Thomas Garg, V.M.D., Chairman, called the meeting to order at 9:08 a.m. K. Kalonji Johnson, Acting Commissioner, Bureau of Professional and 10 Occupational Affairs, was not present at the 11 commencement of the meeting. * * * 12 13 Approval of minutes of the May 10, 2019 meeting 14 CHAIRMAN GARG: 15 The first thing on the agenda this 16 morning is just the minutes from the 17 previous meeting. DeLaurentis, Esquire, Deputy Chief 18 Counsel, Prosecution Division, introduced herself and 19 provided a brief summary of her professional 20 background. 21 Ms. DeLaurentis provided information for the 22 Pennsylvania State Board of Veterinary Medicine for 23 FY 2018-2019, noting that 225 cases were opened with 24 261 open files as of July 1, 2019. She also provided 25 information regarding enforcement statistics.

Ms. DeLaurentis noted 69 immediate temporary suspensions, in general, for the prosecution division in FY 2018-2019 with 11,359 open cases as of July 1, 2019. She reviewed the last fiscal year, noting that 14,030 cases were opened, which was up from 12,604 the last fiscal year. She noted that 13,270 cases were closed the last fiscal year.

Ms. DeLaurentis discussed the Office of General Counsel's Mediation Program, which is free of charge. She stated the consent agreements will reflect whether the case was resolved through mediation.

Ms. DeLaurentis addressed the Pennsylvania

Justice Network (JNET), where the prosecution division receives an alert when licensees from all of the Boards and Commissions are charged with a crime. She noted that six administrative assistants handle all of the cases coming in to the department. Two administrative assistants are dedicated to JNET to identify arrests that are relevant to each Board.]

Complaint Process Legal Presentation

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22 [Paul J. Jarabeck, Esquire, Senior Prosecutor in

23 Charge, provided a brief slide presentation regarding

24 the complaint process. He stated there are 29

25 professional and occupational Boards to ensure the

1 health, welfare, and safety of the public. Currently, 2 there are about 1.2 million licensees.

3 Mr. Jarabeck referred to Title 63 P.S.

4 Professions and Occupations regarding the vet law.

Mr. Jarabeck discussed the Criminal History
Records Information Act (CHRIA), where an individual
can be subject to penalty due to being convicted of a
felony or misdemeanor that relates to their
profession.

Mr. Jarabeck noted that complaints can come from consumers, anybody within that industry, federal, state, or local agencies. He discussed summaries, the JNET process, and complaints from investigators and inspectors.

Mr. Jarabeck addressed self-reporting and Act 6, where an individual must report discipline from another state. He stated JNET will provide reports at the time of the arrest and the report at the time of the conviction.

Mr. Jarabeck addressed the intake process, where complaints are received by a staff member in the Professional Compliance Office, and the complaint receives a code that gets registered into the Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS). He commented, if no jurisdiction is determined, the matter may be

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closed and a letter sent to inform the complainant.
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   He stated the complainant may be referred to another
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   agency for assistance.]
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   [K. Kalonji Johnson, Acting Commissioner, Bureau of
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   Professional and Occupational Affairs, entered the
   meeting at 9:44 a.m.]
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   [Mr. Jarabeck stated complaints receive a file number,
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   Board number, and then a number assigned based upon
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   the time that complaint was actually received.
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   noted that the complaint then goes to a paralegal to
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   identify what information needs to be gathered as part
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   of an investigation, and an administrative assistant
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   generates a letter advising the complainant that this
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   process is underway.
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        Mr. Jarabeck stated investigators cover four
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   regions of the state, and agents conduct interviews,

   obtain evidence, and serve subpoenas throughout the
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   Commonwealth. He noted contacts with law enforcement
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   and work with other agencies for faster results.]

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Mr. Davis noted Act 41 of 2019 to be similar to licensure by reciprocity. He stated every Board has licensure by reciprocity in their act. He stated licensure by endorsement is now in the act, so how the Boards will promulgate regulations will ultimately effect exactly how the Board is dealing with this act.

Mr. Davis stated licensure by reciprocity in accordance with the regulations currently states an applicant must have been actively engaged in clinical practice for the past five years, whereas Act 41 requires that they demonstrate competency in a profession proving they had experience in the profession for at least two of the past five years.

Mr. Davis commented that the Board will be able to grant licensure to those who fall short and tell them to make up those additional requirements possibly within the next year.

Mr. Davis mentioned that the act also states that all of the Boards have to promulgate regulations within 18 months. He noted the possibility of the Board seeing applications by endorsement after the 60

CHAIRMAN GARG:

On behalf of the Board, I'd like to thank Dr. Langlois for taking the time to present this morning. All of the members of the Board are well aware of the issue and the fact that it is nothing less than a crisis in the veterinary profession.

That being said, the Board is required to abide by the Practice Act in determining whether CE could be granted for any given program. The act states that the programs must meet the educational and professional requirements of the profession and that programs must be designed to "keep the members of the profession abreast of current learning and scholarship."

The Board has previously stated its belief that wellness programs fail to meet this criteria and that such programs, therefore, cannot be approved for continuing education credits.

That being said, we very strongly encourage veterinary associations on the national, state, and local levels to do everything possible in order to work toward addressing this crisis.

We would encourage VMA to make appropriate programs prominently available in conjunction with your CE meetings and to regularly communicate with your membership regarding what resources are available for veterinarians in need of assistance.
