2 State Board of Examiners in Speech-Language

3 Pathology and Audiology

4 December 6, 2019

5 ***

6 The regularly scheduled meeting of the State
7 Board of Examiners in Speech-Language Pathology and
8 Audiology was held on Friday, December 6, 2019. Amy
9 S. Goldman, MS, CCC-SLP, Chairperson, called the
10 meeting to order at 9:32 a.m.

11 ***

12 [Chairperson Goldman welcomed Dr. Patrick Murphy to
13 the Board.

14 Dr. Murphy provided a brief summary of his
15 professional background.]

16 ***

17 Introduction of Board Members, Staff, and Audience
18 [Chairperson Goldman requested the introduction of
19 those in attendance.]

20 ***

21 Report of Prosecutorial Division - No Report

22 ***

23 Appointment - Carolyn A. DeLaurentis, Esquire, Deputy
24 Chief Counsel, Prosecution Division Presentation
25 [Carolyn A. DeLaurentis, Esquire, Deputy Chief

1 Counsel, Prosecution Division, introduced herself and
2 provided a brief summary of her professional
3 background. Ms. DeLaurentis commended senior
4 prosecutors and attorneys on their hard work.

5 Ms. DeLaurentis provided disciplinary information
6 for the Board for FY 2018-2019, noting that 24 cases
7 were opened with 20 open cases as of July 1, 2019.

8 Ms. DeLaurentis noted 11 warning letters, 2
9 suspensions, 1 reprimand, 1 voluntary surrender, and 2
10 revocations were issued in the last fiscal year.

11 Ms. DeLaurentis stated for the Bureau of
12 Professional and Occupational Affairs in general, for
13 FY 2018-2019 there were 69 immediate temporary
14 suspensions issued. She noted that there were 11,359
15 open cases as of July 1, 2019, with 14,030 cases new
16 cases having been filed and 13,270 closed. The number
17 of new cases increase from 12,604 the prior year.

18 Ms. DeLaurentis outlined the Office of General
19 Counsel's Mediation Program, which is available to
20 Respondents at no cost to the Respondents or the
21 Board. The written consent agreement will note the
22 matter settled as a result of mediation.

23 Ms. DeLaurentis addressed the Pennsylvania
24 Justice Network (JNET) system is a criminal justice
25 databank for Pennsylvania arrests and convictions.

1 She commented that the department licenses over 1
2 million licensees and now has the ability to receive
3 alerts on all licensees for pending and resolved
4 charges. She noted that for many Boards the increase
5 in cases is due to the automation in the Pennsylvania
6 Licensing System (PALS) and JNET.

7 Ms. DeLaurentis noted complaints can be received
8 through PALS at pals.pa.gov, self-reports, newspaper
9 articles, and industry reports. She explained the
10 complaint process, where cases are reviewed for
11 determination as to a violation of the act. Matters
12 to be investigated are sent to the Bureau of
13 Enforcement and Investigation.

14 Ms. DeLaurentis commented that paralegals work to
15 obtain documentation to prove criminal convictions and
16 then prosecution reviews the case. Upon the
17 determination that charges should be filed, the
18 Board's action might get triggered, and if it is
19 determined not to be a violation, a warning letter or
20 compliance letter may be sent.

21 Ms. DeLaurentis noted cases come before the Board
22 when charges are filed and either there is a
23 resolution through a consent agreement or an
24 Adjudication and order following a hearing. Both
25 require Board approval.

1 Ms. Pachter Schulder stated the Board has no
2 authority over cases that are not within the Board's
3 scope of practice and cannot give advisory opinions.

4 Chairperson Goldman questioned whether
5 pals.pa.gov was an anonymous reporting of complaints.
6 Ms. DeLaurentis explained that individuals who choose
7 to remain anonymous may do so but the complainant will
8 not be notified of the final action.

9 Ms. Pachter Schulder explained further that
10 complaints are not public documents as they are just
11 allegations and do not qualify for disclosure under
12 the Right-to-Know Laws.

13 Chairperson Goldman mentioned the importance of
14 the public and licensees being knowledgeable about the
15 complaint process. She noted having a session
16 accepted at the Pennsylvania Speech-Language-Hearing
17 Association, where part of the presentation may be
18 regarding complaints.

19 Ms. DeLaurentis encourages attorneys from all of
20 the Boards to conduct outreach to the professional
21 associations with the hope of discipline decreasing
22 over the next couple of years.]

23 ***

24 Report of Board Counsel

25 [Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel,

1 directed Board members to the minutes as a refresher
2 for a discussion regarding Act 41 draft regulations
3 and consideration for sending the draft to
4 stakeholders.

5 Ms. Pachter Schulder noted that during Executive
6 Session the Board would review one proposed
7 Adjudication and Order and deliberate on another. In
8 the latter two Board members are recused.

9 Ms. Pachter Schulder reiterated the recusal
10 guidelines and reviewed when recusals are mandatory or
11 discretionary. Mandatory recusal is required when a
12 Board member has a financial interest or involvement
13 in the matter. .

14 Ms. Pachter Schulder also noted one application
15 for a license to practice speech-language pathology
16 for deliberation during Executive Session as well.]

17

18 Report of Acting Commissioner

19 [K. Kalonji Johnson, Acting Commissioner, Bureau of
20 Professional and Occupational Affairs, noted customer
21 phone service improvements with the ability to leave a
22 voicemail and an after-hours functionality for
23 applicants, licensees, and members of the general
24 public. He also noted expanding the self-help
25 functionality in the first quarter of 2020.

1 Acting Commissioner Johnson thanked and commended
2 Ms. Matter and Ms. Pachter Schulder for their work
3 throughout the year. He also thanked the Board for
4 continuing to do great work.

5 Acting Commissioner addressed the transition to
6 Capitol Police in order to make security procedures
7 and policies more consistent with the Capitol Complex.
8 He mentioned the new public lobby hours are 8:30 a.m.
9 to 4:00 p.m. This will not affect Board members
10 desiring to enter early, but a badge will be needed or
11 an employee to provide access.

12 Acting Commissioner addressed the retooling of
13 the website with the navigator, which is a more user-
14 friendly interface for PALS. He noted the plan to
15 have the speech-language pathology and audiology page
16 available in the second quarter of 2020, which will
17 provide better guidance and instructions regarding the
18 application process.

19 Acting Commissioner Johnson noted improvements by
20 breaking down the application process into three
21 phases with the hope of eliminating confusion on the
22 front end that results in people calling and asking
23 questions that could have been answered earlier with a
24 little more education.]

1 Report of Board Chairperson

2 [Amy S. Goldman, MS, CCC-SLP, Chairperson, addressed
3 the poster session by the National Council of State
4 Boards regarding deregulation of professional
5 licensure.]

6

7 [K. Kalonji Johnson, Acting Commissioner, Bureau of
8 Professional and Occupational Affairs, exited the
9 meeting at 10:14 a.m.]

10

11 [Chairperson Goldman addressed her attendance at the
12 National Council of State Boards of Examiners Meeting.
13 She also mentioned the 2020 conference October 23-24,
14 2020, in Santa Fe, NM, with a preconference on October
15 22, 2020, for new member orientation.

16 Chairperson Goldman noted that much of the agenda
17 was on the national compact.

18 Chairperson Goldman addressed the Pennsylvania
19 Speech-Language-Hearing Association (PSHA) Meeting,
20 where the Board is scheduled from 4:15 p.m. to 5:15
21 p.m. on Thursday, April 2, 2020, at the Sheraton
22 Pittsburgh Hotel at Station Square.

23 Chairperson Goldman asked if a representative
24 from the prosecutorial division could be present to
25 review the complaint process. She mentioned all

1 members had received the information on utilizing the
2 state government Adventure Travel (ADTRAV).]

3 ***

4 CHAIRPERSON GOLDMAN:

5 I move that we approve the attendance of
6 the Board and staff to attend the PSHA
7 Conference in Pittsburgh April 2.

8 MS. DELANO:

9 I second that.

10 CHAIRPERSON GOLDMAN:

11 All in favor?

12 [The motion carried unanimously.]

13 ***

14 Report of Board Administrator - No Report

15 ***

16 Correspondence

17 [Amy S. Goldman, MS, CCC-SLP, Chairperson, referred to
18 a letter from the University of Pittsburgh, Department
19 of Communication Science and Disorders faculty,
20 concerning provisional licenses.

21 Ms. Matter noted the letter to be in reference to
22 an applicant who had a provisional license but had not
23 completed her clinical fellowship year (CFY). At the
24 last meeting, the Board denied the request for an
25 extension. The University of Pittsburgh was sending

1 additional information and requested the Board review
2 the license a second time.

3 The matter would be discussed during Executive
4 Session.

5 Chairperson Goldman mentioned that American
6 Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA) issue
7 censures to its members and questioned whether that
8 was reported to the Board or the responsibility of the
9 licensee to report to the Board.

10 Ms. Pachter Schulder explained that there was no
11 reporting requirement that an ASHA discipline be
12 reported by the licensee. She noted the Board could
13 make a request to ASHA to be informed of a discipline
14 against Pennsylvania licensees but cautioned against
15 Board members individually finding out about the
16 information as they would be required to recuse from
17 the matter and would be precluded from discussing it
18 with fellow members.

19 Mr. McNally commented that the statute would
20 authorize the Board to discipline a licensee for any
21 disciplinary actions taken by an authorized licensing
22 body of another state or other jurisdiction. He
23 thinks it was quite common for professional
24 associations to have an internal disciplinary process
25 for people who are dues-paying members of their

1 association. He noted it would be helpful and useful
2 to have the information regarding what the individual
3 is censured for because the Board would then be able
4 to investigate that incident.

5 Mr. McNally stated it would be helpful to know
6 about those instances or cases. The Board still would
7 not be able to rely upon the decision of ASHA as the
8 basis for action and would have to independently prove
9 and prosecute the underlying action that gave rise to
10 the discipline.

11 Chairperson Goldman questioned who ASHA contacts
12 regarding any of its disciplinary actions. Mr.
13 McNally mentioned putting himself or Ms. Matter on the
14 mailing list if this is a newsletter or email and
15 checking whether the individual is a licensee in this
16 state.

17 Chairperson Goldman noted her concerns after
18 reviewing journal club requests for continuing
19 education (CE) credit based on reading old journals.

20 She and Ms. Matter noted that in the past the Board
21 denied awarding CEs for reading old journal articles.

22 Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to § 45.501 of the
23 regulations which requires licensees to complete 20
24 hours of continuing education, each preceding biennial
25 renewal period . She also referred to

1 § 45.501(b) which permits up to 10 hours of approved
2 continuing education credit per biennium may be
3 granted on a case-by-case basis for services as a
4 lecturer or speaker and for publication of an
5 articles, books, or research relating to the practice
6 of speech-language pathology and audiology.

7 Ms. Pachter Schulder noted a licensee seeking
8 continuing education credit under this subsection
9 shall submit a written request with a copy of the
10 lecture, presentation, article, book, or research
11 along with the fee and then the Board makes the
12 determination of whether to grant that credit. She
13 noted that credit would not be granted for
14 participation in substantially the same program more
15 than once during a single cycle.

16 Ms. Pachter Schulder also referred to § 45.505
17 regarding approval of continuing education programs,
18 where the Board would have to identify the number of
19 clock hours to be awarded. She noted one option would
20 be to deny credit for reading an article from 2002.
21 Alternatively, she recommended tabling the request
22 and asking the applicant to justify why a 2002
23 article would be relevant to today's practice.

1 Approval of minutes of the September 6, 2019 meeting

2 MS. PACHTER SCHULDER:

3 Can we take a couple of moments to go
4 over the minutes for Act 41 purposes?

5 [The Board discussed corrections to the minutes.]

6 MS. PACHTER SCHULDER:

7 Can we have a motion to adopt the
8 minutes with minor corrections?

9 ?

10 MS. DELANO:

11 I make a motion to approve the minutes
12 from September 6, 2019.

13 MS. STIMSON:

14 Second.

15 CHAIRPERSON GOLDMAN:

16 All in favor of accepting the minutes as
17 amended? Abstaining?

18 [The motion carried. Dr. Murphy abstained from voting
19 on the motion.]

20 ***

21 Report of Board Counsel - (Continued)

22 [Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel,
23 referred to a draft of an annex for Act 41. She
24 provided an overview from the discussion at the
25 previous meeting, including the current provisional

1 license scheme under the Act that allows applicants to
2 obtain their clinical experience and still be licensed
3 with a provisional license and the effect on speech-
4 language pathologists.

5 Ms. Pachter Schulder mentioned that this Board
6 may not use Act 41 as much as other Boards as the
7 Board currently endorses licenses for persons who hold
8 ASHA Certificates of Clinical Competence (CCC).

9 The Board discussed the impact under Act 41 where
10 an audiologist has a master's degree, and how the law
11 was changed to require a doctorate degree. Ms.
12 Pachter Schulder explained that licensees who have
13 master's degrees are not required to cease practicing
14 in Pennsylvania, but for applicants from other states
15 who are seeking licensure in Pennsylvania, under Act
16 41, when comparing the laws to determine substantial
17 equivalence, if the other state's law only has a
18 master's and does not require a doctorate, the
19 educational standards would not be substantially
20 equivalent. She stated those individuals who have
21 their CCCs will take the pathway under the Act.

22 Ms. Pachter Schulder reviewed the requirements of
23 Act 41: the applicant must hold a license in a state
24 or jurisdiction that is substantially equivalent, the
25 license must be current in that state, the applicant

1 cannot have a disqualifying reciprocal discipline or
2 criminal conviction and the applicant must demonstrate
3 competency.

4 Ms. Pachter Schulder mentioned the Board's
5 determination at the last meeting that there were two
6 ways to demonstrate competence. In the first, the
7 applicant would be required to document 20 hours of
8 post-licensure continuing education from an approved
9 provider. The Board's thinking was that 20 hours of
10 post-licensure should indicate that the applicant was
11 licensed for one renewal period. The Board agreed
12 that 10 hours would have to be completed by the time
13 the individual applies for licensure.

14 The second demonstration of competence would be
15 for the applicant to document 2,520 hours of active
16 engagement in the profession within two years
17 preceding the application.

18 Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed the part of Act 41
19 regarding a provisional endorsement license, where
20 individuals may need to make up some of the
21 requirements. She noted the Board's decision at the
22 prior meeting to grant a provisional license where the
23 applicant has complete 10 of the continuing education
24 hours. The Board determined that it would grant a
25 provisional license for 90 days, but the individual

1 would need to obtain the additional 10 hours within 60
2 days thereby permitting 30 days to convert the
3 provisional license to an unrestricted license.

4 Ms. Pachter Schulder directed the Boards
5 attention to the draft Annex and reminded the Board
6 that Act 41 regulations were being placed separately
7 from the Board's current regulations to avoid
8 confusion as the Board currently has the ability to
9 issue a provisional license.]

10 ***

11 [Amy S. Goldman, MS, CCC-SLP, Chairperson, exited the
12 meeting at 10:50 a.m.]

13 ***

14 [Ms. Pachter Schulder noted the first step in the
15 regulatory process would be to adopt the draft and
16 send it to stakeholders for comment.]

17 ***

18 [Amy S. Goldman, MS, CCC-SLP, Chairperson, re-entered
19 the meeting at 10:52 a.m.]

20 ***

21 The Board discussed where there was a minimum amount
22 of hours for documented active hours of engagement in
23 order for a provisional license to be granted with the
24 remainder being made up prior to the issuance of an
25 unrestricted license. The Board determined that 250

1 hours would be acceptable for the issuance of a
2 provisional license Ms. Pachter Schulder discussed
3 limitations on the provisional license, where an
4 individual cannot receive more than one unless it is
5 granted. She stated the fee for licensure by
6 endorsement would be the current initial licensure
7 fee. ***

8 [K. Kalonji Johnson, Acting Commissioner, Bureau of
9 Professional and Occupational Affairs, reentered the
10 meeting at 11:03 a.m.]

11 ***

12 [Chairperson Goldman mentioned the National Council of
13 State Boards of Examiners (NCSB) packet that Ms.
14 Matter will be sending out summarizes all of the CE
15 requirements for all of the states, noting that
16 Alaska, Hawaii, and Colorado do not require CEs for
17 audiologists.

18 Ms. Pachter Schulder stated continuing education
19 would not be something the Board would look at for
20 substantial equivalence and would be looking at
21 education, experience, and exam. She questioned
22 whether the Board desired to review the draft further
23 or send it out to stakeholders to get their comments
24 while the Board continues its review.]

25 ***

1 MS. PACHTER SCHULDER:

2 Does someone want to make a motion to
3 send this Licensure by Endorsement under
4 Act 41 Annex to stakeholders to provide
5 input?

6 MR. JOHNSON:

7 So moved.

8 CHAIRPERSON GOLDMAN:

9 Second. All those in favor of the
10 motion? Opposed? Abstentions?

11 [The motion carried unanimously.]

12 ***

13 [Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel,
14 noted the Board did not need to hold elections as the
15 prior vote extended the offices through the end of
16 2020.]

17 ***

18 Public Session

19 [Anne Gilbertson, MS, CCC-SLP, Vice President of
20 Governmental Affairs, Pennsylvania Speech-Language-
21 Hearing Association, stated PSHA was awarded an ASHA
22 grant focusing on student advocacy. She noted a plan
23 for a better hearing and speech month, which would be
24 in May, with the help of Ms. Armbrust. She mentioned
25 May 12, 2020, is set as the date of planned student

1 advocacy day.

2 Ms. Gilbertson noted Representative Markosek from
3 Monroeville and Representative Hohenstein from
4 Philadelphia were invited to participate,
5 collaborating with the Pennsylvania Academy of
6 Audiology (PAA), and the attendance of students from
7 colleges throughout the Commonwealth for training
8 involved regarding how to reach out to their
9 legislators.

10 Ms. Gilbertson welcomed anyone from the Board who
11 desired to participate and bring trinkets or books
12 with regulations.

13 Ms. Pachter Schulder advised the Board cannot
14 advocate, but could provide regulation booklets.]

15

16 [James Shafer, Au.D., Pennsylvania Academy of
17 Audiology, referred to Chairperson Goldman's comments
18 regarding ASHA and censure. He noted the importance
19 of national groups, which are all voluntary groups
20 that supply significant guidance in the practice on a
21 day-to-day basis. He mentioned that the associations
22 are voluntary groups that provides certification, not
23 licensure. He commented that he believes that it
24 would be a slippery slope to look at censure as a
25 potential path to prosecution.]

1 ***

2 [Pursuant to Section 708(a)(5) of the Sunshine Act, at
3 11:17 a.m. the Board entered into Executive Session
4 with Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, for the purpose
5 of conducting quasi-judicial deliberations on matters
6 that are pending before the Board. The Board returned
7 to open session at 12:43 p.m.]

8 ***

9 MOTIONS

10 MS. PACHTER SCHULDER:

11 During executive session, the Board
12 engaged in quasi-judicial deliberations
13 under Section 708(a)(5) of the Sunshine
14 Act regarding the matters we are about
15 to make motions about. Board members
16 who recuse themselves from participation
17 will be identified by way of the motion.

18 With regard to the matter of
19 Christine Elizabeth Selinsky, File No.
20 14-68-08957, the Board had already given
21 authorization to issue an adjudication
22 and order so no additional motion needs
23 to be made, but the Board will be
24 writing its adjudication and order.

25 In the matter of Joy D. Parr, File

1 No. 18-68-005107 for which members Ms.
2 Delano and Ms. Goldman are recused, is
3 there a motion to authorize counsel to
4 prepare an adjudication and order?

5 DR. MURPHY:

6 So moved.

7 MR. JOHNSON:

8 Second.

9 ***

10 MR. JOHNSON ASSUMED THE CHAIR

11 ***

12 MR. JOHNSON:

13 All in favor? Any opposed?

14 [The motion carried. Ms. Delano and Ms. Goldman
15 recused themselves from deliberations and voting on
16 the motion.]

17 ***

18 CHAIRPERSON GOLDMAN RESUMED THE CHAIR

19 ***

20 MS. PACHTER SCHULDER:

21 Is there a motion to grant the
22 Application for Licensure to Practice
23 Speech-Language Pathology of Rachel Ann
24 Yoder?

25 MR. JOHNSON:

1 So moved.

2 MS. STIMSON:

3 Second.

4 CHAIRPERSON GOLDMAN:

5 All those in favor? Opposed?

6 Abstained?

7 [The motion carried unanimously.]

8 ***

9 MS. PACHTER SCHULDER:

10 With regard to Amanda Mahoney, is there
11 a motion to advise Ms. Mahoney and the
12 University of Pittsburgh that the
13 Board's ability to waive its regulation
14 is limited to the time frame and amount
15 of experience that she must get in order
16 to get a license, not to the length of a
17 provisional license which is contained
18 within the statute and, so therefore,
19 the Board cannot extend her provisional
20 license.

21 MR. JOHNSON:

22 So moved.

23 CHAIRPERSON GOLDMAN:

24 Second. All those in favor? Opposed?

25 Abstained?

1 [The motion carried unanimously.]

2 ***

3 Report of Acting Commissioner (Continued)

4 [K. Kalonji Johnson, Acting Commissioner, Bureau of
5 Professional and Occupational Affairs, announced the
6 Bureau was in the preliminary discussions with the
7 Department of General Services on an initiative to
8 reinstitute wall certificates with an added feature
9 for public safety. He mentioned incorporating wall
10 certificates with modern technology, such as a
11 Response Code (QR) or barcode that would provide a
12 link to the license verification page.]
