[Julie Snader, Deputy Director, Bureau of Finance and Operations introduced herself and Kimberly A. Mattis, Director, Bureau of Finance and Operations.

Ms. Snader provided information regarding the Board's licensee population. Ms. Snader noted 6,359 licensees for FY19-20 with a steady increase in licensees since FY14-15.

Ms. Snader referred to sources of revenue, noting the biennial total for FY18-19. She noted the majority of revenue was from renewals and applications at 98 percent. She stated the last fee increase was in 2005. The current psychologist fee was \$300 biennially.

[Vito J. DonGiovanni, Psy.D., Chairman, referred to

the Association of State and Provincial Psychology 10

11 Boards (ASPPB) memo regarding Examination for

12 Professional Practice in Psychology Part 2 (EPPP-2)

and the concerns that would be raised in the American 13

Psychological Association (APA) Monitor article. 14 Не

15 noted a study concerning EPPP-2 related to the

16 validity and reliability of the test.

Dr. McAleer addressed his attendance at the ASPPB Meeting, noting that ASPPB did not mention the pending article in the Monitor. He stated ASPPB made a very strong case that this was the wave of the future, and the Board should consider the test for use in Pennsylvania. ASPPB stated the test was a psychometrically sound, as well as a legally-

24 defensible measure of competence that would help

25 ensure the quality of licensure and licensees in Pennsylvania.

Dr. Spayd expressed her concern for implications to the Board if they ignored that article suggesting Boards should not be adopting this test at this point in time.

Chairman DonGiovanni commented that ASPPB was not against the concept, according to Dr. Matt Turner, who noted they are for the concept but do not think the instrument itself was rigorously tested enough and validated.

Dr. Spayd commented on the equally strong judgments about the test, and she suggested someone with more expertise should weigh in because of not being ready and requiring additional validation. It is proposed to be a substitute for EPPP-1, instead of adding EPPP-2, where there would not be a Part 1 and only Part 2. Dr. Small suggested hiring an independent consultant to give the Board an opinion.

Dr. McAleer suggested there was an urgency to get the test in under the early adoption plan, but there are other jurisdictions holding back and waiting to see where this goes. He volunteered to take the EPPP-2, but it was not the full test and would not receive a score.

Chairman DonGiovanni mentioned the Pennsylvania

Chairman DonGiovanni expressed a concern with having only one hour to present during the luncheon. He noted Dr. McAleer offered to talk on the issues that were brought up at ASPPB, particularly in terms of threats to licensure. He stated Ms. Huntley also would allow a mock hearing to be scheduled for a couple hours.

Dr. McAleer mentioned the optics of the Board and the governance of PPA can be misleading on the same agenda at the same time.

teaching and taking the course. Ms. Stuckey noted
that Dr. DonGiovanni approved the request, and the
Board agreed.

Chairman DonGiovanni referred to the Psychology
License Universal System (PLUS), noting the discussion
by Dr. Siegel at the last meeting. He suggested
keeping the matter on the agenda for the Board's
consideration given the Pennsylvania Licensing System
(PALS) and computer-generated applications.

Acting Commissioner Johnson commented that there had been discussion internally regarding the applications in order to understand some of the precepts, as well as to reach out to ASPPB and to individuals who understand the technical requirements to recognize the required specifications in terms of finding ways to automate the process so the transfer of information can be seamlessly integrated with PALS, if the Board desired to proceed.]

[Chairman DonGiovanni noted discussion regarding the Grossman decision in Executive Session.

Dr. Erickson expressed his opinion and understanding of the Grossman decision, stating that it was decided before the Minors' Consent Statute was amended. He noted the current version of the Minors' Consent Statute expressly authorizes a parent to provide consent for a minor to receive and evaluation or treatment, mental health treatment specifically.

Dr. Erickson stated the position of the Board in the past had been where there is an order of custody that both parents' consents are necessary for the treatment for a child, which is inconsistent with the Minors' Consent Statute.

Dr. Erickson noted there was no expressed language within the APA ethics code requiring both parents' consents in order for a child to receive

treatment. He commented that this was inconsistent
with the Board's position in terms of a minor
receiving treatment requiring both parents' consents
if there is an order of custody.

Dr. Erickson stated APA Specialty Guidelines on child custody evaluations do not require both parents' consents. He commented, in terms of a child custody evaluation, it would be below the standard of care to perform a child custody evaluation without obtaining both parents' consents, which is different than assessment and treatment.

Dr. Small commented that the Board does not give advisory opinions and that is Dr. Erickson's take on Grossman and what kind of consent is required. He questioned whether there was some mechanism of communicating that, including just that the discussion was in the minutes.

Dr. Erickson mentioned that there is an attorney who frequently appears before the Board and is an avid reader of the minutes, which would help to alert this issue.

Acting Commissioner Johnson commented that a notification of this discussion in the minutes is a good start in terms of notifying the public about the Board and ensuring its decisions are consistent with

Pennsylvania law. He questioned if it would be
advisable to have discussions at some point about
possible regulatory changes in order to clarify the
Board's scope of authority and discretion, that its
authority is consistent with the scope of the Minors'

Dr. Erickson clarified that the Board adjudicates facts, and this would be an adjudication of law. stated the amended statute abrogated the Grossman 10 opinion as it applies to treatment and custody, and 11 the reliance on the APA ethics code in terms of 12 informed consent was misplaced because there is no requirement within the APA ethics code for both 13 14 parents' consents for the treatment of minors. He saw 15 no need to change the regulations, and if it were litigated, ultimately a court would decide. 16

Dr. Small commented that nobody disagreed with Dr. Erickson's interpretation and requested this statement be placed in the minutes.

Acting Commissioner Johnson clarified that the Grossman decision was a decision based on policy that was inconsistent with existing law.

- 23 Chairman DonGiovanni stated the Board policy of
- 24 three full-time equivalents may not provide the
- 25 | flexibility needed for psychologists to supervise

under IBHS. He noted that PPA suggested changing the wording of \$41.58 regarding the number of full-time equivalents to accept as designated the "supervisors shall simultaneously supervise no more than three full-time or equivalent part-time employees." designation of full-time and part-time shall be made in accordance with the employer's own personnel policy.

Chairman DonGiovanni noted that PPA wants to change, "supervisors in Intensive Behavioral Health Services shall be exempt from the limitation on the number of supervisees as found in the above regulation but shall be responsible for no more than 180 patients." He questioned whether the Board would consider amending §41.58 to adopt this requirement.

2.3

Dr. McAleer questioned such a change would have to go through the regulatory process. Ms. Lutz stated the amendment could be added to the package of updated amendments discussed at September's meeting.

Acting Commissioner Johnson questioned whether regulations right now discuss supervisory requirements for therapeutic service staff (TSS) workers and behavioral health clinicians. He believed the act itself does not provide any scope of authority, and the governance for those is generally found in some of

the regulations governed by Behavioral Health Services (BHS).

2.4

Acting Commissioner Johnson commented that TSS or paraprofessionals fall outside the scope of the regulation. He provided context in terms of the current frustration that the Department of Health (DOH) and Department of Human Services (DHS) were having with finding a way to wrap services around behavioral health specialists tending to minors.

Acting Commissioner Johnson noted this to be a big problem. He mentioned creative solutions that had been proposed and starting to bleed into the other health professions. He cautioned against being pulled into the war that exists with the other agencies and other professions, especially when there were no expressed statutory or regulatory provisions that deal with those clinical care workers.

Acting Commissioner Johnson further explained what the current Pennsylvania law requires for a behavioral health specialist license to get reimbursed for treatment for children on the spectrum. He stated there are not enough behavioral health specialists to supply the demand, so paraprofessionals are working with children one-on-one with no real regulations governing the supervisory requirements, the hourly

requirements, or whether or not there is a certain course of conduct or standard of care for those individuals.

Acting Commissioner Johnson noted this to be a creative way to corral them in under a licensed professional who at least would provide structure to that program. He also noted a real struggle with developing ways to help parents pay for these services and the current scheme was not working. He noted this to be a well-intentioned attempt to provide quality care but was not certain if it slightly contravenes existing law with regard to the practice act.

Dr. McAleer stated one of the concerns in the regulation refers to supervising graduate training, and many of those individuals do not have their Bachelors degree or some type of training. He questioned whether that means, in the spectrum of psychology supervising these individuals, they cannot do it because they do not have graduate training as indicated in the regulations.

Dr. McAleer noted a concern with the way psychology is practiced today with the increasing use of technicians to provide support to the licensed practitioner under their supervision, which may cause for restructuring of the regulation as well.
