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The regularly scheduled meeting of the State

Board of Psychology was held on Monday, August 12,

Vito J. DonGiovanni, Psy.D., Chairman, called

the meeting to order at 9:03 a.m.

10 [Chris Stuckey, Board Administrator, reviewed the
11 emergency evacuation procedures for One Penn Center.]

[Chairman DonGiovanni noted the formal hearing scheduled for 1 p.m.]

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16 Appointment - Carolyn A. DeLaurentis, Esquire, Deputy

17 | Chief Counsel, Prosecution Division Presentation

18 | [Carolyn A. DeLaurentis, Esquire, Deputy Chief

19 Counsel, Prosecution Division, introduced herself and

20 provided a brief summary of her professional

21 background.

Ms. DeLaurentis provided information for the

23 Pennsylvania State Board of Psychology for

24 | FY 2018-2019, noting that 79 cases were opened with 88

25 open files as of July 1, 2019.

Ms. DeLaurentis noted 14 warning letters, 2 suspensions, 4 reprimands, 2 voluntary surrenders, and 3 probations issued.

Ms. DeLaurentis noted 69 immediate temporary suspensions, in general, for the prosecution division in FY 2018-2019 with 11,359 open cases as of July 1, 2019. She reviewed the last fiscal year, noting that 14,030 cases were opened, which was up from 12,604 the prior year. She also noted 13,270 closed files the last fiscal year.

Ms. DeLaurentis addressed the Pennsylvania

Justice Network (JNET), where the prosecution division receives an alert when licensees from all of the Boards and Commissions are charged with a crime.

Ms. DeLaurentis noted that the Bureau of Enforcement and Investigation (BEI) attempts to serve the immediate temporary suspensions on the same day. She also commended the prosecutors for their great work.

Ms. DeLaurentis discussed the Office of General Counsel's Mediation Program, which is at no cost to licensees or the Board. She stated the consent agreements will reflect whether the cases were resolved through mediation.]

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   Report of Board Counsel
   [Dana M. Wucinski, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted the
   Board would be discussing the consent agreement
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   presented along with agenda items 6 through 7, 10
11
   through 19, and 24 in Executive Session.
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        Ms. Wucinski announced House Bill 1172, also
   known as Act 41 of 2019, was passed on July 1, 2019.
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   She stated Act 41 is an alternative path to licensure
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15
   by endorsement for people who are licensed and in good
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   standing in other states. She commented that
   individuals would be issued a license if the licensee
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   holds a current license from another state whose

   licensure requirements are substantially equivalent or
20
   exceed the requirements of the Commonwealth,
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   demonstrate competence in the profession through
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   methods determined by the Board which can include
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   practicing in another state for two of the last five
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   years preceding the date of application and have not
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   committed any act that constitutes grounds for
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refusal.

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Ms. Wucinski stated Act 41 also allows for a provisional license, which she then equated to the Board's temporary license. She explained that a holder of the provisional license may practice until the license is denied by the Board, the provisional license expires, or the holder fails to comply with the terms of the provisional license.

Ms. Wucinski informed the Board of the need for discussion regarding substantial equivalence. She mentioned the American Psychological Association (APA) accreditation, stating that it is not equivalent but noting the need to determine whether regional accreditation is substantially equivalent concerning competency. She referred to CE or working two years of the last five years in the profession or any other method the Board feels would establish competency.

Ms. Wucinski suggested creating a committee to review applications in between Board meetings so licensees do not have to wait until the next Board meeting when applying under Act 41. She noted that Act 41 was passed to help military spouses.

Ms. Wucinski addressed state exams, noting that the Board would need to review the requirements in other states to determine if the other state's

requirement is substantially equivalent to the
requirements in Pennsylvania. She commented that
individuals who come to Pennsylvania will not have to
take the state exam, and if they meet the requirements
for Act 41, the individuals may obtain a license.

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Ms. Wucinski addressed the provisional license, where individuals who come to Pennsylvania can start practicing on a provisional license immediately if the Board determines appropriate CE and competency.

Chairman DonGiovanni discussed residency requirements, noting prior denials due to residency requirements not being sufficient and meeting Pennsylvania's regulations.

Ms. Wucinski referred to item 6 on the agenda for discussion during Executive Session. She commented that people will be applying in Pennsylvania who are not from APA-accredited schools but have been licensed in another state for at least two years and have been practicing without incident or issues.

Ms. Wucinski explained that individuals must be licensed in another state and actively practicing. She commented that original endorsement regulations are not banished and that Act 41 is just an alternative path to licensure by endorsement. She noted that the Board's current standards are

equivalent, not substantially equivalent.

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Ms. Lambert noted Act 41 to be another tool in the toolbox for licensure, where Pennsylvania is not looking at the licensees on an individual basis for their qualifications and are considering the other state's regulations and requirements. She explained that requirements from the state the individual is coming from would be reviewed.

Ms. Wucinski commented that individuals in Pennsylvania must complete an APA-accredited doctoral program, and Walden and Capella online schools are regionally accredited, which is where determining substantial equivalence is important. She commented that the guidelines are to be utilized in future Board meetings and also by the committee created today to use when receiving Act 41 applications.

Dr. Spayd suggested contacting the Association of State and Provincial Psychology Boards (ASPPB) to determine the minimum CE requirements in other states.

Dr. McAleer commented that CE accomplishment is one of the lowest levels of competency and is why ASPPB is considering developing other tests pertaining to competency used nationwide in addition to the knowledge portion.

Mr. McAleer commented that APA accreditation

actually serves both the education and the competency portion. The Board is beginning to consider and examine on a case-by-case basis students who have graduated from APA programs and looking at perhaps using their practica experience to be equivalent.

Chairman DonGiovanni suggested that applicants should have at least 30 hours of CE, including 3 of ethics, in the past two or three years.

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Chairman DonGiovanni and Dr. McAleer offered to be on the committee to review applications.

Rachael Baturin, MHP, JD, Pennsylvania

Psychological Association, mentioned that about five states do not require CE at all, and the minimum requirements for CEs in some of the other states is 20 a year.

Ms. Wucinski noted that the competency section would include a provisional license, where individuals make up what they are lacking while working. She also noted that the Board could require that individuals must have been practicing two of the last five years in the profession.

Ms. Wucinski confirmed the Board's discussion of at least 30 hours of CE in the last two years with at least 3 hours in ethics. She questioned the Board whether there would be any additional hours.

Chairperson DonGiovanni commented that at least 3 hours for potential licensees to learn about Pennsylvania regulations and laws without taking the exam.

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Ms. Wucinski provided a summary of the Board's decision regarding Act 41, where the Board wants to have practice two of the last five years and wants to review the CE from the state the licensee is licensed to confirm at least 30 hours of CE in the last 2 years with at least 3 in ethics. She noted that the Board also wants to make it a requirement that individuals complete at least a 3-hour course regarding Pennsylvania regulations that could be part of the 30 hours.

Ms. Wucinski commented that information is still being gathered to determine how Act 41 is going to be created, whether it will be one regulation that applies to all Boards or looking at an addendum to their existing endorsement regulations for each individual Board. She stated the Boards have to come up with what they feel is competent, which will be the standard currently used.

Ms. Guilfoyle noted a concern with individuals in another state who know they are going to lose their license but have no disciplinary charges pending.

Ms. Wucinski stated complaints come in all the time against licensees, and the act does not require them to notify the Board if they have been questioned but should answer the questions honestly because it could be held against them in the future.

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Ms. Wucinski addressed the provisional license, noting that the Board could just defer to the existing regulation of six months with one renewal.

Ms. Baturin questioned whether individuals would need the suicide and the child abuse CE. Ms. Stuckey explained that new applicants who want to get a PA license must take a 3-hour course in child abuse and a 2-hour course for renewal. She stated the child abuse course is not required to receive a temporary license but will be needed if it is converted to a permanent license.

Chairman DonGiovanni questioned whether it can be mandated to require 1 credit for suicide prevention as part of that 30 hours of CE. Ms. Wucinski will research the issue. She mentioned that the Board will be giving the committee authority to grant licensure, but any questions regarding individuals meeting the requirements of Act 41 will go in front of the Board at the next Board meeting.

Ms. Wucinski referred to the proposed rulemaking

package concerning 16A-6320 regarding qualifications for licensure regulation. She noted the need to review changes concerning Section 41.32 regarding experience qualifications.

Ms. Stuckey noted prior discussion by the directors of clinic training and the Board concerning the law change which removed the requirement that one of the two years of supervised experience be completed after the award of the doctoral degree. She explained that the Board is currently accepting the predoctoral internship as a first year and looking for the second year to come after, but from the information provided by the directors of clinical training, the practicum that is completed prior to the predoctoral internship meets the Board's requirements for supervised experience.

Ms. Stuckey stated the practicum requirements were changed in February 2015 and went into effect in November 2015. She referred to information received from Dr. Linda Knauss, where she indicated that if someone started their doctoral program in September 2015 forward, the individual would already have two years of supervised experience when the individual completes the doctoral program and receives the degree.

Ms. Stuckey commented that if an individual started their doctoral program in September 2015 or forward, the Board would not need to look at any supervised experience because of the fact that their graduation would reflect the required two years from an APA-accredited doctoral program.

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Ms. Wucinski noted that the section will remain in effect for all other applicants who might be coming in and graduated from an APA-accredited school. She suggested putting a subsection in that says all applicants who began their doctoral program after September 2015 from an APA-accredited school do not have to meet this requirement. She suggested taking a vote today to begin waiving the requirement while awaiting a change to the regulations.

Ms. Stuckey stated there is a notice on the Board's website with regard to the review of supervised experience. Ms. Wucinski suggested putting something under announcements and in the FAQs.

Ms. Stuckey noted that September 2015 or after is automatic. She noted the importance of it being clear on the transcript when someone started their program. She mentioned that the director of clinical training for the doctoral program completes a form to verify that the program was accredited. She noted that the

Board asks for the date of predoctoral internship,

because when the Board is looking for that second year

to come after that, the Board needs to know when the

predoctoral internship is finished.

- Ms. Stuckey commented that those who began a program September 2015 and forward are automatic and assumes that anyone who began their program prior to that would have the burden of proof.
- Ms. Stuckey referred to Item No. 20 on the agenda regarding APA-Accreditation Standards for Practicum Training. She noted that Dr. Knauss provided a copy of the prior 2010 practicum requirements for APA for comparison.
- Ms. Wucinski suggested the addition of a subsection that states, "or can show they completed the requirements outlined in these regulations while in their doctoral program in an APA-accredited school."
- Ms. Wucinski referred to Section 41.52, noting the amendment or addition, "or other country" in accordance with the Act 41. She questioned removing or adding language to the regulation that will allow people from non-APA-accredited schools after a certain number of years. She questioned whether the Board wanted to have a standard or keep those case-by-case

to see if they are exceptional in the field of
psychology or have a standard that states they have
been practicing.

Chairperson DonGiovanni preferred a case-by-case basis. He questioned whether a subcommittee would need to be formed concerning requirements of both legislation and ethical changes in terms of APA.

Chairman DonGiovanni requested an extra Board meeting in September for regulatory review.

Ms. Stuckey informed the Board that Cindy

Montgomery will be attending the October meeting for a
review of the regulatory process.]

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14 MS. WUCINSKI:

Chairman DonGiovanni announced his invitation to Dr. Siegel from ASPPB to give a small presentation at the October meeting. He mentioned that the program may be something the Board would want to consider due to the Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS) and everything going electronic.]
