency or in a renewal cycle in which they were initially licensed, which is the regulation.

Chairman Weber commented that this would not have any negative effect on the public and have a positive effect on podiatrists as far as economics.]

MR. SUTER:

What I am going to look for at this point is a motion approving Regulation 16A-4417 regarding continuing education, the annex which is the regulation and the accompanying regulatory package.

7 Report of Board Chair

8 [Robert B. Weber, D.P.M., Chairman, discussed home

9 health prescribing issues. He noted problems with

10 being a nonphysician when prescribing for patients in

11 Health Partners. He suggested having Counsel

12 representation on the affects to the public.

Dr. Paris referred to a letter from a network

14 home physical therapy provider who would not honor any

15 prescriptions from podiatrists regardless of the

16 patient's insurance company. Chairman Weber suggested

17 redefining procedures for classifying podiatrists as

18 | physicians. Dr. Greenberg suggested including

19 podiatrists along with physicians.

20 Mr. Paris stated that Pennsylvania does not

21 regard podiatrists as physicians, and Pennsylvania

22 | insurance plans, including all of the Medicaid plans,

23 do not regard podiatrists as physicians.

24 Mr. Suter will confirm the Department of Human

25 | Services (DHS) guidelines regarding Health Partners.

He stated a physician is defined for Medical
Assistance purposes under DHS Regulations, noting that
changing the definition would not change reimbursement
under their own regulations. Changing the definition
of physician in one of the acts would not change the
definition in the DHS regulations.

Mr. Suter referred to the Medical Care

Availability and Reduction of Error (MCARE) Act, where

physician is not defined but refers to healthcare

practitioners as being "physicians." He explained

that podiatrists have their own section in MCARE

without all of the general provisions. If podiatrists

were defined as physicians, podiatrist would be

included within the entire MCARE Act.

Dr. Greenberg suggested approaching DHS to request the change within the DHS regulations permitting orders for physical therapy and wound care of the lower extremities include physicians and podiatrists. He suggested explaining to DHS that Pennsylvania has indigent patients and citizens who are not getting access to home wound care and home physical therapy for lower extremity problems.

Chairman Weber suggested to avoid any type of discrimination and encourage the recognition of podiatry through the proper channels.

Ms. Haluszczak questioned the possibility to make it nonhistorical and to change the definition going forward so that the acts that it affects would not be for the regulation, and the older definition would not be affected by the new change in the definition.

Mr. Suter stated from a legal perspective that it could create chaos and be detrimental in some respects to podiatrists. He noted complications with changing the general definition. Mr. Suter noted a conference call, where he explained the difficulty in changing a definition with Commissioner Harlow, Mr. Hollinger, and Dr. Weber.

Dr. Greenberg stated Mr. Suter would utilize the definition as discussed.]

DR. GREENBERG:

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We are looking at a motion for

Mr. Suter to address DHS to include

podiatry as being allowed to write

prescriptions for patients who are on

Health Partners for home care for

physical therapy, wound care, and

durable medical equipment which goes

along with physical therapy and wound

care that directly affects the safety

and welfare of indigent patients in

Pennsylvania.

Right now, those patients do not have access to prescriptions from podiatrists to have their wounds treated at home or to have physical therapy at home. We feel that this is a problem that needs to be remedied by including podiatry in DHS regulation.

Again, none of this involves any reimbursement issues that would flow to podiatrists. All of this is involving benefit to citizens of Pennsylvania.
