Catherine S. Spayd, Ph.D., Vice Chair, called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. 8 Todd B. Narvol, Esquire, Public Member, and Katelin Lambert, Deputy 9 10 Commissioner of Professional and Occupational Affairs, 11 were not present at the commencement of the meeting. \* \* \* 12 13 [Chris Stuckey, Board Administrator, reviewed the 14 emergency evacuation procedures for One Penn Center.] \* \* \* 15 16 Report of Board Prosecution [Karl Geschwindt, Esquire, Board Prosecution Liaison, 17 18 on behalf of Bridget K. Guilfoyle, Esquire, Board Prosecution Liaison, presented the Consent Agreements 19 20 for File No. 14-63-11177 and File No. 17-63-010385.] 21 \* \* \* 22 Discussion Items 23 [Richard F. Small, Ph.D., discussed the 2018 24 Pennsylvania Psychological Association Ethics 25 Educators' Meeting presentations, which covered

psychology technology, and ethics considerations for 1 2 therapy and assessment. 3 Dr. Small encouraged everyone to attend the 4 meeting next year in October.] \* \* \* 5 6 Report of Board Counsel 7 [C. William Fritz II, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted two hearings scheduled for the next meeting.] 8 9 \* \* \* 10 [Pursuant to Section 708(a)(5) of the Sunshine Act, at 11 9:16 a.m. the Board entered into Executive Session with C. William Fritz II, Esquire, Board Counsel, for 12 13 the purpose of conducting quasi-judicial deliberations on a number of matters that are currently pending 14 15 before the Board and to receive advice of Counsel. 16 The Board returned to open session at 10:03 a.m.] \* \* \* 17 18 [The Board recessed from 10:03 a.m. until 10:07 a.m.] \* \* \* 19 20 MR. FRITZ: 21 The Board met in Executive Session and 22 conducted quasi-judicial deliberations 23 on matters that the Board will vote on 24 after the presentation. \* \* \* 25

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[Todd B. Narvol, Esquire, Public Member, entered the 1 2 meeting at 10:06 a.m.] 3 4 Appointment - Pennsylvania Psychological Association 5 [Linda K. Knauss, Ph.D., ABPP, Widener University; Cheryll Rothery, Psy.D., ABPP, Chestnut Hill College; 6 7 Marie C. McGrath, Ph.D., Immaculata University; Rachael Baturin, MHP, JD, Pennsylvania Psychological 8 Association; and Camille St. James, M.S., Doctoral 9 10 Intern, Chestnut Hill College, introduced themselves. 11 Dr. Knauss presented information regarding guidelines for practicum experience counting towards 12 licensure for the licensing law in Pennsylvania. 13 She 14 discussed Act 53 of 2016, noting its support to all 15 psychology graduates in the state of Pennsylvania in providing the ability to complete their supervised 16 17 hours for licensure prior to receiving their doctoral degree as stated in that law. She mentioned the 18 19 postdoctoral supervised experience is difficult to 20 obtain, stating the intent of this change in the law was so that practicum hours could count toward the 21 22 experience requirement for licensure. 23 Dr. Knauss stated that practicum has expanded in 24 the last number of years due to the competitive nature 25 for internships. She commented that there are more

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doctoral students than there are internship 1 2 opportunities and more doctoral students than there 3 are American Psychological Association (APA)-accredited internship opportunities. 4 Dr. Knauss stated the Board has adopted the 5 6 position to only count hours approved after the 7 completion of internship towards the experience requirement needed to be eligible for licensure. 8 She commented that the Board has not changed the 9 10 experience requirements in accordance with the 11 legislative intent of the law. 12 Dr. Knauss urged the Board to consider practicum 13 hours, which occur before the internship and count

14 towards the supervised experience needed for 15 licensure.

Dr. McGrath stated 17 states have moved towards 16 17 this change, and the Association of State and 18 Provincial Psychology Boards (ASPPB) has issued 19 Guidelines on Practicum Experience for Licensure and 20 outlined the types of experience needed to qualify. She also referred to a copy of Ohio's regulations, 21 22 which are similarly explicit in terms of breaking down 23 the required experiences.

24 Dr. McGrath noted Exhibit 3 and 4 regarding 25 requirements for accreditation in terms of

constructing experiences that are developmentally
appropriate for students.

3 Dr. Erickson questioned whether it was 4 conceivable that a candidate would have enough 5 practicum hours to obviate the need for a postdoctoral 6 fellowship. Dr. Knauss replied that it was possible, 7 in addition to their required internship, that a 8 candidate would have enough practicum hours to meet 9 the experience requirement for licensure.

10 Dr. Erickson questioned experience at a practicum level compared to the experience as a postdoctoral 11 12 fellow. Ms. St. James noted practicum experience as a 13 doctoral student as being sequential, structured, 14 organized, and well supervised. She defined an 15 internship as an extension of that work, stating that she has the autonomy and leadership responsibility to 16 17 oversee some of the work of practicum students. She 18 also has the benefit through PPA of being with an emerging leader's group, many of whom were also 19 20 doctoral students.

Dr. Rothery commented on individuals entering with master's and bachelor's degrees, field placement, and roleplaying. She stated, of the 700 total hours, 24 240 are direct client contact hours in the role as a clinical psychology trainee.

Dr. Rothery addressed assessment experience that
involves test administration, scoring, interpretation,
and report writing

4 Dr. Erickson questioned the standards for all 5 programs. Dr. Knauss reviewed the requirements for 6 APA accreditation. She noted that any doctoral 7 program that is accredited by the American 8 Psychological Association has been determined to be in 9 compliance for the practicum experience of any 10 doctoral program that is accredited.

Dr. Small questioned whether there are requirements for a certain number of hours to be at the same place for experience. Ms. Knauss referred to detailed documents, representing not only the consensus from ASPPB but from the other states that accept practicum hours towards licensure experience. Dr. Rothery stated that there is an official

18 legal affiliation agreement between the institution 19 and the site.

20 Dr. Knauss noted that practicum students also 21 work with clients who have problems with addiction or 22 serious mental diagnoses and are closely supervised by 23 a doctoral-level licensed psychologist. Dr. Rothery 24 stated that community mental health settings, college 25 counseling centers, inpatient residential treatment

centers, drug and alcohol treatment centers, emergency
rooms, and juvenile detention centers are currently
being used for practica.

4 Dr. Small questioned what the argument would be5 against doing this.

6 Dr. McGrath explained that mobility regarding the 7 practices of Pennsylvania trainees compared to other 8 states is a concern. She mentioned that students 9 would need to be mindful of the requirements for a 10 specific discipline upon relocating to another state 11 to obtain licensure with pregraduation experience.

Dr. Knauss stated that practicum students are observed by their practicum supervisor in order to pass practicum requirements, and those evaluations are sent to the Commission on Accreditation for the program to have APA accreditation as a doctoral program.]
